ing experience of earning money once more - of being able to send money home to their families. More poppies worn on Poppy Day means more employment for disabled veterans during the coming year.







Peas are affected by the pea aphid and the pea weevil. Control for these insects is DDT and parathion. Methoxychlor and rotenone can also be used for the pea weevil. Dust for the weevil before the pods have formed.

Potato insects, the Colorado potato beetle, potato flea beetle, Blister beetle, leafhoppers and aphids, can all be controlled with DDT. Spray or dust as soon as insect is noticed.






