

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Harvesting of oats and other grains (threshing time) is in full swing and this means the summer season is also waning, as much as we regret to think of it. The days getting shorter are becoming noticeable. Here it is August and only a month from Labor Day and the start of school again. But summer is still definitely with us as the weather the past week proved. It was in the high 80's every day.

Driving south of West Bend on the way home from the Braves twin bill Sunday evening and again on the way to the county fair later in the evening we were alarmed by the strong odor of gas in the car.
