Village Borrows \$75,000 for Fond du Lac Ave. Construction

Accept Steiner Bid of \$17,567 for Lighting System

Adjourned Regular Meeting
July 22, 1957

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in an adjourned regular meeting at 8:00 o'clock P. M. with President James D. Reigle presiding. The following trustees were present: Carl F. Schaefer, Arvin Merwin, Joe Eberle, Marvin Schaefer, Wayland Tessar and John Stellpflug.

Trustee John G. Stellpflug then moved the adoption of the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, The Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin (hereinafter called the 'Village'), is presently in need of funds aggregating \$75,000.00 for the respective purposes and in the respective amounts as follows:

PURPOSE	AMOUNT
Street repair and reconstruction	\$75,000.00
Total	\$75,000.00

and "WHEREAS, the Village Board of the Village deems it necessary and in the best interests of the Village that, pursuant to the provisions of Section 67.12 (12) Wisconsin Statutes, the sum of \$75,000.00 be borrowed upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth for the respective uses and purposes hereinabove stated:

"NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by this Village Board, that for the respective uses and purposes hereinabove set forth the Village President and Village Clerk of the Village be and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed, pursuant to Section 67.12 (12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow from First National Bank of Milwaukee, Milwaukee, Wisconsin (hereinafter collectively called the "Lender"), the aggregate sum of \$75,000.00, and, to evidence such indebtedness, said Village President and Village Clerk shall make, execute and deliver to the Lender for and on behalf of the Village one (1) promissory note of the Village payable to the order of the Lender in the principal amounts, bearing interest computed at the rate of 3 1/2% per annum payable on the respective dates and maturing (in installments) as follows:

Principal Amount—\$75,000.00
Interest Payment Dates—23 day of July 1958 through 1967
Maturity Date (Amount and Dates of Installment Maturities)—\$7,500.00 on July 23 in each of the years 1958 through 1967

Which said note shall be in substantially the following form: (Copy of this PROMISSORY NOTE on file at the Village Hall.)

"BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in order to provide for the collection of a direct annual tax sufficient to pay the interest and the principal of said promissory note as they become due and payable, there be and hereby is levied upon all the taxable property located within the Village a direct annual

Work Is Under Way on Hwy. 45 Project Here

Work on the reconstruction of Hwy. 45 (Fond du Lac ave.) through the village of Kewaskum was begun last Friday by W. J. Lazynski, Inc. of Milwaukee, contractor for the project, and the Joe Jaeger Excavating Co. of West Bend, sub-contractors.

Fond du Lac ave. is being torn up from the south village limits as far as Miller's warehouse on the north end, in preparation for paving, construction work and widening on the highway as well as new sidewalk, curb and gutter, and luminous, mercury vapor street lamps.

Most of the old concrete road and much of the sidewalk has already been broken up and removed. A tree cutting crew has also cut down and removed most of the trees which lined both sides of the streets. Power and light poles and lines have been taken down and moved to the middle of the block. Telephone poles and lines are also being removed at present.

Detour routes are provided at both the north and south ends of the village to permit motorists to enter and leave Kewaskum to transact their business. Another temporary road has been laid adjacent to the railroad tracks from Main to Elm st. to allow residents of Prospect ave., Clinton and Elm sts. to get through as well as emergency vehicles.

A detour route for through traffic on Hwy. 45 is also provided on a town road west of the village.

The contract, as approved by Gov. Vernon Thomson for construction work on the Kewaskum project calls for grading, base course and concrete pavement on .27 of a mile of U. S. Hwy. 45 (Fond du Lac road). Completion of the project is called for in 110 calendar days at a total estimated cost of \$195,000 with \$150,600 to be provided by the state urban fund and \$44,400 by the village of Kewaskum.

The Kewaskum firemen's ambulance had four calls the past week and they were of a wide variety.

A car driven by Charles F. Schwebke, Milwaukee, went out of control on a curve and went into a ditch on Hwy. 67 in the town of Osceola, near Long lake, at about 11:15 p. m. Sunday, Schwebke, 30, was taken to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, in the Fond du Lac county ambulance. A passenger in the car, John P. Briefe, 27, 2928 W. Atkinson ave., Milwaukee, was removed to the hospital in the Kewaskum ambulance.

Heavy damage was caused to Schwebke's car. He and Briefe received painful facial injuries for which they were treated at the hospital.

A Milwaukee youth, Tom Haas, 2549 N. 38th st., escaped drowning at Forest lake Saturday afternoon when friends in his party managed to pull him to safety after noticing his trouble. Upon being revived, Haas complained of pains in his neck and was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum ambulance.

Fire Destroys Barn, Acres of Grass Thursday

A barn and about 20 acres of grass were destroyed by fire on a state owned farm in the Kettle Moraine forest area located about two miles east of Kewaskum at the junction of Hwy. 28 and Kettle Moraine drive on Thursday afternoon. The blaze was discovered at about 4:30 p. m. and the loss was estimated at \$6,000.

The farm was formerly owned by Donald Quass and family, who still own and occupy the house. The state purchased the land from Quass.

The dry barn, which was reported to be empty, was destroyed rapidly. When Kewaskum firemen arrived the structure had already burned to the foundation.

The fire spread from the barn through dry grass and it was estimated that about 20 acres burned over before the blaze, fanned by a wind, was checked. A state forest fire fighting crew from Mauthe lake also fought the flames. Forest supervisor Clyde Smith of Mauthe lake said that 100 to 1,000 acres of grass and forest might have been destroyed had the blaze spread out of control. Roads surrounding the farm helped check the progress of the flames.

The fire was discovered by a passing motorist. There was no phone at the Quass home and he drove into Kewaskum to summon firemen. Kewaskum firemen remained at the scene until 6 p. m.

Mrs. Peter Geib Died on Friday

Mrs. Peter Geib, 79, nee Mathilda Mayer, 413 Jefferson st., Barton, who has two daughters residing in the Kewaskum area, died at her home at 10:30 p. m. Friday, Aug. 9. Her death was unexpected although she had been ailing about a year.

She was born at Newburg on May 26, 1878 and married Mr. Geib there on Nov. 22, 1898. The couple resided in Chicago for a short time after their marriage and then came back to this area. In November, 1935, they moved to Wallace lake where they operated a farm until moving to Barton in February of this year.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday morning at 9:30 a. m. at St. Mary's church, Barton, the Rev. O. Ulrich officiating. Burial was in Holy Trinity cemetery, Newburg.

Chevs Tip Random Lake; League Leading West Bend Here Sunday Night

The Kewaskum Chevrolets knocked off Random Lake for the second time this season in a night game here last Thursday, 8-3. The win gave the Chevs a firmer grip on third place. They are now 1½ games ahead of fourth place Random and only one game behind second place Sheboygan.

Dave Mertzig of Kewaskum and Hansen of the Lakers tangled in a dandy pitching duel. Both twirlers were hit quite freely but each had a large number of strikeouts and walked few batters. Random out-hit the Chevs, 11 to 9, but Kewaskum got theirs when they counted while the visitors were checked by Mertzig in the clutches. Mertzig struck out 14 hitters and walked only 2 for a very fine performance. Hansen did almost as well, whiffing 13 and passing but 4.

Dave struck out the side in the 1st and 6th innings and in 3 other frames he fanned 2 batters. He showed some real clutch pitching in the 6th inning when the first 2 batters got hits and the next 3 swingers all went down on strikes without a run scoring.

The Chevs pushed over 3 runs in the 1st inning without a hit on 2 walks, 3 errors and 4 stolen bases. They iced the victory in the 4th with 2 more runs on Mertzig's single, Bob Dreher's double and an error. Hits by Fuzzy Dreher and Herb Fisher in the 5th made it 6-2. To safeguard their lead, the winners made a couple more in the 6th on singles by Bud Korth, Bob Dreher and John Tessar. The losers scored a single run in each of the 2nd, 3rd and 4th frames.

Bob Dreher's single and double paced Kewaskum's hitting. Klotz

and Isseleman each connected twice for Random Lake.

On Thursday night of this week the Chevs were scheduled to play a benefit exhibition tilt with Long Lake of the Rock River loop. The biggest attraction of the season is on tap this Sunday when Kewaskum hosts the league leading West Bend Lithias in a night game starting at 8 p. m. The Chevs would be right in the running for first place with an upset win over the Lithias but a defeat will drop them out of contention. West Bend also plays second place Sheboygan

Saturday night and the results of this week end's games will determine much in the standings. Don't miss this important contest here Sunday night. And next Thursday night, Aug. 23, another home game will be played against Plymouth, the fifth place team.

to produce the aggregate sum of \$9,862.50.

For the year 1959, a tax sufficient to produce the aggregate sum of \$9,600.00.

For the year 1960, a tax sufficient to produce the aggregate sum of \$9,337.50.

For the year 1961, a tax sufficient to produce the aggregate sum of \$9,075.00.

For the year 1962, a tax sufficient to produce the aggregate sum of \$8,812.50.

For the year 1963, a tax sufficient to produce the aggregate sum of \$8,550.00.

For the year 1964, a tax sufficient to produce the aggregate sum of \$8,287.50.

For the year 1965, a tax sufficient to produce the aggregate sum of \$8,025.00.

For the year 1966, a tax sufficient to produce the aggregate sum of \$7,762.50.

In the event that the Village subsequently exercises its right and option to prepay any or all of the unpaid principal and interest of said promissory note then no such direct annual tax shall be levied for the prepayments so made and the amount of direct annual tax hereinabove levied shall be reduced accordingly for the year or years with respect to which said note were prepaid by the prepayment or

prepayments.

In each of said years the direct annual tax hereinabove levied shall be carried into the tax rolls each year and shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the Village for such years are collected. So long as any part of the principal or interest on said promissory note remains unpaid, the taxes hereinabove levied shall be and continue irrepealable, and the proceeds of said taxes shall be segregated in a special fund and used solely for the payment of the principal of and interest on said promissory note; and "BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the promissory note hereinabove authorized shall be dated July 23, 1957, shall be executed as soon as may be after the adoption of this resolution; and shall be delivered to the Lender upon receipt of the principal amount of the loan evidenced thereby."

Trustee Carl F. Schaefer seconded said resolution and, upon vote being taken, all of the trustees of the Village voted in favor of the adoption of said resolution.

The next order of business was the opening of bids for a Street Lighting System on Fond du Lac Ave.

Six bids were submitted prior to the meeting. The chair then asked if any one else wished to submit a bid. Since no one so indicated, the meeting was turned over to Mr. Fred Gensch of the McMahon En-

gineering Co. for the formal opening and public reading of said bids. Bids were tabulated as follows:

Steiner Electric—Item 1 Series System—\$16,148.00; Item 2 Multiple System—\$17,567.00; Selective Item 2" empty transite conduct per ft.—\$0.69.

Mullen Electric Co.—Item 1 Series System—\$18,668.00; Item 2 Multiple System—\$18,888.00; Selective Item 2" empty transite conduct per ft.—\$0.69.

Household Utilities, Inc.—Item 1 Series System—\$21,534.00; Item 2 Multiple System—\$21,905.00; Selective Item 2" empty transite conduct per ft.—\$1.81.

Oconto Electric—Item 1 Series System—\$21,900.00; Item 2 Multiple System—\$22,700.00; Selective Item 2" empty transite conduct per ft.—\$0.38.

National Electric Service—Item 1 Series System—\$22,888.00; Item 2 Multiple System—\$23,964.00; Selective Item 2" empty transite conduct per ft.—\$0.83.

Ace Electric—Item 1 Series System—\$24,875.00; Item 2 Multiple System—\$27,615.00; Selective Item 2" empty transite conduct per ft.—\$0.70.

Upon advice of the Village Attorney, the Board did not take immediate action on the bids and advised all bidders that they wished to give the engineering firm time to verify all items in the various bids. There being no further business, the Board, upon motion of J. Stell-

plug, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried, adjourned subject to call.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in an adjourned meeting with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present except Trustee Tessar.

The bids as tabulated, for the proposed Fond du Lac Ave. Street Lighting were reviewed. The Board decided, upon recommendation of the Village engineering firm that a Multiple system, as proposed under proposal No. 2 of the specifications, shall be installed and shall include

the following: American Concrete Standards, Westinghouse, Westinghouse Standard luminares, Westinghouse Standard Mercury Vapor Lamps, Johns-Manville Transite duct and all other equipment specified shall be Westinghouse. It was also decided that the festoon lighting circuit and conduct shall be excluded.

It was moved by Trustee J. Eberle that the bid of Steiner Electric, West Bend, in the amount of \$17,567.00 shall be accepted because it was the lowest and seemed to be the most advantageous. This motion was seconded by Trustee A. Merwin and upon roll call vote all members present voting "aye," the motion was so adopted.

There being no further business, the Board, upon motion made, seconded and duly carried, adjourned subject to call.

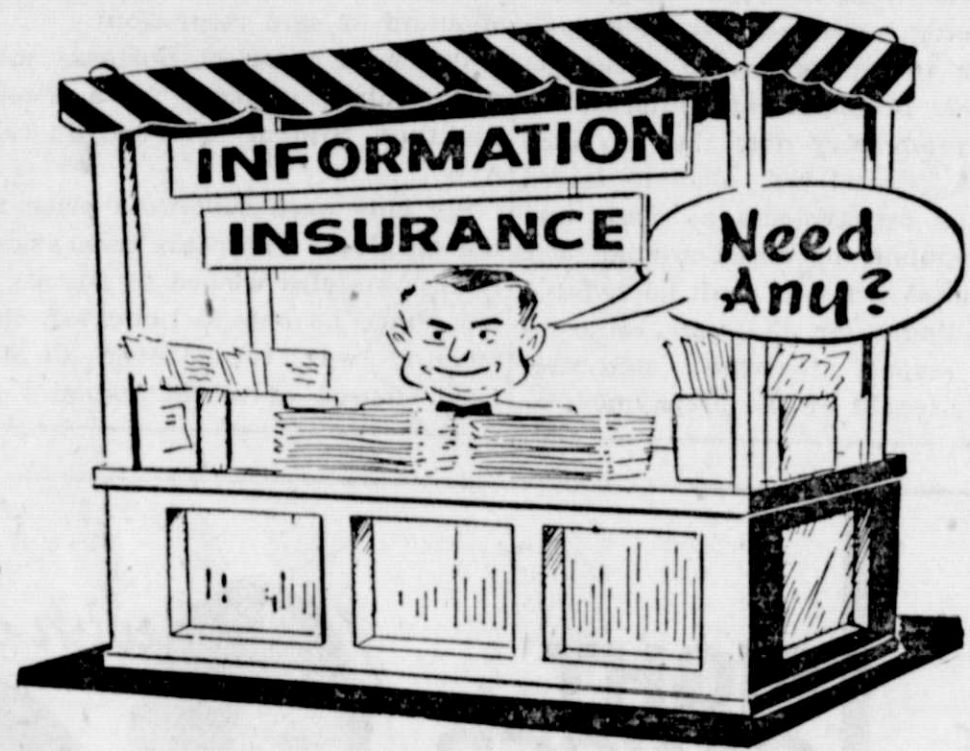

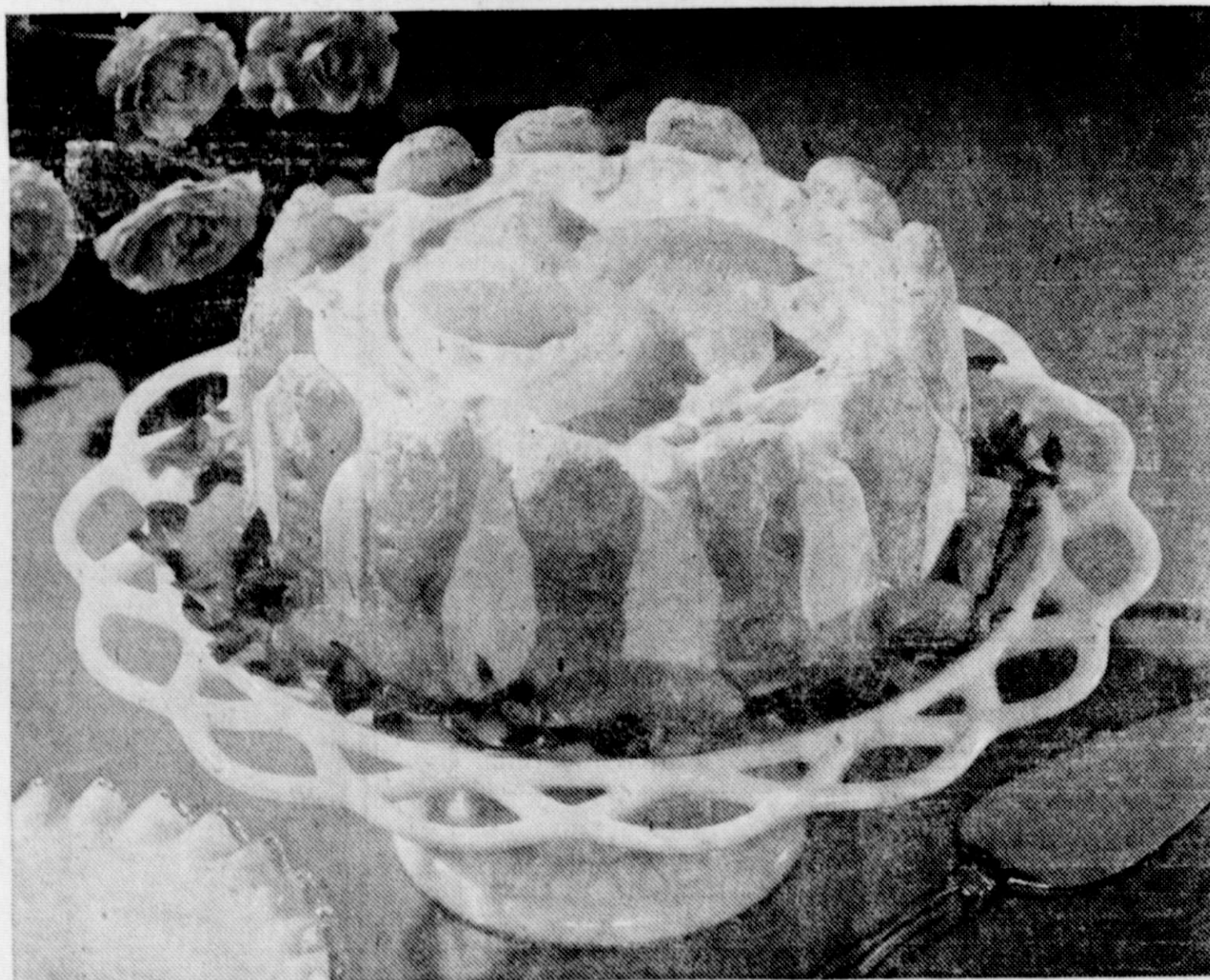

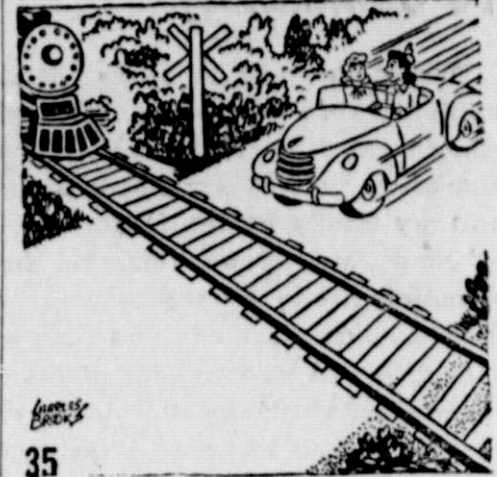

- Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add unthawed orange concentrate, lemon juice, sugar and grated rind. Let stand until the mixture thickens (not too stiff.)

Place ice water in small mixer bowl, add nonfat dry milk, beat until mixture stands in stiff peaks. Add gelatin mixture. Beat until fluffy. (If mixture looks too thin, cool in refrigerator for about 20 minutes.) Arrange split lady fingers vertically around 8" spring form pan. Pour in the slightly thickened orange mixture. Chill for several hours. Wedges or strips of sponge cake may be used in place of lady fingers, and for variations this may be made in an oblong dish or refrigerator tray, or in sherbet glasses.
