LEMON-NUT BREAD

A refreshing lift at any meal and a special bread for Easter Sunday brunch. It's moist and delicious plain as well as toasted and spread with butter or margarine.



NANCY HAVEN

4 tablespoons butter or margarine

11/4 cups Beet Sugar

2 eggs

11/2 teaspoons finely grated lemon rind

31/4 cups sifted all-purpose

3 teaspoons baking pow-

1/2 teaspoon each salt, soda 3/3 cup milk

4 tablespoons lemon juice 34 cup coarsely chopped

pecans or walnuts _ CREAM butter or margarine and Beet Sugar together in mixing bowl. Blend in each egg and the lemon rind. Stir in sifted dry ingredients alternately with liquids (milk and lemon juice). Fold in

SPOON batter into a lightly greased loaf pan (9x5x21/2 in.), being sure thick batter is well into the corners of the pan.

BAKE in moderate oven (350°F.) 1 hour or until knife inserted in

the center comes out clean. Remove from pan, cool. HINTS: If you prefer a nut bread without a cracked top crust, allow the batter to stand in the pan at room temperature for

about 20 minutes before baking. Nut bread cuts more easily and flavors are more mellow if it is cooled and wrapped for 24 hours before serving.

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

to order fertilizer in time for spring planting.

2—If the test indicates the soil is low in phosphate and potash, you will need large amounts of these nutrients. These large fertilizer applications should be broadcast and plowed or worked into the soil before planting. Nitrogen is needed, too. Where corn does not follow a ploweddown legume, add anywhere from 80 to 150 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer per acre.

3—If the soil test is high, use maintenance amounts of fertilizer to keep it that way.

4—Plow and prepare a good seedbed, but don't work the soil time.

S EVEN steps for getting top yields of corn this year were listed by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee, based on suggestions by University of Illinois agronomists:

1—Get the soil tested now if this hasn't been done recently. This will allow plenty of leeway to order fertilizer in time for spring planting.

2. If the test indicates the soil
