Annual Meeting and Budget Hearing of Kewaskum High School District No. 2 Held

Proposed Budget Of \$108,929.66 Presented Electors

BINGEN RE-ELECTED SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER, SPOERL TO SUCCEED ROSENHEIMER; 53 ELECTORS ATTEND

The budget hearing of Kewaskum Community High School, Jt. District No. 2 was called to order by Melvin Riley, director of the Board of Education, at 7:00 p. m. on Monday, June 24.

The proposed budget was read and explained to the electors.

It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Charles Miller that data pertaining to tax rates based on both the assessed and equalized valuations of the municipalities in the district, as shown in the brochure given to the electors, be published in the Kewaskum Statesman before the next annual meeting, using the assessed and equalized valuation figures of the previous year, if the figures of the current year are not available. Motion carried.

It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Mrs. Ralph Erdman that the proposed budget for operating expenses in the amount of \$108,929.66 be presented to the electors at the annual meeting. Motion carried.

It was moved by Marvin Martin and seconded by Walter Wesenberg to adjourn the budget hearing. Motion carried.

The annual meeting was called to order at 8:00 p. m. by Melvin Riley with 53 electors present.

Mr. Riley called for nominations for chairman of the meeting. L. N. Peterson nominated Melvin Riley. It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Marvin Martin that nominations be closed and that the clerk cast a unanimous ballot for Melvin Riley. Motion carried.

Minutes of the last annual meeting were read. It was moved by L. N. Peterson and seconded by Theo. R. Schmidt to adopt the minutes as read. Motion carried.

The auditor's report was given. It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Jos. Miller to dispense with the reading of the clerk's report. Motion carried.

It was moved by Marvin Martin and seconded by Walter Wesenberg to dispense with the reading of the treasurer's report. Motion carried.

A report on the building fund was given, and discussion was held concerning landscaping of the grounds. The following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLUTION NO. 1—Be it resolved that the 1958 annual meeting of this District be held on the last Monday in June the year 1958 at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

It was moved by L. N. Peterson and seconded by Charles Miller to adopt resolution No. 1. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 of the Kewaskum

Community High School that the school year be set at nine months or 180 days.

It was moved by Wayland Tessar and seconded by John Stelplflug to adopt resolution No. 2. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 3—Be it resolved that a tax be levied on all the taxable property of the District for operating expenses for the year commencing in 1957 and ending in 1958 in the amount of \$108,929.66.

It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Marvin Martin to adopt resolution No. 3. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 4—Be it resolved that the School Board of this district be and they are authorized to make such temporary loans as may be necessary to pay the operating expense until funds for the payment thereof are realized from the current tax levy.

It was moved by William Ruth and seconded by Mrs. Ralph Erdman to adopt resolution No. 4. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 5—Be it resolved that the salaries of the members of the school board of this district be fixed at \$200.00.

It was moved by Paul Landmann and seconded by Walter Wesenberg to adopt resolution No. 5. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 6—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 of the Kewaskum Community High School that there be furnished free text books to all high school students for the ensuing year, 1957-1958.

It was moved by Jos. Miller and seconded by August E. Koch to adopt resolution No. 6. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 7—Resolved, that the Kewaskum Community Union High School District Joint No. 2 of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne Townships, Washington County, Wisconsin, Ashford, Auburn Townships, Fond du Lac County, Wisconsin, hereby elects pursuant to the provisions of section 40.99 of the Wisconsin Statutes to be included in, and be subject to, the provisions of the Wisconsin Retirement Fund established by sections 66.90 to 66.919 inclusive of the Wisconsin Statutes and that the district provide prior service credits at rates equal to two times the rate of municipality credits for current service.

It was moved by James Reigle and seconded by Allen Tessar to adopt resolution No. 7. Motion carried.

Mr. Riley called for nominations for a school board member to succeed Henry B. Rosenheimer. Mr. Rosenheimer stated that he would not be a candidate for the office, and nominated Fred J. Spoerl. Paul Landmann nominated Mrs. Charles Miller, and James Reigle nominated Ned Sengpiel. It was moved by John Stelplflug and seconded by Wayland Tessar that nominations be closed. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION

BY VILLAGE BOARD APPROVING PLANS AND GRADES OF STREET OR HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT UNDERTAKEN BY THE STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION OF WISCONSIN

WHEREAS, the State Highway Commission of Wisconsin, hereinafter designated as the Commission, proposes the construction, reconstruction or improvement of a street or highway, identified as Fond du Lac Road project T 027-1 (12), hereinafter designated as the Project, and which Project is located and further described as follows:

The improvement of Fond du Lac Road from the south village limits to a point approximately 1150 feet south of the north village limits, and

WHEREAS, the Project or a part or parts thereof are within the corporate limits of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, hereinafter designated as the Village; and

WHEREAS, Plans for the Project have been prepared and are filed with the Village Clerk;

Now Therefore Be It Resolved by the Village Board:

That the Plans and grades as shown on the Plans for that portion of the Project lying within the corporate limits of the Village be and are hereby approved; and

That the Commission be and is hereby authorized to make such minor revisions in the Plans (except grades) during construction as may be necessary to meet latent and unforeseen conditions encountered during construction.

Carol Miller at 14th Girls' State

Carol Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Miller, Kewaskum, was among 343 girls who registered at Madison Tuesday at the opening of the 14th annual Badger Girls' State on the University of Wisconsin campus. Carol, who was selected by the high school faculty to represent Kewaskum, is sponsored by the local Kiwanis club and American Legion post.

The week long training in state government includes vigorous campaigns and elections at all levels of government in a state. The girls, all juniors in high school, are assigned to one of four imaginary cities—Ashby, Maple, Oakwood and Elm. The delegates then decide whether to become a member of the Federalist or Nationalist parties.

City elections were set for Wednesday and county nomination meetings and party platform meetings also were held that day. Campaigning for the county and state elections began Thursday, with general elections set for Friday. On Saturday the elected officers will plan their administrations and the state's assemblywomen will plan legislation.

State Supreme Court Justice Roland J. Steinle will swear in the state officials of Girls' State Saturday. On Monday, the Girls' State legislature will meet in the state capitol and hear a talk by Gov. Thomson.

uate work in school administration, and hopes to earn a Ph.D. The Rossmillers have been living in Rochester, Wis. for the past three years where Mr. Rossmiller has been superintendent of the Racine County Agricultural school.

Cooperative trout rearing ponds will be raising more than 160,000 trout this year for stocking in public waters, conservation department data indicates. Sportsmen's groups

operate the ponds. They get fingerling trout from the conservation department and rear them to at least legal size of six inches. A total of 33 such ponds are being operated, most of them in the west central

part of the state. Producing the fingerlings costs the state from four to five cents each. It costs the cooperating clubs about 15 cents each to bring the fish to legal size before stocking.

Asthma: A Serious Childhood Problem

Few people think of asthma as a serious problem of children. Yet bronchial asthma in about a third of all cases has its beginning in children before age ten. And this kind of asthma afflicts some two million Americans.

Bronchial asthma is the condition most people mean when they refer to asthma. It is an affliction which is believed to have a complex of causes — allergies, infections, hormones, emotions, and inheritance. Attacks are frequently brought on by springtime pollens and dusts. Usually they are marked by a near-suffocating shortness of breath. This difficulty in breathing is caused by contraction and clogging of the bronchi, the branches of the windpipe.

What, basically, causes asthma is still unknown. Much, however, has been learned about the course of the disease, its symptoms and their effect on children.

A study conducted by Dr. Francis M. Rackemann of Massachusetts General Hospital, for instance, showed that as many as seventy per cent of children — especially boys — who contract asthma outgrow it in their teens.

While symptoms exist, however, they should not be neglected. For, doctors have found, asthmatic children may become emotionally disturbed if the condition is allowed to progress to the point where they cannot keep up with their friends in school or at play.

While asthma cannot be cured by any known drug or treatment, its symptoms usually can be effectively controlled. For children, scientists have developed effective, easy-to-take medications such as



Tedral Pediatric Suspension. This drug combines three potent chemical agents which together relax the bronchi, reduce mucous congestion, and produce a mildly sedative effect. When used as a physician directs the drug usually gives children prompt yet sustained relief.

While asthma is indeed a complicated disease condition and much remains to be learned about it, the fact that doctors have the means to counter its ill effects on the young is an encouraging mark of progress against a condition that was once considered uncontrollable.

At the present time, the profits are approximately \$3000.00, a seemingly small sum to accomplish a seemingly formidable project.

During the past four years, several different agents have come before our Kiwanis Club at my request to acquaint our members with the problems relating to pool construction. In April of this year, Mr. Oscar Eggers, District State Sanitary Engineer, Fond du Lac, Wis., came to our village and reviewed my proposed plan for a swimming pool—50 ft. by 100 ft. with a 10-inch deep small tots pool at one end, a 12 ft. wide sun deck apron of concrete around the pool plus an 8 ft. high cyclone fence for complete safety enclosure. This pool would lie to the southeast corner of the present high school building and be attached there too so that the present girls and boys toilets and showers could be advantageously used with the complete sanction of our State Board of Health. Mr. Eggers explained further to our Kiwanis Club that it is not practical to ever hope to use the river, north of us, as a place to swim because raw sewage still is being dumped into the river and this will make the use of the river a serious health hazard, always.

Mr. A. R. Garnock, Architectural Engineer, Eau Claire, Wis., is earnestly building a similar pool at Columbus and Horicon, Wisconsin. A visit to their edges will be much more gratifying to each of you than I can hope to create by pen description. Also, try to see the new pool at Menomonee Falls just completed. Mr. Garnock also came to Kewaskum early in May and likewise advised our Kiwanis Club that the plan was excellent and sound in principle. It was Mr. Garnock who selected the site for locating this pool as it affords exposure to the sun all day long. This well-trained engineer also brought out the facts in regard to costs definitely. He stated that such a pool formed of concrete 50' x 100' including underwater lights, diving boards, complete adequate filtration

system and 12 foot concrete sun deck apron with cyclone fence enclosure for safety, should not cost more than \$50,000.00. Mr. Garnock agreed with Mr. Eggers, district state sanitary engineer, that the use of the present showers and toilets would be highly satisfactory—thus avoiding the \$25,000.00 added expense of a new bath house. Naturally, the construction of such a pool now would be so planned that the school board could, someday in the future, place a roof over the structure in accordance with State Board of Health rules and regulations, thus enabling the pool to serve for swimming lessons nine months of the year. Of course, all ages should be permitted the use of the pool according to schedules arranged by the management the year around.

Perhaps you folks don't know that over thirty years ago the University of Minnesota and many other schools forced all freshmen to learn to swim at once. Nowadays, very many high schools in various cities also require all freshmen to learn to swim during their freshman year. Why not have our school be ahead of the others in case this requirement should be enacted here? It may save a life—your own.

This plan to build a swimming pool can be accomplished COMPLETELY TAX FREE not one cent of taxation needed to build this pool complete ready to use, but we surely will need hundreds of live and active RIP SNORTERS who will work like beavers to raise money in various ways—each group to their own specialty. This entire project would be paid for in two years or less, I do believe.

A large saving could be effected by the donation of labor to the job, perhaps, even as much as a \$10,000.00 saving would be possible.

Although no definite campaign to solicit donations should be made, I do believe it is only fair to state that any one who wishes to give our swimming pool fund a welcome forward push, may do so knowing that such a gift would be a tax deduction.

No monies should be sent now, but I would welcome heartily a letter from all of you stating your views, for or against, and also your willingness to donate labor or money to aid the project. Send your letter to me marked personal and no one will have their confidence betrayed, but at the same time your response will very materially aid the future planning for this grand

project.

All of you RIP SNORTERS should attend the elementary school board meeting to be held on Monday evening, July 8 at 8 p. m. at the present high school. Help our school board decide to donate the plot of ground needed and also the use of toilets and showers as outlined.

You may be certain that I deeply regret that I cannot attend this meeting, but I have arranged for my spokesman to be there in my behalf and he will need your support.

The fore-going facts have been published so that all of our community might know what has been done and what can be done, God willing, if we but try.
