Milwaukee Firm's \$167,161.25 Bid Accepted for Highway 45 Improvement in Kewaskum

Work on Street Project to Begin About July 20

W. J. LAZYNSKI, INC. EXPECTS TO HAVE WORK COMPLETED EARLY IN SEPTEMBER

The lowest bid of \$167,161.25 submitted by the W. J. Lazynski, Inc. firm of Milwaukee, was accepted at Madison Tuesday for the Highway 45 (Fond du Lac ave.) improvement project in Kewaskum. The bids were opened and read at the Park Hotel at 9:30 a. m.

Present from Kewaskum when the bids were opened were Village President James Reigle and Trustees Joe Eberle and Carl Schaefer. They were informed by the contractor that work, on the new road through the village will be started very soon, on or about July 20. With favorable weather, they expect to have the project completed by Sept. 1 or shortly thereafter.

Fifteen per cent of the cost of the construction of the new highway will be paid by the village of Kewaskum while the state pays the balance.

The bridegroom is a graduate of Marquette School of Engineering. He and his bride will make their home in Milwaukee.

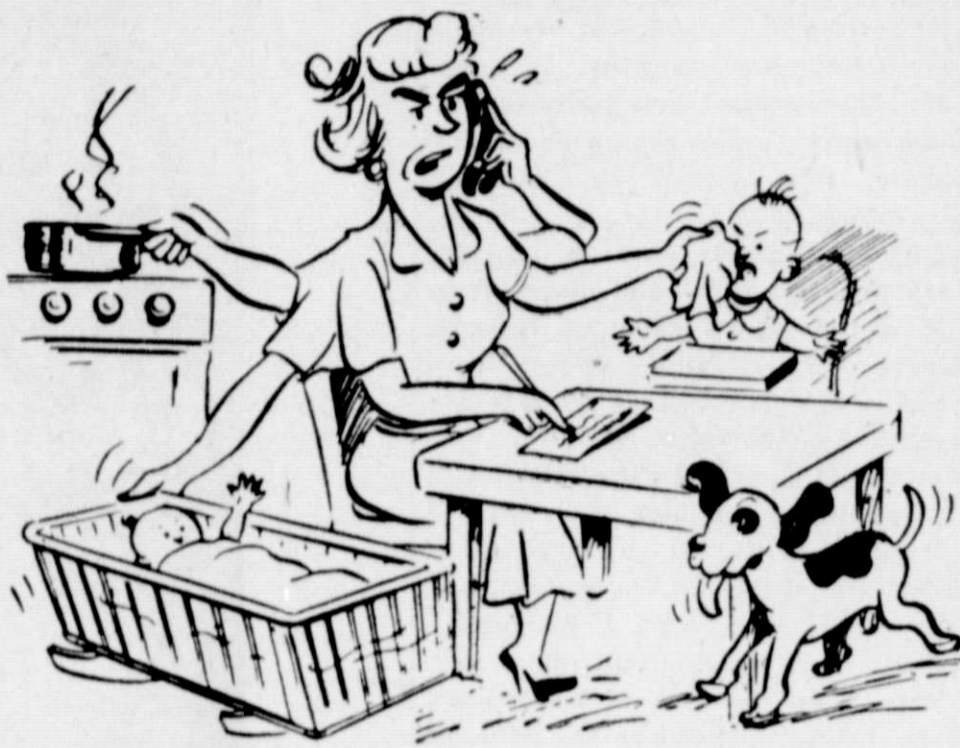

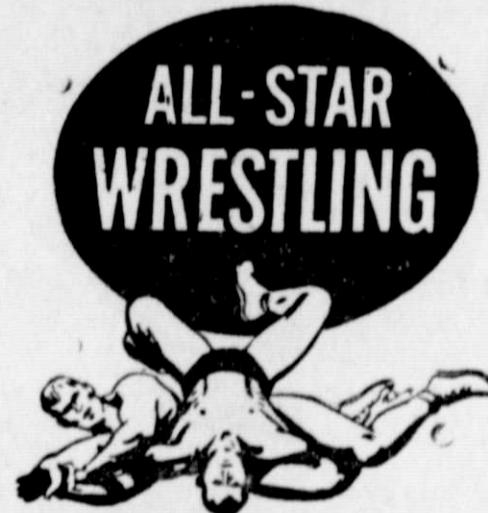

11, 1908, where he grew up and attended schools. He also attended the Milwaukee School of Engineering and was employed in Milwaukee several years before returning to West Bend.

Burckhardt formed a partnership with Victor Thelen in the electrical wiring business at West Bend in 1932 under the name of Burckhardt and Thelen. The partnerships continued until 1936 when Burckhardt bought out the partnership and ran the business himself. He purchased the Geib hotel on Apr. 1, 1948 and took over operation of the Kewaskum store a little over two years ago.

Mr. Burckhardt was married to Ingelborg Hopland on Dec. 29, 1939. Surviving, together with his widow, are a son, William A. Burckhardt, III; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. William H. Burckhardt Sr. of West Bend; a sister, Mrs. Alfred Lenz of R. 2, Campbellsport, and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Ellen Bloom of Hazelhurst and West Bend.

He was a member of the board of electrical examiners, the Loyal Order of Moose, Lodge 1398, West Bend Businessmen association and West Bend Country club.

½ cup melted butter

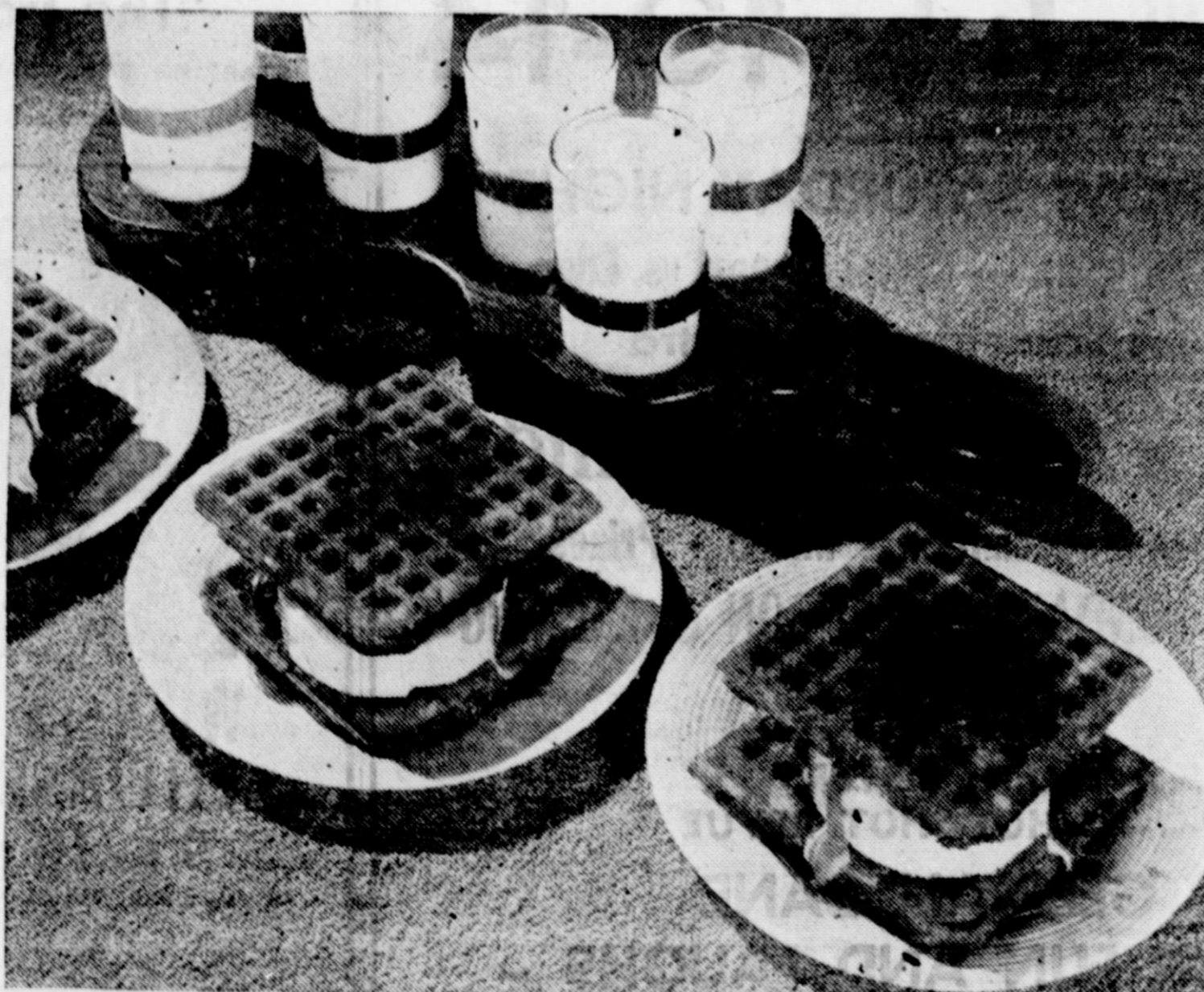
Place all ingredients in a bowl and beat with a rotary beater until fairly smooth. Bake on a hot waffle iron until steaming stops. Serve at once.
