## Plan Huge Street Opening Celebration Here Oct. 11-12

### Plan Many Festivities, Prominent Officials to Attend Two-Day Event

**ARRANGING COMMUNITY FISH FRY, BANDS, QUEEN CONTEST, PARADE, RIBBON CUTTING, ACTS, STREET DANCING, OTHER FEATURES**

A street opening committee has been formed to plan and make arrangements for what undoubtedly is going to prove to be one of the largest gatherings of people in Kewaskum's history. This will be a two-day celebration devoted to festivities proclaiming the opening of the new Hwy. 45 through Kewaskum.

Several meetings have already been held by the large committee and at the latest one held Wednesday night the dates were set for the celebration. It will be held on Friday evening and all-day Saturday, Oct. 11 and 12. At first it was planned to include Sunday and make it a three-day event but at the meeting the committee decided against extending it over a three-day period.

Asked to co-operate in putting on the affair are the Kiwanis club, American Legion, firemen, scouts, clubs, organizations, businessmen, industries and others, all of whom are welcome to participate. To be a success this should be a 100% community project. Thousands of people from a radius of many miles must be attracted and entertained.

Tentative plans to date call for the celebration to begin at 4:30 p. m. on Friday, Oct. 11, with a big community fish fry on the street. There will also be bratwurst, hamburger and three or four refreshment stands in operation. At dark a street lighting ceremony will be held when the new mercury-vapor lights will be turned on for the first time. Two or three small clown bands will circulate the streets and business places. The high school band will also play and carnival rides will be in operation. A Miss Kewaskum queen will be named Friday night and it is hoped to have Miss Wisconsin present to announce and crown the queen and her court. The queen will be presented with a valuable wrist watch and other prizes.

Saturday's festivities will start off at 10 o'clock in the morning which will be devoted to children's activities. It is planned to have pony rides, Curtiss candy hunt, a variety of races and contests for the children. If possible someone from the Milwaukee Braves organization will be present.

In the afternoon a kiddies' parade and pet show will begin at 1 p. m. During the afternoon a square dancing exhibition will go on at 3 p. m. and there will be professional acts and other activities. More acts will be staged at 7 p. m., followed by the ribbon cutting ceremony and program opening the new road. It is hoped to have Governor Vernon Thomson present for this ceremony along with prominent state, county, highway and local officials. The celebration will close

Saturday night with a gala street dance with a name band furnishing the music.

Buttons promoting the celebration will be ordered and purchasers are asked to wear them at all times. These buttons will be distributed to all high school girls and others of age and the ones who sell the most will rank highest in the queen contest. All of the above plans are still tentative and may be changed according to what arrangements can be made.

On Thursday, Friday and Saturday local merchants will hold special street opening sales and the advertising should start weeks ahead of the dates. More on this and information about the celebration will be told from week to week so watch for announcements in this paper.

The next meeting of the committee will be held next Tuesday evening at 8 p. m. at the Legion clubhouse and all committeemen are urged to attend. Others interested in participating are also welcome.

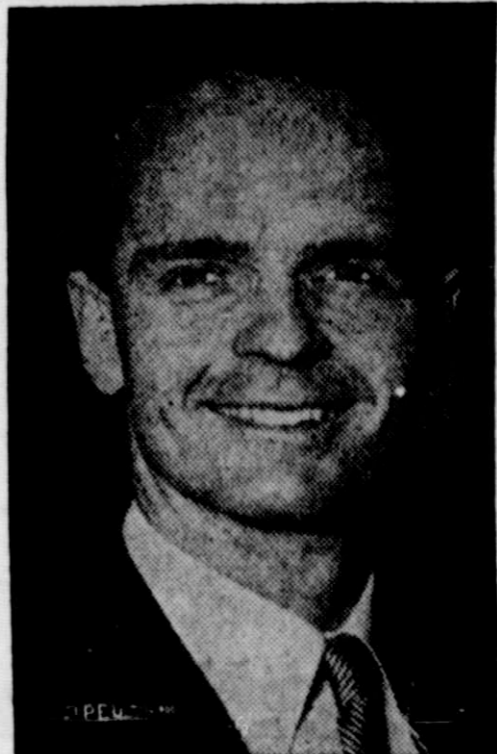

## Proxmire Wins Over Kohler By Big Margin

**WINS BY OVER 122,000 VOTES; KOHLER CARRIES COUNTY AND VILLAGE**

William Proxmire, 41-year-old Democrat, was swept into office by scoring a smashing victory Tuesday in Wisconsin's special election for the U. S. Senate seat left vacant by the death of Joseph McCarthy.

Proxmire, who became the first Democrat elected to the senate by

this state in 25 years, scored his victory over Republican three-time governor Walter J. Kohler, a staunch supporter of President Eisenhower and twice a victor over Proxmire in races for the governor's post. The election is for the 16 months remaining of McCarthy's term. He will take office as soon as he is accredited by the state canvass board.

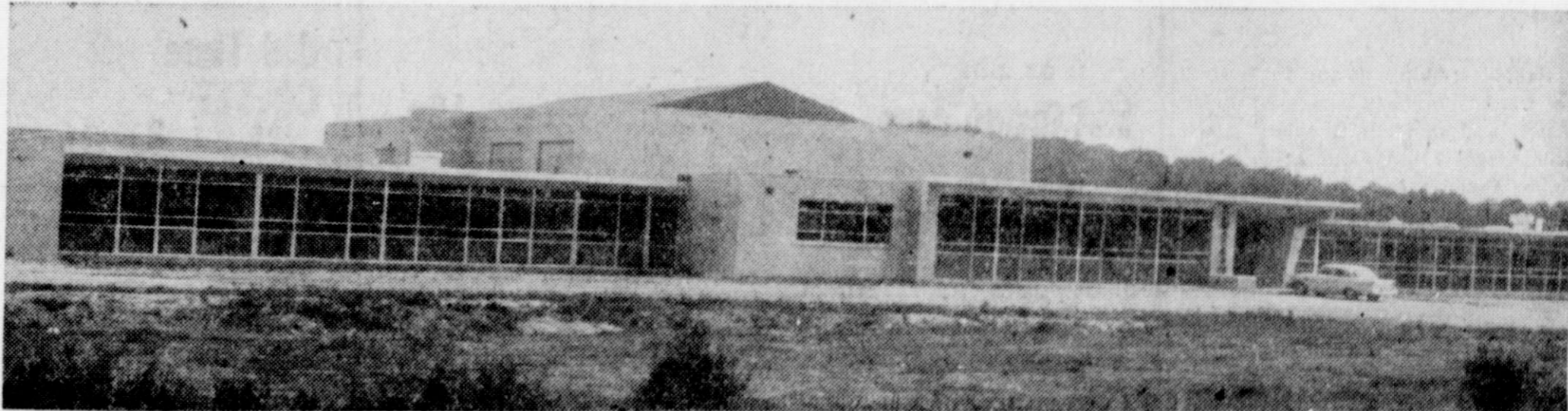

### High School, Grade Staff Is Composed Of 23 Teachers

**GRADES 5-8 MEET IN OLD HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING; SERVE NOON LUNCHES**

Ready for occupancy for the first time when school opens at 9 a. m. Tuesday, Sept. 3, will be the new \$700,000 Kewaskum Community high school, now completed. It includes a large double gym and will serve an anticipated enrollment of about 300 students in its first year.

The Kewaskum public schools

will also open on Tuesday, Sept. 3, at 9:00 a. m. After the first day the kindergarten day will start at 9:00 while all other grades, 1 through 8, will begin at 8:45. The high school class day will begin at 8:20, the same beginning time as prevailed last year.

It will be a red-letter day for high school students and teachers to begin the new school year in the fine new Community high school. Euses will run as they did during the first semester of last year.

The kindergarten and grades one (1) through four (4) will hold their classes in the new grade school, while grades five (5) through eight (8) will be meeting in the old high school building.

Noon lunches will be provided at both the grade and high schools for \$1.25 per week. The cafeteria program will not be in operation during the first week of school.

The grade school faculty is as follows: Kindergarten, Beatrix Larson; first grade, Genevieve Hahn; second grade, Eileen Caldwell; third grade, Geraldine Sinclair; fourth grade, LaVerne Hron; fifth grade, Helene Miller; sixth grade, Richard Guse; seventh grade, Rebecca Erber; eighth grade, James Morrissey; unassigned, Mrs. J. J. Tessar.

The high school staff is composed of the following teachers: Walter Bade, physical education and coach; Orval Behnke, voca-

tion agriculture; Donald Beyersdorf, English; Margaret E. Browne, commercial; Earl Buswell, history and social studies; Anna Mae Delfeld, library; Esther Hanselman, mathematics; Eugene LaMarche, science and social studies; Betty Loppnow, girl's physical education; Ernest Mitchell, science, coach, guidance; Mary Lou Porinsky, English, Spanish; Leland M. Rose, industrial arts and mathematics; Violet Schmidt, homemaking; Theodore Sinclair, vocal and instrumental music.

New teachers include Rebecca Erber, seventh grade; Betty Loppnow, girl's physical education, and Violet Schmidt, homemaking.

## Around the Town

The election Tuesday really surprised a lot of people when Proxmire won over Kohler by a landslide. Thought this was a Republican state. We had Kohler's picture all ready to run in the paper but

had to make a switch. However, Kewaskum's never-say-die Republican stronghold still favored Kohler, 166 to 119. But this is the closest a Democrat ran in the village that we can remember in a long time. Now all the Democrats have to do if the Braves win the pennant is put up Fred Haney for governor next election. The vote was small (291) here even though it was a nice, dark, rainy, typical election day.

## Post Polio Survey Planned for County

A county-wide survey to discover the current rehabilitation needs of all post-polio patients will be conducted this month by the Washington county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Anton P. Staral, chapter chairman announced this week.

The local survey is part of a nation-wide project by the National Foundation to compile a roster of polio cases of all ages and degree of disability, regardless of date of onset. The canvass here is to be completed by Sept. 15.

Modern medicine has made impressive strides in developing new rehabilitation techniques in recent years, Staral said. "Pilot surveys already undertaken show that there are thousands of polio-handicapped in the United States who have not yet had an opportunity for medical evaluation to determine if they might benefit from these new techniques."

"Some of the techniques employed today for those disabled by polio and other causes were unknown or unused as recently as 10 or even five years ago."

"The March of Dimes organization, having scored a tremendous victory in its war on polio, does not propose to walk off and leave the wounded behind, so long as help for them is possible. We wish to find everyone who has had polio, whether paralytic or nonparalytic. We want to know what the special problems may be, so that they may be helped to regain useful lives, if humanly possible, even though it will take a considerable period of time."

Staral said that the roster was to be made in close co-operation with the Washington County Medical society and member physicians. The Department of Public Welfare, office of Vocational Rehabilitation, State Crippled Children's society and county school systems also will cooperate. Information sought for each patient includes whether he is employed or attends school, if he can climb stairs and dress himself, whether he receives regular treatment and if he uses a respiratory aid. Information gained will be helpful to all such agencies and organizations.

Staral asked that all persons who have ever had polio, whether disabled or not, send their names and addresses directly to Anton P. Staral, Chairman, Washington County Chapter NFIP, Barton, Wis.

Democrats 50 seats compared with 46 for the Republicans. Proxmire's victory was made more impressive by the margin he rolled up—more than 122,000 votes with only 30 per cent of the state's eligible voters taking part. Even then the vote was higher than expected. Proxmire carried 57 of the state's 71 counties.

Final unofficial returns from 3,357 of the state's 3,361 precincts gave Proxmire 435,085 votes to 313,631 for Kohler. Howard Boyle had 20,558 votes, Douglas Wheaton had 2,281, and Georgia Cozzini got 788.

In Washington county, a Republican stronghold, Kohler ran ahead of Proxmire by a close margin, 3,855 to 3,474. By the time the county returns were in Proxmire had already won the election. He is a resident of Blooming Grove and operator of a printing firm in Waterloo. Proxmire not only carried the rural and small town areas but metropolitan areas as well.

Voters in the village and town of Kewaskum also favored Kohler, as expected, but Proxmire gave him a much closer run than anticipated locally. A light vote was cast in the village, a total of only 291 ballots being marked. Voters gave Kohler 166, Proxmire 119, Boyle 4, Wheaton 2 and Cozzini 0.

In the town of Kewaskum 81 votes were cast with the following result: Kohler 40, Proxmire 31, Boyle 10, Wheaton 0 and Cozzini 0.

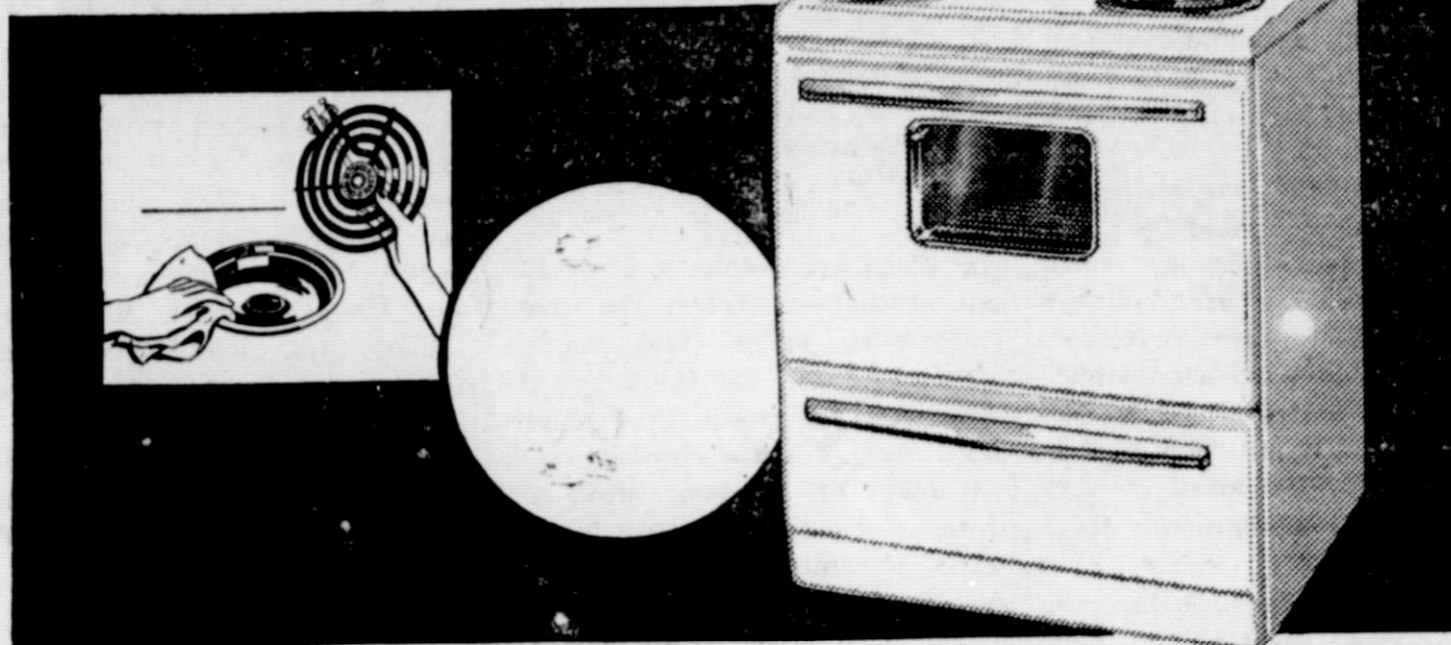

## Hold Soil Program for Teachers on Local Farm

A soils program for rural teachers of Washington county will be conducted on Friday, Aug. 30, on the Sylvester Muckerheide farm in the town of Kewaskum. The main object of the program, County Agent Maurice Hovland pointed out, will be to show that "all land is different—treat it accordingly."

The rural teachers were contacted in regard to the program and are requested to meet at the county courthouse on Friday at 8:45 a. m. From the courthouse the group will proceed to the Muckerheide farm west of Kewaskum.

Four holes will be dug on the farm to show the various kinds of soil. A man will be stationed at each hole to describe to the teachers the various items concerned with the different soils. Soil depth, color, permeability, texture, erosion, slope, cropping system and fertility will be considered.

The program is designed to give the teachers an idea of the differences in soils, so that they may better be able to acquaint their students with the problems involved in controlling soil erosion and stimulating proper soil management.

## MISS BURNS NEW SPEECH ASSISTANT IN COUNTY

A graduate of the School of Speech at Marquette university, class of 1957, Miss Ruth Burns of Milwaukee has taken over her duties in Washington county as assistant to Mrs. Janette German, speech Correctionist in county schools.

As assistant to Mrs. German, who is now in her fourth year as speech correctionist in Washington county, Miss Burns will help in dealing with speech and hearing problems of county students. The hiring of another speech teacher was approved by the county board at the April 11 session this year.

The work deals primarily with assisting children with speech impediments as well as those who are hard of hearing and also affords ear training and lip reading for students in the latter category. More complete coverage, teaching and assistance will now be available with the addition of an assistant in the speech department in the county.

### Earl Manthei Gets Heavy Jolt As Pin Strikes Live Cable

CONSTRUCTION MAN FROM HERE HAS NARROW ESCAPE; POWER CABLE DAMAGED

Earl Manthei, 25, of Kewaskum, a worker for the M-R Construction Co. of Barton, had a narrow escape from electrocution or serious injury last Wednesday when a steel pin he was driving into the ground with a sledge hammer contacted a high tension cable.

The mishap occurred at Fond du Lac where Manthei was working in installing metal forms for new curbs and gutters near West Johnson and North Macy streets. He was driving the pin into the ground to hold a curbing form in place when the pin struck the 4,000-volt cable. It is reported that Manthei was thrown back by the "jolt" which caused an explosion and large cloud of smoke.

Max Ratkowski of Barton, owner of the M-R Construction Co., took Manthei to St. Agnes hospital in the city for a checkup. He was shaken up from the shock but an examination at the hospital disclosed he suffered no ill effects. Manthei was back on the job the next day.

Power service was disrupted in parts of Fond du Lac and North Fond du Lac when the Wisconsin Power and Light company cable was damaged by the "jolt" and it was necessary to cut over to emergency circuits. The power failure occurred at about 9:17 a. m. Repair crews of the power company were called out immediately.

Affected by the power curtailment were residents in the northwest sector of the city, along with three industries and about 15 per cent of the patrons at North Fond du Lac. Radio Station KFIZ was off the air part of the morning as a result of the power failure.

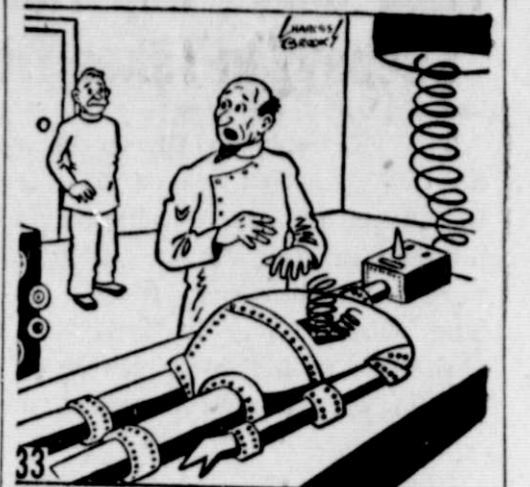
