Forest Lake Woman Fatally Injured in Two-Car Crash Involving Kewaskum Auto

Thrown from Car In Accident Near New Fane Tuesday

Mrs. George (Alta) Horne, 50, of Forest Lake, R. 2, Campbellsport, was fatally injured at about 6:30 o'clock Tuesday morning when she was thrown from a car driven by her son, Harlan Horne, 19, when it collided with an auto driven by Walter W. Klug, 68, of Kewaskum.

The crash occurred on County Trunk D about 1½ miles east of New Fane at the Sheboygan-Fond du Lac county line, just inside of Sheboygan county. In the accident, Mrs. Horne was thrown from the vehicle driven by her son by the force of the impact and landed on the road. She suffered a skull fracture and numerous bruises and other injuries.

Mrs. Horne was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance where she died around 7 a. m. shortly after arrival there. Both young Horne and Klug were reported uninjured in the mishap but were also removed to the hospital.

Mrs. Horne and her son were enroute to West Bend where both were employed at the Amity Leather Products Co. Mr. Horne is employed on the second shift at the Pick Mfg. Co. in that city.

Horne informed officers that the brakes of his auto suddenly became faulty as he attempted to stop for an arterial on County Trunk D and a town road. His car was heading south and Klug was traveling east on the county trunk when they collided. When Sheboygan county officers arrived at the scene, they checked Horne's car and found the brakes defective.

The fatality was Sheboygan county's fourth in 1957, five less than the figure for 1956 at the same time.

Mrs. Horne, nee Alta Nichols, was born May 21, 1906 in the town of Mitchell, Sheboygan county. She married George Horne on Mar. 25, 1933 at Waldo. They settled at Whitewater and came to their present home about five years ago.

Survivors are her husband, four sons, Marshall, Harlan and Francis at home and Ellsworth with the armed forces in Korea; one daughter, Gladys Jane at home, and three sisters, Mrs. Richard Andrews of Plymouth, Mrs. Vincent Fellenz of R. 1, Kewaskum, and Mrs. Ben Deque of Waldo. One daughter passed away in infancy.

The body will be in state at St. James Episcopal church, West Bend, from 3 to 5 p. m. and from 7 to 9 p. m. on Friday. A requiem mass will be read Saturday at 10:30 a. m. at the church with the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral home of West Bend in charge of arrangements. The Rev. Albert Meereboer will officiate and burial will take place in the Waldo cemetery.

Mayor Praises Civil Defense Group at Meet, State Director Speaks

CERTIFICATES PRESENTED TO HOME NURSING TRAINEES, AUXILIARY POLICE

Praise for all the people who are actively engaged in civil defense in the Kewaskum area was voiced by James D. Reigle, village mayor, at a public civil defense meeting held last Monday evening. The mayor stressed the need for a strong, well-planned civil defense group, and paid particular tribute to Marvin Martin for the excellent job he has done as local civil defense director.

Highlights of the evening included an address by Richard Wilson, assistant director of civil defense in the state of Wisconsin, and the presenting of recognition awards to persons who had completed the home-nursing training course and auxiliary police training. A film entitled "LET'S FACE IT" was presented which showed the immense destruction that can be done by nuclear warfare, and how people can be properly trained to save themselves and others.

Wilson emphasized the horror and devastation that an enemy hydrogen bomb would create. He stated that one hydrogen bomb is equal in destructive power to 20 million tons of T.N.T., and that one such bomb is more powerful than all the bombs dropped by the Allies in World War II. He said that Kewaskum is in a very vulnerable spot as far as radio active fall-out is concerned, because it is situated so close to Milwaukee. In the event of a hydrogen attack, highways would be choked with cars and people trying to escape. These people would have to be cared for as far as food, shelter, first-aid, and medical care would be concerned. In such an event, Kewaskum might have to take care of about 2,500 people for perhaps a few weeks. That would be the job of the civil defense group working in co-operation with local citizens. He stressed the need for a first-aid kit in every home, and someone that knows how to use it.

Miss C. Jaehrig, executive secretary of the American Red Cross, West Bend chapter, expressed her admiration for the wonderful job Kewaskum is doing in training people for civil defense. She stated that this training would also be useful in other disasters such as tornadoes, floods or fire emergencies.

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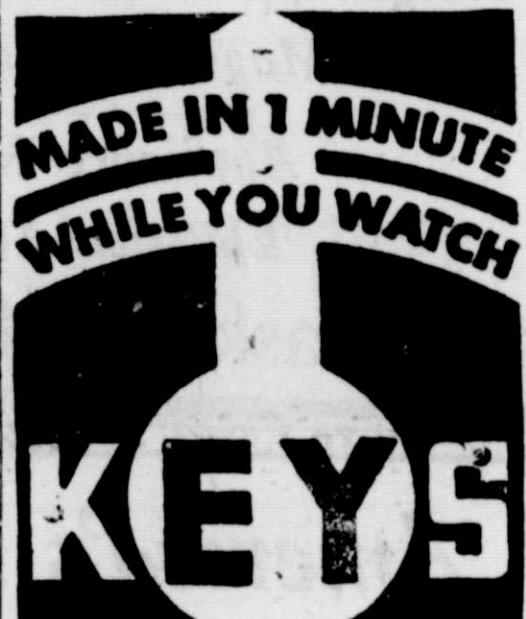

Smelt fishing is when you drive many miles to stay out late at night, get sopping wet and half freeze to death and work hard to get so many fish that nobody wants to clean them.

At the last meeting of the Kewaskum Sportsmen's association the members took action to get some fish planted in the river here. In order to get fish from the conservation department it will first be necessary to clean out the river. Members got to work last week end on the project. They removed some of the plates from the dam and lowered the water level about three and one-half feet. Then with boats, rakes, chains, hooks, and the aid of a wrecker, they removed the debris from the river. All kinds of junk, including a water tank, oil drums, old car parts, concrete blocks, brush, and many other things were hauled out. Lowering the water also made it flow faster, removing the stagnant water and some of the mud and goo. The conservation department has recommended that the plates be left out of the dam this summer to give vegetation a chance to thrive, keep the river free of stagnant water, and give kids and others a better chance to remove some of the rough fish from the shallow water. Then next spring the fish could be planted. This is a good move by the sportsmen. We have a beautiful, park, fireplaces, park benches, plenty of shrubbery, much shade, wonderful trees and green grass, an ideal spot for fishing and picnicking. All that has been lacking is the fish.

Another improvement was made at the post office this week when new concrete steps were built to replace the temporary wooden ones there since the post office moved to the Koch building.

I heard a song sparrow but couldn't see him. I couldn't recognize a graceful heron-like bird that flew silently high above me. A ring-necked plover searched for his breakfast along the bank of the Milwaukee river, where the pale new leaves of the graceful willows reflected in the water.

I continued across the bridge, over the dam, up the hill and into the park where gold-finches darted past with their cheerful song "on the wing". Tiny golden crowned

kinglets hopped in a thorn tree whose leaves will soon be large enough to protect them from watching eyes.

A mud hen, or coot, flew low over the river. Saucy starlings, high in the tree, were mocking the lark and the robin. Two sparrows scolded a shiny cedar wax-wing, a stranger from the south, who had come to invade their neighborhood.

It was 7:30 when a bright blue-jay flashed by. I heard the soft

notes of a white throated sparrow. A flicker, or yellow hammer, (we used to call them), repeated his excited call. I hurried back as the time had gone too fast.

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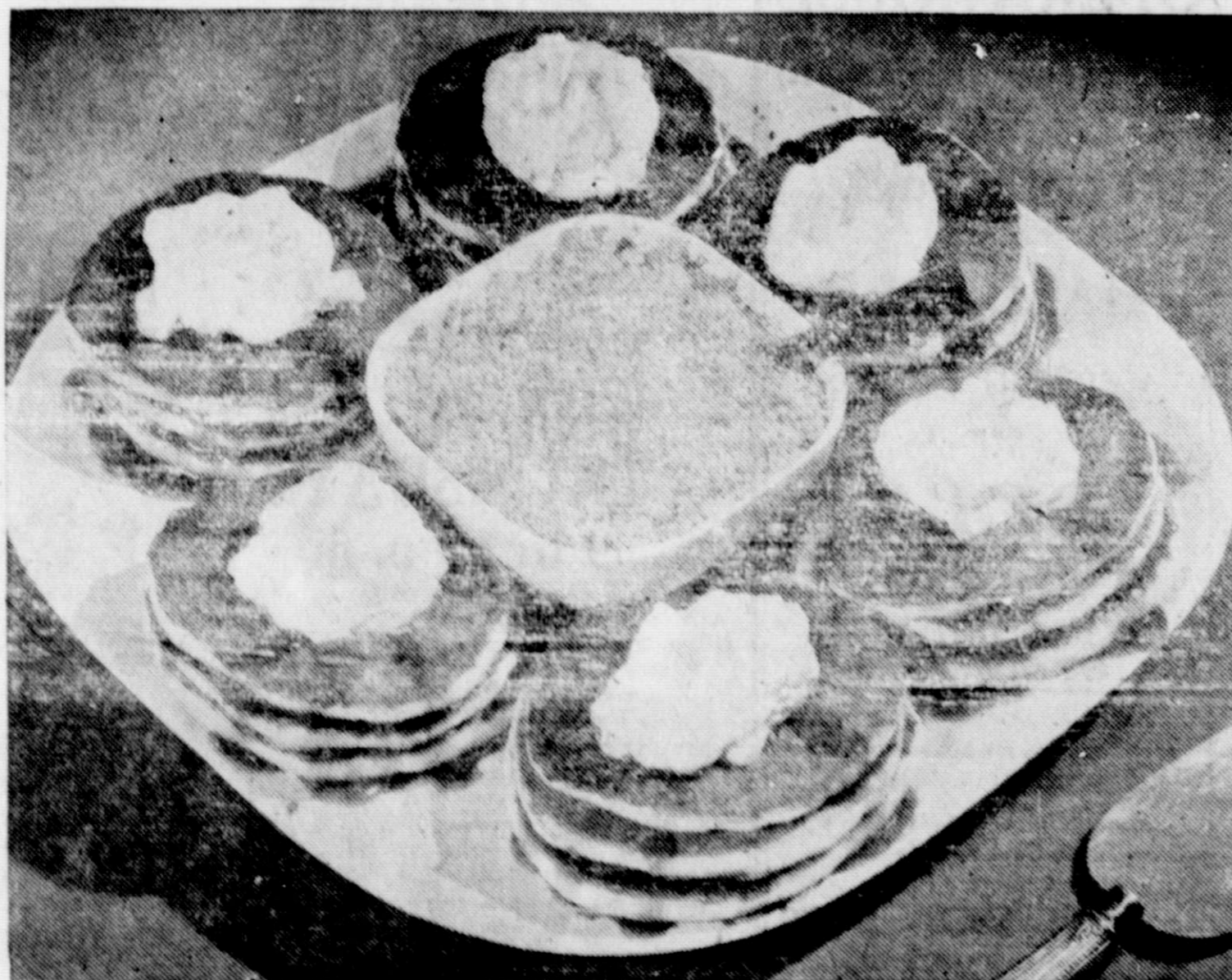

How About a Pancake Party?



PANCAKES ADIRONDACK

Pancakes are so easy to prepare and always seem to get people into the spirit of fun and good fellowship.

An extra special dish to serve at a pancake party is Pancakes Adirondack. Many famous ski resorts in the Adirondack Mountains serve this deluxe pancake concoction and have become well known for the dish.

For Pancakes Adirondack, fluffy golden pancakes are served with melted butter and shaved maple sugar with whipped cream atop a stack of three pancakes. If maple sugar is not readily available, you may use brown sugar or a maple-blended syrup.

For your pancakes, call on an easy pancake mix and have them ready for baking in a minute.

PANCAKES ADIRONDACK

Makes 14 to 16 pancakes

PANCAKES:

- 2 cups pancake mix
- 2 cups milk
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons melted butter

FILLING AND TOPPING:

- Melted butter
- Shaved maple sugar
- Whipped cream

Add milk, egg and butter to pancake mix, stirring lightly. A somewhat lumpy batter makes light, fluffy pancakes. Pour ¼ cup batter for each pancake onto a hot, lightly buttered griddle. Bake to a golden brown, turning only once. Stack 3 pancakes placing melted butter and shaved maple sugar (or brown sugar) between each. Top with whipped cream and sprinkle with shaved maple sugar.
