Heinemann Creameries, Inc. Plant in Kewaskum Is Sold

Omaha Buyer Plans Expansion, Ice Cream Plant Here

SALE ALSO INCLUDES PLANT
AT JACKSON, MILWAUKEE
OFFICES AND ROUTES

Sale of the William H. Heinemann Creameries, Inc. to the Fairmont Foods Co. of Omaha, Neb. was announced Saturday by John A. Robins, president of Fairmont Foods, and confirmed by Heinemann. The price was not disclosed.

Sale of the Heinemann Creameries, according to William H. Heinemann, president, includes Heinemann pasteurizing, bottling and cottage cheese plants at Jackson and Kewaskum, Wis., as well as offices at 1712 E. Capitol drive in Milwaukee and Heinemann routes for distribution under the Heinemann-Kewaskum brand name in the Milwaukee, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac and Oshkosh areas. The business in the Milwaukee metropolitan area is mostly a wholesale undertaking through store outlets.

Charles Geiger, manager of the Kewaskum plant, on Monday also confirmed the sale of the creameries and looked for expansion of the local plant as a result of the sale.

Robins, president of the Fairmont purchasing firm, said it would expand and improve operations throughout southern and central Wisconsin. This program, according to Robins, will include an ice cream plant at Kewaskum. He also said that no changes were contemplated in the present personnel.

The Fairmont Co., which has a plant at Green Bay, processes and distributes dairy products, ice cream, poultry and frozen and specialty foods in 32 states east of the Rocky Mountains.

Heinemann came to Milwaukee from Chicago and established the Heinemann Bakeries in 1938, and later formed the Heinemann Creameries. He sold the bakery business in 1953.

A native of the town of Wayne, he was born there on Dec. 27, 1896, and grew up in that township. He learned the cheesemaker's trade and followed it until 1919 when he took over the Petri farm in Wayne. He operated the farm until 1955 when he moved to West Bend to make his home.

Mr. Petri's marriage to the former Sophia Amerling took place in Holy Angels church, West Bend, on Sept. 26, 1918. OPEN AT 9 A. M.

At the special election on Tuesday, Aug. 27, to elect a successor to the late Senator Joseph McCarthy, a light vote is expected throughout the state, even though one of the state's highest political offices is to be filled. The off-season, voting, together with the summer vacation season, are expected to hold down the vote.

As in the primary election last month, Kewaskum polls will open at 9 a. m. and remain open until 6 p. m., a half hour later than heretofore. This results from a new village ordinance to keep the polls open a half hour later. Voting will again be done in the municipal building.

Campbellsport to Haul Garbage to Local Plant

At a recent meeting of the Campbellsport village board, it was decided to complete plans with the village of Kewaskum and begin to haul garbage to the local plant for disposal starting on Sept. 1. This action was taken by the Campbellsport board on receipt of a communication from the Kewaskum board which was read at the meeting.

The hauling will necessitate two separate pickups by Campbellsport village employees but will eliminate spoiled foodstuffs and wastes from being dumped at the Campbellsport dump. Having the garbage burned at Kewaskum is expected to eliminate the rat infestation and strong odors at that village's dump.

Kewaskum has agreed to dispose of Campbellsport's garbage in the local incinerator for a price of \$5.50 per load and it is estimated that about six loads a week will be trucked here.

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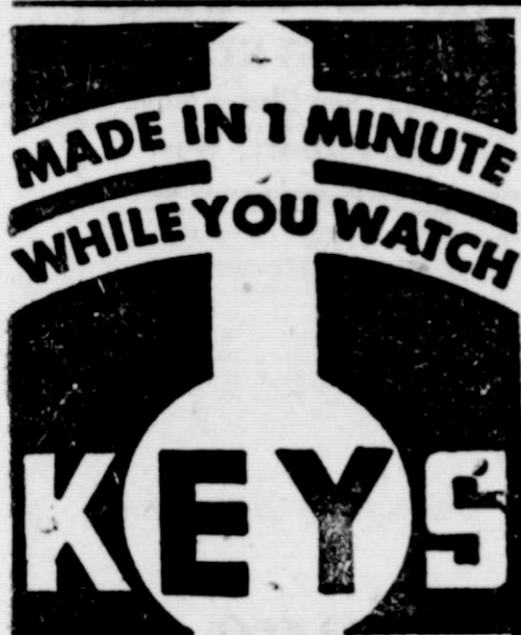

Extra Effort Required To Achieve Cancer Goal

Washington county, with a little extra effort on the part of its residents, can achieve its cancer campaign goal for 1957. If those people who have not yet responded to the 1957 appeal will do so today, the campaign will be a success. Thomas J. Kenny, Washington county campaign chairman, urged that people make use of the return envelopes received by all residents of the county on July 30, and mail their contributions to local village and town chairmen. To receive credit for 1957 contributions must be received by Aug. 31.

Pointing out that the support of the work of the American Cancer society is a responsibility of every community throughout the nation, Kenny said that every area has its specific goal, each of which must be realized to assure a continuation of the vital research and educational phases of the cancer fight. If one county here, another there, and still another elsewhere, fails to reach its goal, then the national campaign stands in danger of failing, and national activities must necessarily be curtailed.

With cancer now striking 1 out of every 4 of our citizens, men, wo-

men and children alike, and only 1 out of 3 with cancer being saved, Kenny said he was certain it was not necessary to call attention to the importance of continued, even expanded, activity in the battle to solve the riddles of cancer.

"We are certain that Washington county will be among those which will successfully complete its cancer campaign if those who have not yet made their contributions will do so today. If each of us will do our part, we will not have to report a failure in our efforts to back up the research experts and educational leaders who are in the forefront of the fight on cancer," Kenny concluded.

Those not having a return envelope may send their contributions to American Cancer Society, Security Building, West Bend, Wis. Proper credit to the various villages and towns will be given for contributions so received.

The research attack against cancer is mounting. In 1945 only about a million dollars was appropriated annually for cancer research. This year, there will be more than \$50,000,000 available, the American Cancer society says.

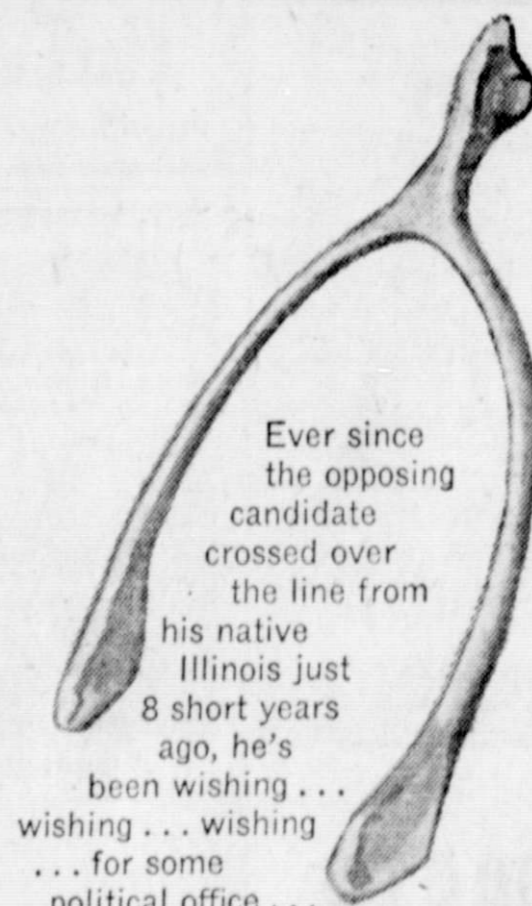

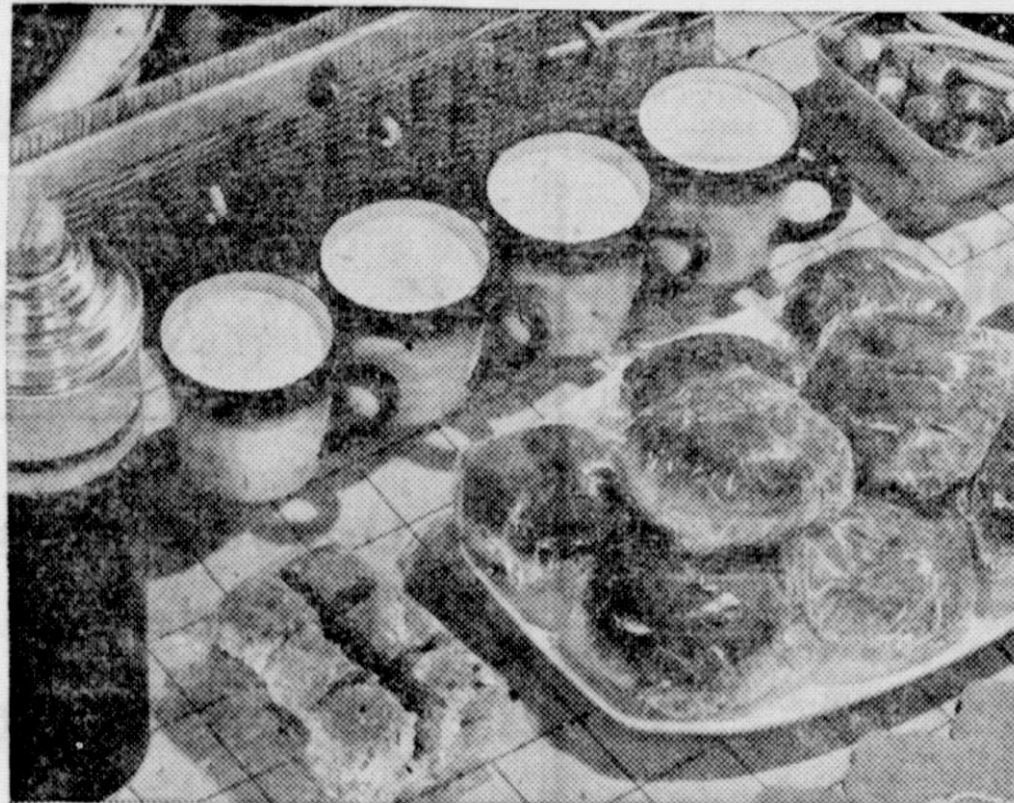

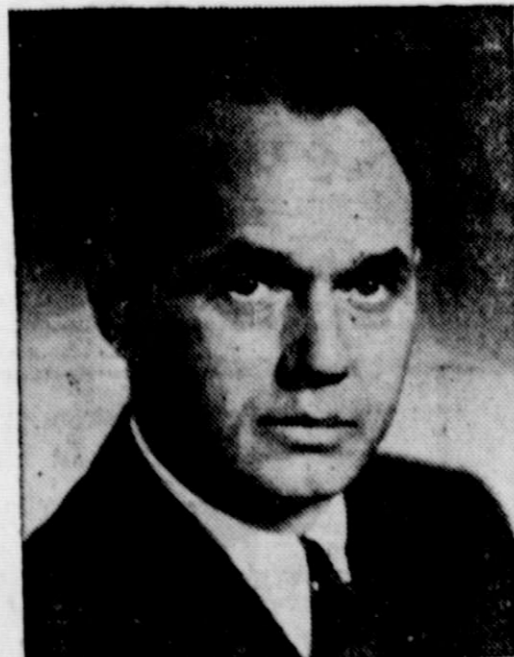
