Bind Rosenheimer Burglary Trio Over To Circuit Court

The three Milwaukee men, who are free on bond on charges of breaking and entering the L. Rosenheimer store in Kewaskum in an attempted burglary last Feb. 17, were bound over to the September term of the circuit court when they were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Herbert P. Matenaer at the Barton village hall last Friday for a preliminary hearing.

The three men are Nick P. Tarantino, 27; Frank P. Aliota, 25, and Salvatore (Sam) DiMaggio, 40. Aliota and DiMaggio were both represented by counsel, but Tarantino appeared in his own defense.

The court announced its verdict at about 3 p. m. following a lengthy hearing from 9 a. m. until noon and resumption of the hearing after the noon recess. Having a major part in the hearing was Chief of Police Roland Pledl of Kewaskum, who fired shots at one of the burglars in his attempt to escape on the night of the break-in.

Judge Matenaer said that it was the contention of the court that there was sufficient evidence to bind over this case to the circuit court. Bond for the three men remained the same as posted at their initial arraignment before Justice Matenaer when Aliota posted a \$10,000 property bond and DiMaggio and Tarantino provided \$5,000 bonds to obtain their release from jail at West Bend.

Tarantino was apprehended in Kewaskum on the night of the burglary when he was found hiding behind a house about a block from the store by Chief Pledl, Officer Forest Brown and local citizens. The other two surrendered later to Milwaukee police. One of them made his escape by stealing a local car.

Crash Injuries Prove Fatal to William Rauch

William Rauch, 81, of the town of Wayne, died at 3 p. m. Tuesday, June 11, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, of injuries suffered last week Wednesday when his car left County Trunk Highway H (Wayne road) about a quarter mile west of Hwy. 45, about a half mile southwest of Kewaskum.

Rauch was driving west on Hwy. H when his car left the road on the right side and crashed into an elm tree. He suffered head and chest injuries in the accident. It is believed that he may have suffered an attack or blacked out before his car left the highway. The front end of the vehicle was damaged.

Rauch's death was attributed to complications resulting from injuries sustained in the mishap. His was the sixth fatality on Washington county highways in 1957.

The injured man was removed to the hospital in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

There were several other minor accidents in the area during the past week in which the damage to the vehicles was slight and there were no injuries.

Tuesday, June 11, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, of injuries suffered in an auto accident last Wednesday, June 5, near Kewaskum. The Rev. Donald Koehn will officiate and burial will take place in the Salem cemetery.

The body will be in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Friday until 11 a. m. Saturday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services.

Mr. Rauch, a retired farmer and bartender, was born on Dec. 31, 1875 in the town of Ashford, Fond du Lac county. He lived there for many years on a farm. Later he was a bartender for Mrs. Tillie Schaeffer in Kewaskum several years and for the past five years resided with his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Ewald Rauch, in Wayne township. He still tended bar part time in New Fane.

His marriage to the former Hannah Hasinger took place at Elmore and she predeceased him on Dec. 23, 1938. Mona Mertes to Rough It on Alaska Camping Trip

Miss Mona Mertes, 36, daughter of Mrs. Minnie Mertes, Kewaskum, and Miss Audrey Bartlett, 30, of 2700 S. Lineberger Terrace, South Milwaukee, both of whom teach in South Milwaukee, will leave Wednesday, June 19, on a motor trip to Alaska via the Alcan highway. Miss Mertes teaches girls' physical education and Miss Bartlett teaches art at the South Milwaukee school.

The two decided on the Alaskan trip, on which they expect to be gone about six weeks, when plans for Fullbright teaching scholarships in Australia fell through.

State Historymobile Coming Here Wed.

The famed Wisconsin Historymobile unit of the State Historical society will visit Kewaskum next Wednesday, June 19.

The Historymobile, on its fourth annual tour of the state, is carrying a new exhibit, "Mechanizing the Farm." Admission to the unit is free.

"Mechanizing the Farm" tells the story of a century of U. S. agriculture, particularly focusing on the Wisconsin scene, and the dramatic effect of the march of machines on the farm front.

Two themes dominate the traveling exhibit this year. One is a graphic account of the men and the machines that made America the agricultural giant it is today. The second is a chronological history of agriculture in Wisconsin, starting with early Indian methods, moving to the days when wheat was king of Wisconsin crops, touching on such brief episodes as the "Hops Craze" of the late 19th century, and rounding off with the story of Wisconsin's rise as American's dairyland.

The Historymobile contains scale working models, perfect in every detail, of farm implements that spell out the history of farm mechanization from early crude reapers to the big modern combines. The models are part of the historical society's famous Cyrus H. McCormick collection. They have been exhibited throughout the world.

Big Increases in State Taxes Will Be Avoided, Speaker Tells Kiwanis

"Substantial increases in state taxes apparently will be avoided for another two years," John P. Reynolds, assistant director of the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance told the Kewaskum Kiwanis club at its meeting Monday evening, June 10.

"Upward revision of estimates of state income tax yields, adjustments in state aid payments for schools, a probable one-cent increase in the cigarette tax and a reduction in the governor's spending requests will combine to balance the state's executive budget without increasing normal state income tax rates."

However, the alliance representative explained that re-enactment of the 20 percent surtax on individual income taxes is definitely part of the tax picture for the next two years.

"The 1957 Wisconsin legislature has been able to resolve what was once considered to be a serious tax problem," the speaker continued. "However, long-term projections indicate a tax and spending problem which will eventually have to be met by a substantial revision in our tax structure instead of piecemeal action."

Reynolds urged his audience to start looking now toward the day

when our elected representatives will have to make a decision involving drastic spending reductions, or substantial tax increases.

"The ultimate decision rests with 'we the people' who will determine the course of our future tax system through those whom we elect to govern for us."

These officials sure catch on

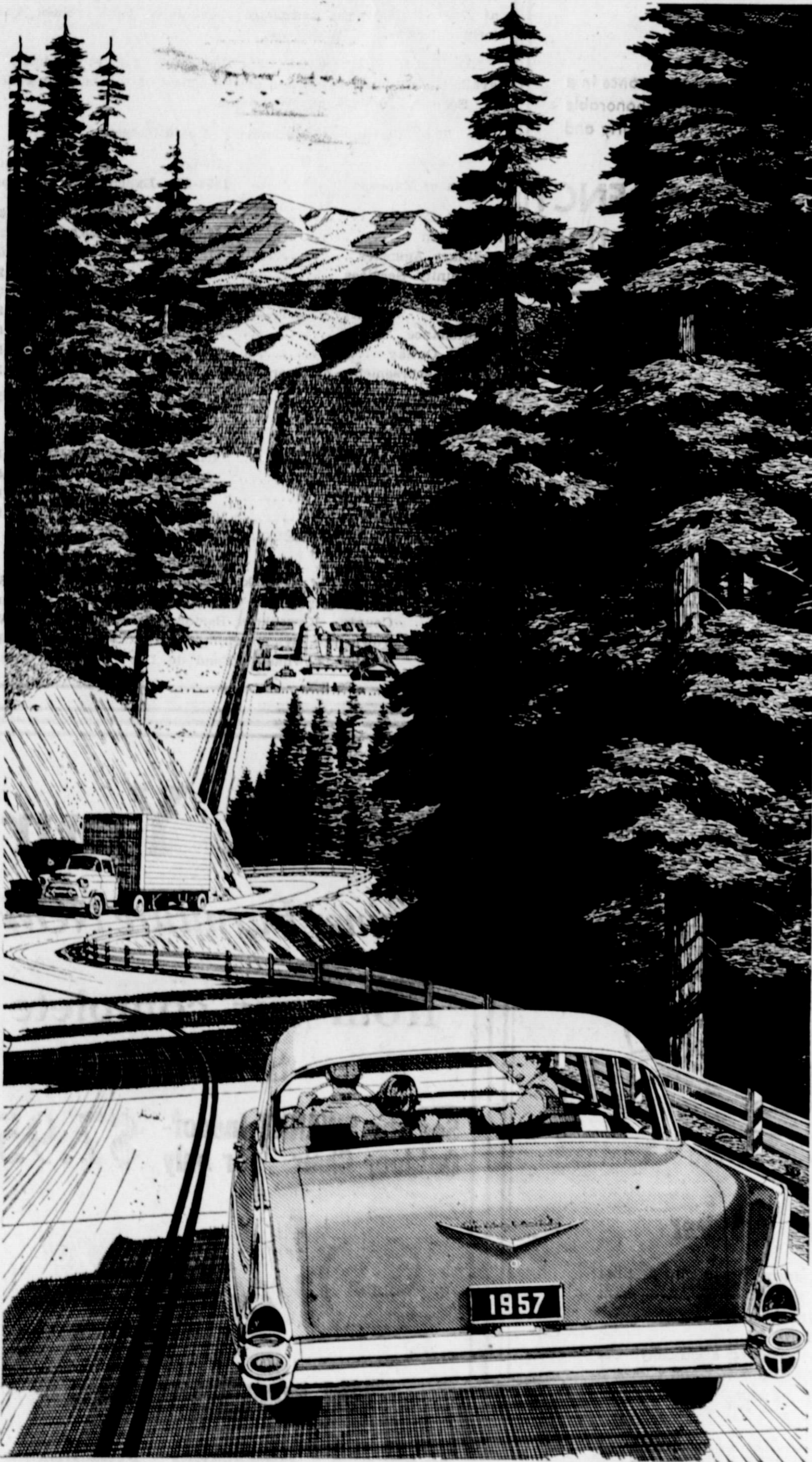
quick when they once get elected to high offices. "Tiny" Terlinden was elected Legion commander Monday night and left right away the day before on a three week vacation.

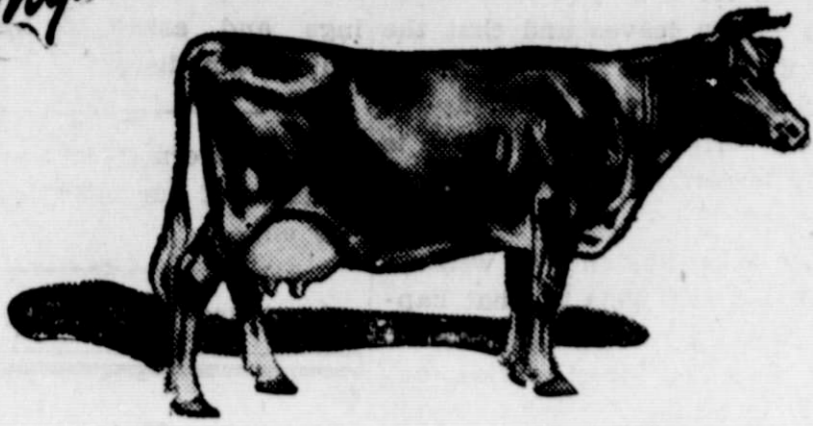

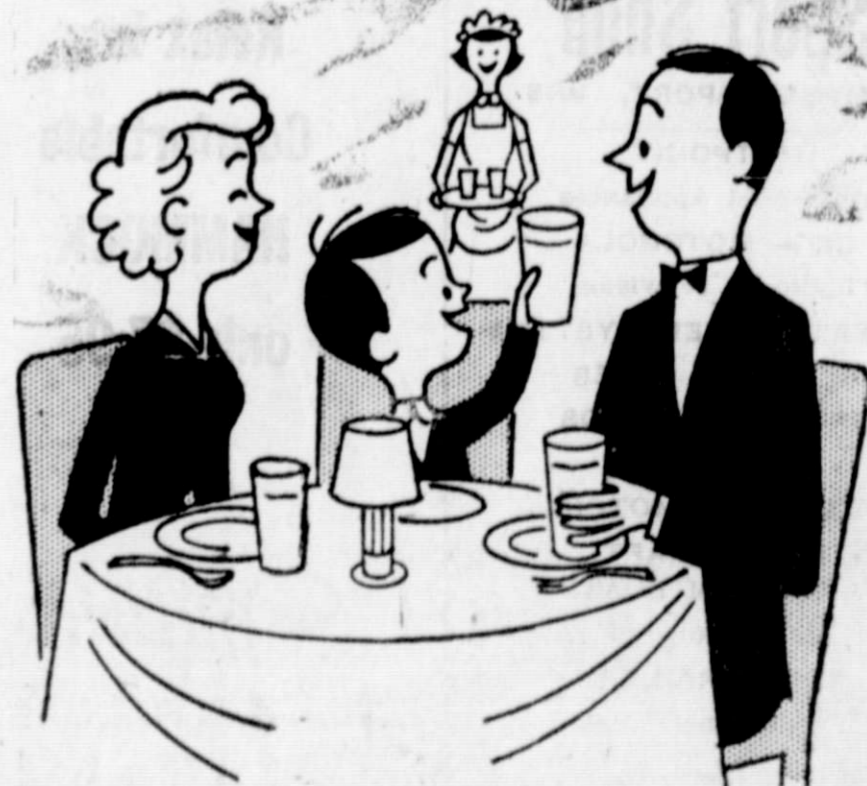



Don't be alarmed or throw in your hat and claim you have Dutch Elm disease when you see the branches on your big elm tree looking pretty brown and dead.

Because at the present time elm

trees are going through a process that is a little unique.

You may have noticed that as you look up into the branches of the elm tree you can see a browning effect. At first you may think that is brown leaves and that the tree is dying, but if you will look a little closer you will find that the browning effect up in the tree is actually brown seeds, and it is not the leaves.

This is caused by the dry weather we had last fall. This is what happens: when a tree goes into the winter in a dry or otherwise unhealthy condition, the following spring it attempts to produce seed prolifically, and thus produces a tremendous amount of seeds at the expense of leaf population in the tree.

As the tree overcomes the drought or other condition, during the spring the seeds will fall and the leaves will grow normally. In other words this whole condition should have taken care of itself within another month.

So make a good check before calling the Dutch Elm disease wardens, "Dotz" Hron, Walt Woesenberg or myself. It might be well to remember that these wardens are not paid

and that their time is a donation and a chance to aid in keeping our community beautiful.

Wardens throughout the country were appointed by the county agent after they attended several meetings and asked to help control Dutch Elm disease.

Chevs Protest Defeat At West Bend; Wallop Campbellsport, 11-1

The Kewaskum Ches broke even in two ball games the past week. Beaten at West Bend last Thursday night by a one sided 11-2 score, they reversed the outcome by drubbing last place Campbellsport there Sunday afternoon, 11-1. The team now has a record of 3 and 2 for the season.

Manager "Cisco" Backhaus filed a protest to the league on the West Bend setback, claiming that the league's authorized ball was not used during the last two or three innings of the game. Carl Kuss, loop director, said that he would appoint a 5-man protest board, made up of umpires and neutral managers, to rule on the protest.

The Lithias led throughout the contest. It was 1-0 and 3-0 during the early innings before the Chevs narrowed the gap to 3-2 in the 6th. West Bend added two runs in the 6th and six more in the 7th to pull away.

"Jiggs" Brunner, Lithia twirler who started the season with Kewaskum, ran his string of pitching scoreless inning to 21 before the Chevs scored twice in the 6th. Don Gumm pitched the last two frames without allowing a hit. John Tessar pitched a good game for the losers but had poor support in the field. He gave up only three hits but nine runs, seven of them unearned, before being relieved by Killy Honeck in the 7th. Tessar fanned 11 and

walked four, while Brunner struck out eight and issued two walks. Gumm whiffed two batters and Honeck one.

Pee Wee Johnson and Fritz Pfeiffer got two hits apiece for the Lithias. Augie Bilgo got two for four for the Chevs.

Young Dave Mertzig starred in Kewaskum's lopsided victory over Campbellsport Sunday. Dave pitched a five-hitter and also stood out with the bat, getting two hits and scoring three runs. Oppenorth and Tessar also collected two safeties each, Tessar's including a triple. Pitcher Fleischman got three of the Bells' five hits. Mertzig struck out three and walked only two batters. Besides Fleischman, Serwe and Jerk also worked on the mound for the losers. Between them they were tagged for 11 hits, fanned eight and walked five.

Kewaskum scored in six of the nine innings, their biggest frame being the 7th in which they pushed over three runs. The Bells' lone marker was scored in the 4th. The defeat was Campbellsport's 6th straight without a win.

This Sunday the Chevs travel to Saukville for a tough assignment. Saukville has won four in a row without a setback in the south section of the northern division and is tied for first with Port Washington.

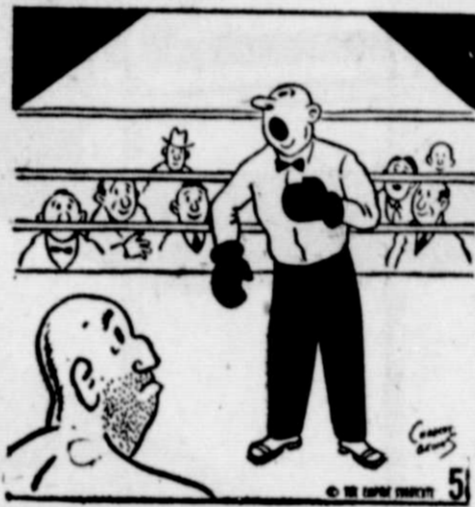

This post abided by the recommendation, but after discussion, it has been decided by this post to allow the flags to remain for several days according to the following rules set forth in Flag Law and Interpretations, which states thus: "The flags should be removed, beginning the next day; however, if the staffs have been firmly inserted into the ground or securely fastened to the cross or tombstone, so that they will not fall on the ground or be displayed with the staff at an angle other than vertical, the flags need not be removed for several days. To permit them to remain until they become soiled and torn shows flagrant disrespect to the flag."
