16 TEENAGERS INVOLVED IN CRASHES

2 Milwaukee Students Killed In Mauthe Lake Mishap; Youth, Woman Die in Another Crash

Seven Teen-agers, Man Hurt in Three Other Accidents

Death took no holiday in this community during the past holiday week.

Four persons, three of them youths, were killed; thirteen persons, eleven of them youths, were injured, and a total of twenty persons, seventeen of them youths, were involved in traffic accidents in this area during the week.

Ending tragically Monday evening was a picnic-outing for senior graduating students of Messmer high school of Milwaukee when two girls were killed when the car in which they were passengers left the road and rolled over in a ditch. The accident took place on a park road at Mauthe lake in the Kettle Moraine state forest located about seven miles northeast of Kewaskum at about 6 p. m.

According to Fond du Lac county authorities, the car, driven by Joseph A. Szot, Jr., 18, 5258 N. 58th st. Milwaukee, son of Joseph Szot, Sr., well known musician, was apparently traveling at a high rate of speed in a 15 miles per hour zone when the driver lost control of the vehicle on a curve and it left the road and overturned several times. The mishap occurred near the Emil Schmitz home on the road leading into Mauthe lake.

Killed in the accident were:
CAROL ZIELINSKI, 17, 5031 N. SANTA MONICA BLVD., WHITE-FISH BAY.

JEANNINE SAUVE, 19, 5785 N. MILWAUKEE RIVER PKWY., GLENDALE

Believed to have been killed instantly was Miss Zielinski, while Miss Sauve apparently died shortly after being placed in the Kewaskum rescue squad ambulance. She was pronounced dead when admitted to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. The car apparently rolled over on Miss Zielinski and struck Miss Sauve when it left the road. Miss Zielinski was pinned under the vehicle.

Szot suffered cuts and bruises and Miss Nancy Hauck, 18, 6167 N. Apple Blossom lane, Glendale, incurred injuries to her chest and left shoulder. Both were also taken to the West Bend hospital in the local ambulance. They were released the next day.

Two other companions in the group of six who were riding in the car escaped unhurt. They were Phillip Rotar, 18, 3418 N. Richards st. and his brother, Robert 20. All six were Messmer high school seniors except Robert who was not in school. The Zielinski and Sauve girls were to have graduated Sunday.

The accident occurred about 6:05 p. m. only about three-tenths of a mile from the picnic site. The group had just started out from the picnic

Boy, 5, Escapes Death When He Falls into Well

ROBERT ETTA FALLS INTO TEN FEET OF WATER, CLINGS TO PIPE UNTIL RESCUED

Robert Etta, five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Etta of R. 1, Kewaskum, had a narrow escape from death by drowning when he fell into a well at his home between 6:30 and 7 p. m. last Friday. The family resides with Mr. Etta's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Etta, about 1½ miles north of the village on the River road.

While playing in the yard with his wagon, Robert got a notion to haul away the planks which covered the old well. He pulled them aside, lost his footing and tumbled into the well which contained from 10 to 12 feet of water.

According to his mother, the tot sank under the water but apparently the force of the fall brought him to the surface again. The boy knew enough to grab the pipe leading into the well and hung onto it for dear life, at the same time yelling to his sister, Jane 6, who was also playing nearby. Jane immediately called her mother.

The mother's screams were heard by grandmother, Mrs. John Etta, who was in the house, and Earl Etta, brother of Lloyd, who resides across the road, and they rushed to her assistance.

Not being able to find a rope or ladder immediately, Earl did the only thing left he could think of. He braced his hands and shoulder against one wall of the well and his feet against the other and worked himself down within reach of the boy, risking his own safety and not knowing whether he would be able to get out of the well himself again. He pushed Robert up in some manner until he could be reached by his mother and a hired man, who pulled him to safety. Earl does not remember exactly how he got out of the well himself again but believes it must have been the same way as he entered, with the help of holding onto the pipe. His heroic act saved his nephew's life.

Mrs. Etta said she thought her son was in the ice cold water about 15 minutes in all. She reported that he had turned colors from the cold water, describing it as a greenish-yellowish color. She believed that he might have suffered cramps and would not have been able to hang onto the pipe for more than a few minutes longer when rescued.

Except for a bruised arm and back, suffering from shock and being very cold, little Robert was none the worse for wear and did not require hospitalization. He was put to bed where he made a quick recovery. Fortunately he did not strike his head on the pipe or sides of the well when he fell or he might

Rural Route Three Out of Kewaskum Is Discontinued

CONSOLIDATION OF ROUTES AT LOCAL POST OFFICE EFFECTIVE JUNE 1

On May 17 word was received by Harry E. Koch, acting postmaster, from the postal department of the discontinuance of rural route 3 from the Kewaskum office. In the future Kewaskum will have only two rural routes, 1 and 2, and this consolidation will be in effect on Saturday, June 1.

Patrons have been informed of the change this past week, notifying them of the rural route they will be served from. Allenton rural route 1 received approximately one hundred patrons from Kewaskum route 3 with the remainder of patrons on route 3 combined to make up Kewaskum route 2. Rural route 1 also was extended and some patrons who normally were on route 2 will now be on route 1.

Rural carrier August Bilgo will serve 60,225 miles instead of the 50,365 he had in the past. Carrier John Van Blarcom will extend his mileage from 52.03 to 63.35 miles.

Postmaster Koch also states that great steps have been taken by his office in making lists of address changes to be sent to newspapers, magazines, etc. to see that the patrons being changed will receive their mail in the usual manner on June 1 and thereafter.

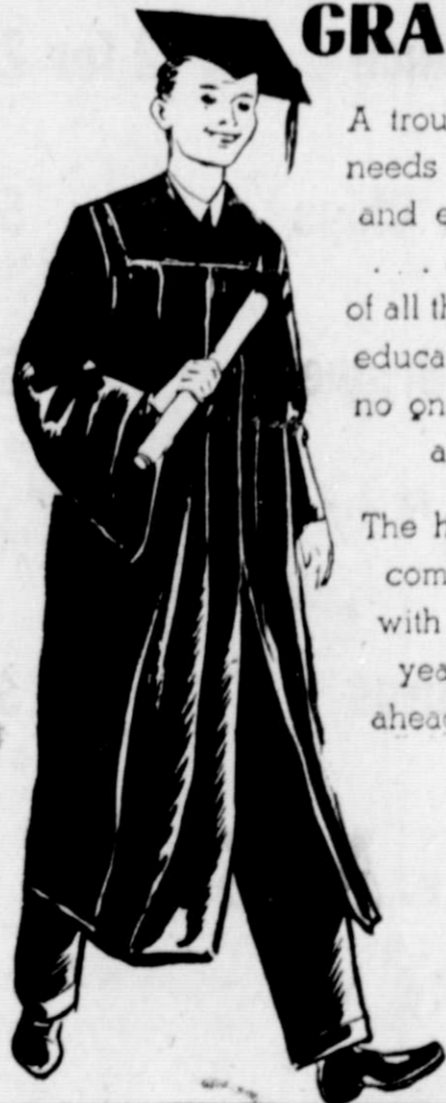
EIGHT CONFIRMED AT ST. LUCAS CHURCH ON SUNDAY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) site for the trip home when the mishap happened. The six young people and other seniors attended a graduation rehearsal at the school Monday morning, then several carloads of pupils drove to Mauthe lake where Messmer seniors have been holding picnics annually for some years. School authorities said the outing was not a school sponsored event.

According to Traffic Officer Irving E. Gauthier of the Fond du Lac county police department, Miss Hauck said she had expressed a desire to go home early and one of the Rotar brothers announced he could get a ride for her. They walked to a car where Szot was already behind the wheel and Nancy got in with the others. She said she was riding in the rear seat and did not know how fast Szot was driving or what condition he was in.

Officer Gauthier questioned Szot at St. Joseph's hospital and was told he had been drinking beer. He said he was driving 60 to 65 miles an hour on what he believed was open highway when the accident occurred.

Authorities are still investigating the circumstances surrounding the accident. It was stated that a complete investigation of the facts would be made before any action is taken relative to the possibilities of preferring charges against the driver.

Both of the girls fatally injured were only children. Miss Zielinski was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert C. Zielinski and Miss Sauve's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Leo J. Sauve. Miss Sauve was engaged to be married to William R. Dollinger, 22, of 5159 N. 71st st. in October.

Funeral services for Miss Zielinski were held at 8:15 a. m. Friday at the Schramka funeral home and at 9 a. m. at St. Monica's Catholic church, Whitefish Bay, with burial in Holy Cross cemetery. Rites for Miss Sauve were at 8:15 Friday at the Heiden and Lange funeral chapel and at 9 a. m. at St. Nicholas Catholic church, W. Lawn ave., with burial in Holy Cross cemetery.

Two persons were also killed and three others injured in a two-car collision at 6 p. m. last Thursday at County Trunks K and B, approximately six miles southeast of Fond du Lac. Killed were:

RICHARD J. COMINGS, 17, R. 1, CAMPBELLSPORT.

MRS. BARBARA BACKES, 64, MILWAUKEE.

Injured were Curtiss Prescott, 18, R. 3, Kewaskum, head injury; Anthony P. Backus, 64, husband of the victim, and Wendy Backes, 6, his granddaughter, both internal injuries. All were taken to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac.

Comings was riding with Prescott, a 1956 graduate of Kewaskum high school. They were employed at the Meiklejohn Import Auto corp. Hwy. 175 south of Fond du Lac. Comings had quit his job the same day preparatory to leaving Monday for the air force in which he recently enlisted. Prescott was giving him a ride home. Fond du Lac city and county ambulances removed the injured and two victims to the hospital.

Mrs. Backes died shortly after being admitted to the hospital. Backes and Wendy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph L. Backes, R. 4, Thiensville, were reported in serious condition. Prescott was driving a small foreign make car and Backes a 1952 model sedan.

Comings was a son of Rolland and Dorothy Majerus Comings. In addition to his parents he is survived by five sisters, Patricia, Faith, Barbara, Jane and Ellen, all at

home; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. William Majerus, Campbellsport, and Guy Comings, Sheldon, Wash. Funeral services were held at St. Mary's Catholic church, Eden, at 10 a. m. Monday. Burial was in the parish cemetery.

The fatalities were the tenth and eleventh for Fond du Lac county this year. District Attorney Eugene F. McEssey reported he will confer with Coroner Frank Decker to determine whether an inquest will be held.

Four Milwaukeeans were hurt at 6:30 p. m. Sunday when their car, driven by Raymond J. Dulski, 19, Milwaukee, left County Trunk S near New Fane, bounced 72 feet and rolled over, going 288 feet before stopping, according to Fond du Lac county authorities.

Those hurt were Dulski, cuts on face requiring stitches; Raymond Tisher, 17, cut on head requiring stitches; Joan McCarthy, 17, concussion, and Rose Symolon, 17, possible internal injuries. The injured were taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum ambulance.

Dulski was fined \$50 and costs by Municipal Judge Hazen W. McEssey at Fond du Lac Monday for careless driving.

Elvin Fagan, 40, R. 2, Thiensville, suffered cuts and possible chest injuries at about 1:45 a. m. Saturday when he lost control of his car at the intersection of Hwy. 45 and 28 at Rahn's service station at the north village limits. Fagan's car, which was traveling north on 45, struck an embankment at the intersection when the driver attempted to turn onto 28. The embankment, a sign pole, mortar box and telephone pole were damaged in the mishap. Fagan was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the local ambulance.

Three youths were injured at 3:40 p. m. Monday when a car driven by Henry M. Justman, 17, R. 2, Kewaskum, went out of control west of Young America. The car is reported to have swerved down the highway and plunged into the ditch on the left side. Injured were Art Neuy, Jr., 16, Barton; Thomas Faber, 16, R. 3, West Bend, and Floyd Diels, 17, West Bend.

Three other youths died accidentally in the surrounding area the past week. David L. Wolf, 15, West Bend, high school sophomore, was killed in a farm tractor mishap. Two Rosendale high school youths drowned while on an FFA outing at Silver Lake near Wautoma. They were Robert Fredericks, 16 and Myron Tates, 15.

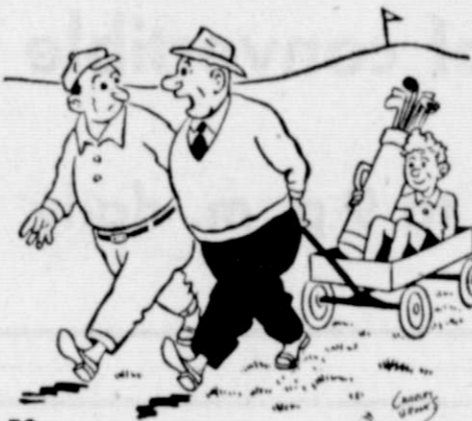

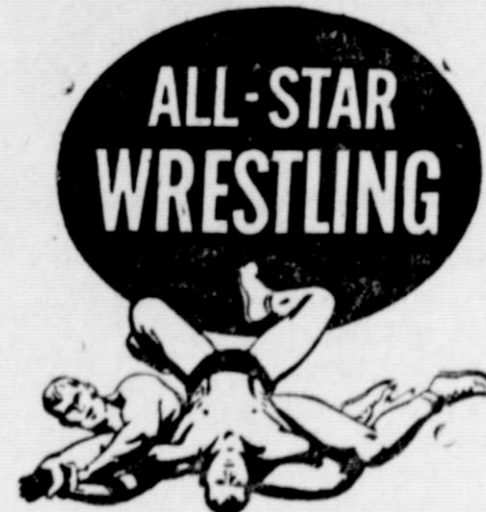

Variety For Your Breakfast—

FILLED BUTTER ROLLS

Breakfast becomes a very special treat when it includes a tray of assorted butter rolls and plenty of butter. The hot rolls are a real getter-upper on cool fall days, or, for an afternoon get-together with the "girls." For who doesn't like hot fresh butter rolls? The rolls themselves are not difficult to make, and they are well worth the effort. The finished product is something you can be proud to serve.

The yeast dough for filled butter rolls is not tricky to make. In fact, it is hard to have a failure. While the dough is rising for the second time, whip up the spicy prune and apricot fillings. The fillings are cooked until the fruit is softened, then beaten well. A streusel topping of brown sugar, flour, butter, and nuts also adds variety.

There are many shapes the rolls can be formed into—many will come to your mind as you work with the dough. Oblongs, circles, squares, and braids are just a few ideas. Fill them with the fruit mixture or top with the streusel, let them rise again, brush with melted butter for a browner crust and good flavor, and pop the trays of rolls into the oven. As soon as you remove them from the oven, brush the tops with a frosting made of hot milk and powdered sugar.

The recipe makes about thirty-five dainty rolls, so some of them can easily be frozen and used later. They will come in handy for piping hot breakfast rolls some morning. Freeze in each package the amount that will be used at one time.



FILLED BUTTER ROLLS
Greased cookie sheets
375°, 15-20 minutes

1½ cups milk
1 cup butter
¾ cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 cake compressed yeast
¼ cup warm water
2 eggs, beaten
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
6 cups sifted all-purpose flour
Heat the milk just to the boiling point. Stir in the butter, sugar, and salt. Cool until lukewarm. Sprinkle crumbled compressed yeast on water. Stir until dissolved. Add yeast, eggs, lemon rind, and flour to the milk mixture. Beat well until smooth. Place in a greased bowl, cover with a towel and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. Punch down and let rise again. When doubled again, turn the

dough onto a floured board and knead lightly for about 1 minute. Roll out portions of dough ½ inch thick.

To make round buns: Cut dough into 2½ inch rounds, place on a greased cookie sheet and with the thumb, make an indentation in the center of each. Fill with a teaspoon of prune or apricot filling.

To make filled bun squares: Cut dough into 4 inch squares; place a teaspoon of prune or apricot filling in the center of each, moisten the corners with water and bring opposite corners to the center. Press gently together.

To make twists: Form strips of dough into ropes and shape into a circle. Place a teaspoon of filling in the center.

Place the rolls on a greased cookie sheet, cover, and let rise until double in bulk. Brush lightly

with cream. Bake at 375° for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown. Makes about 48 rolls.

If desired brush with a mixture of 1 cup powdered sugar and 2 tablespoons hot milk while the rolls are still warm.

APRICOT FILLING FOR FILLED BUTTER ROLLS

2 cups filling
1 pound dried apricots, cut in pieces
1 cup water
2 tablespoons sugar
½ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon ginger
1 tablespoon lemon juice
2 tablespoons butter

Cut the apricots into pieces and combine with the other ingredients in a saucepan. Simmer until the apricots have softened, stirring occasionally to prevent sticking. Remove from heat and beat well. This may be put through a sieve or used as it is.

PRUNE FILLING FOR FILLED BUTTER ROLLS

2 cups filling
1 pound prunes
1½ cups water
2 tablespoons sugar
¼ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon cloves
½ teaspoon grated lemon rind
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 tablespoons butter

Cut the prunes into pieces and remove the seeds. Put all of the ingredients into a saucepan and simmer until the prunes are cooked. Stir occasionally to prevent sticking. Remove from the heat and beat well. Use to fill Filled Butter Rolls.

STREUSEL TOPPING

¼ cup brown sugar
1 tablespoon flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 tablespoons melted butter
¼ cup chopped nuts, if desired
Combine all of the ingredients. Sprinkle on the batter and bake.
