## Public Schools Open With Another Record Enrollment Of 572; 39 Above Last Year

### 294 in High School & 278 in Grades; 89 Freshmen Enter

The Kewaskum Community high school and public schools opened Tuesday with another record enrollment which by far exceeds that of last year. Setting all-time records were the total enrollment of 572 pupils, the high school enrollment of 294 students, and also the grade school enrollment of 278 pupils.

Another large freshman class, numbering 89 students, started school. This total is just three less than last year's record freshman class of 92 people.

Last fall the total enrollment in the high school and grades was 533, which figure is 39 under this year. There were 286 in high school on opening day last year compared to 294 this year, an increase of eight. The sizable increase is in the grade classes where there were 247 last term in comparison to 278 this fall, an increase of 31.

The freshman class exceeds the sophomore by only one, 89 and 88. Thirty-two children enrolled in kindergarten and 37 in first grade in the public schools.

There are many new students in the upper grades and high school who transferred from other schools. This is especially true in the grades where the children who attended the Gage District rural school last term transferred to the local school. The Gage school was closed this year.

There is ample room and more to spare for the huge enrollment with the modern, one-story new high school building opening for the first time, the old high school building housing pupils in the upper grades, and the new grade school taking care of the lower grades. The ranch-style high school was built to accommodate 500 pupils, many more than the present 294 enrollment. The gym has a seating capacity of 1,200.

## Expect About 500 People to Attend From Five Counties

The Most Rev. Albert G. Meyer, archbishop of Milwaukee, will address three special meetings next week of pastors, co-chairmen, district directors and captains of the Catholic Census and Information Program, scheduled to get under way throughout the state of Wisconsin this month. The meetings at which Archbishop Meyer will speak will cover all ten counties and thirteen districts in the archdiocese.

Holy Trinity parish in Kewaskum will be one of three parishes in different areas of the archdiocese at which the archbishop will speak. He will be present in the Holy Trinity church hall on Monday, Sept. 9, at 7:45 p. m. Expected to attend the local meeting will be between 400 and 600 representatives of about 80 parishes in Dodge, Fond du Lac, Ozaukee, Sheboygan and Washington counties. Theodore Wing, archdiocesan chairman, will preside at the meeting and the pastor, Rev. F. C. La Buwi, will be host.

Preparations for the census are proceeding apace on a parish and district basis. Meetings of pastors have been held in each district at which boundary lines for areas to be canvassed by workers of the different parishes have been set. Many spiritual directors have prepared maps of these areas. Meetings of pastors, parish co-chairmen and canvassers have been held explaining how the census is to be taken, the approximate number of households to be visited, and the assignment of workers to the different areas.

The purposes of the Census and Information Program will be published in a later issue.

On Friday evening there will be a meeting of all those who have been asked to assist in the census from Holy Trinity and St. Bridget's parishes. The meeting will be in the church hall after the mass at 8:30 p. m. The area that each team is expected to cover will be assigned and material for the canvass will be distributed. Instructions will also be given.

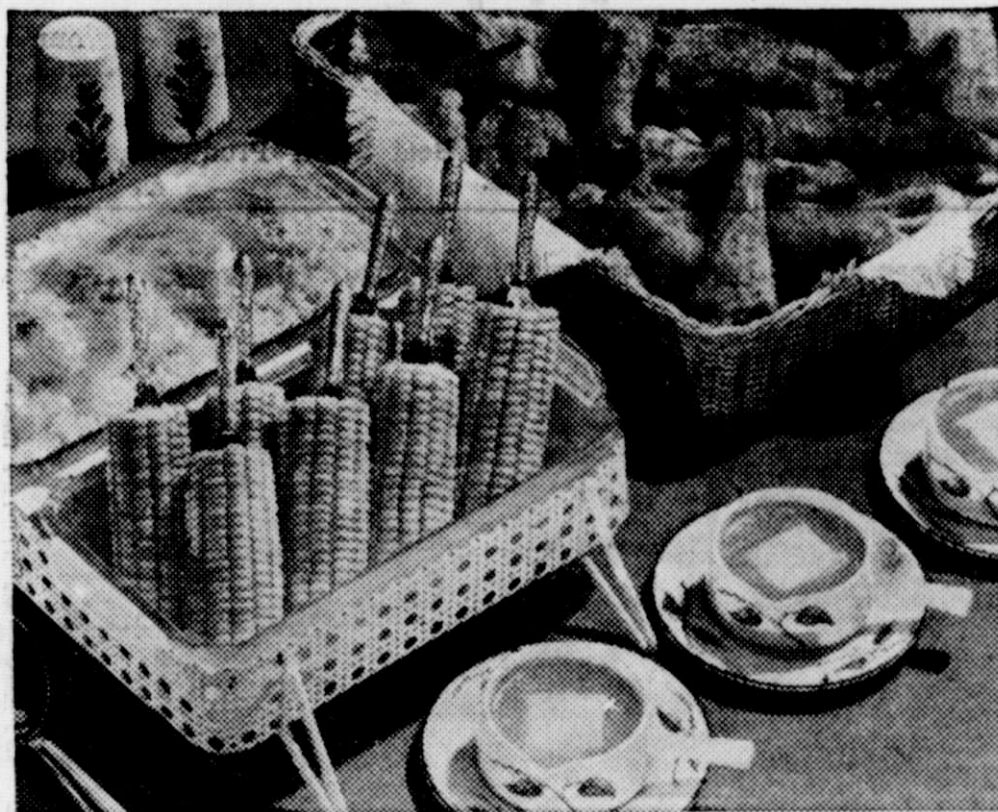

**FAVORITE SUMMER DINNER FEATURES FRIED CHICKEN**



If you took a vote on America's favorite summer dinner menu, there's no doubt you'd find it built around crunchy fried chicken.

With it, go corn on the cob and plenty of melted butter, tomatoes in some form, topped off with a dessert of old-fashioned strawberry shortcake and cream.

To make a carefree meal of this menu, serve butter-crisp oven-fried chicken along with a tasty tomato dish that can be made early in the day.

You'll find this fried chicken so easy because, except for browning, you cook it in the oven. It has a mouth-watering flavor that comes from the butter dotted generously over it.

**BUTTER-CRISP OVEN-FRIED CHICKEN**

Dip pieces of frying chicken in milk. Roll in flour seasoned with salt and pepper (1½ teaspoons salt and a dash of pepper to a cup of flour. Left-over flour may be used in making the gravy). Using equal parts of butter and lard so that, when heated, it will be a half inch deep in the frying pan, cook floured chicken over

moderate heat until golden brown on one side. Turn, using tongs. When browned on all sides, place chicken in casserole. Dot liberally with butter. Cover and place in a moderate oven (350°) to finish cooking, allowing about 35 minutes. The heat then may be reduced to a very slow oven, to keep the chicken warm.

**CHEESE AND RICE TOMATO SCALLOP**

4-6 servings  
350° preheated oven  
30-40 minutes

2 cups or more of cooked rice  
1 tablespoon minced onion or chopped chives

Fresh tomato slices, ½ inch thick or drained whole canned tomatoes

1 cup to 1½ cups (1 tall can) evaporated milk, undiluted shredded or thinly sliced sharp Cheddar cheese.

Place cooked rice mixed with onion and chives in shallow baking dish. Top with tomatoes. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Pour on milk to cover rice. Top with plenty of cheese. Bake in a 350° preheated oven 30 to 40 minutes.

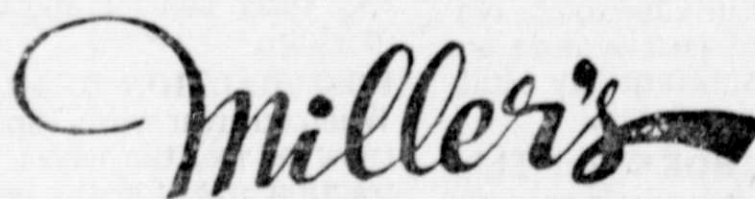

Work is rolling along right on schedule on the Fond du Lac ave. street project in spite of wet weather at the end of last week. 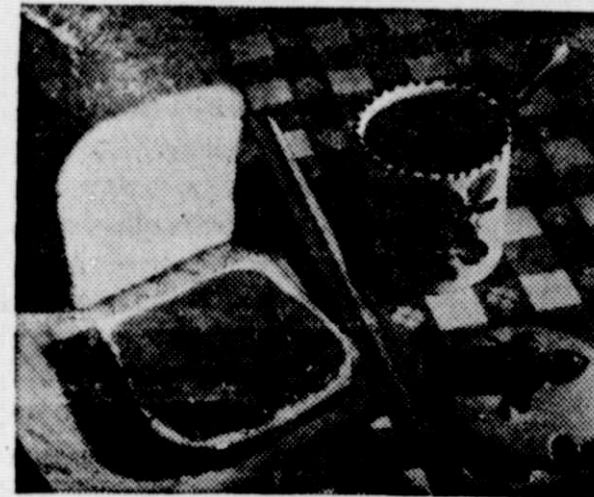
**PEACH BUTTER**



NANCY HAVEN

## Check Corn Ears at Harvest For Clues to Plant Food Need



Corn ear No. 1 (above), is a normal ear with well-filled tips. The second ear shows a nitrogen shortage; No. 3 is deficient in phosphorus and No. 4 indicates a serious lack of potash.

THE corn ears that come from your picker at harvest time this fall can give you information that will help you grow better and higher yields next year, according to University of Illinois agronomists.

These soils men point out that normal ears have well-filled tips and weigh about two-thirds of a pound. They produce the highest yields. Any marked variation from these can mean nutrients shortages and lower yields.

Here are things to watch for particularly, say the soils men:

1—Small, twisted ears with undeveloped kernels. These can be caused by a lack of phosphorus in the soil. Phosphorus shortages interfere with pollination and kernel development. Stalks with no ears at all can result also from lack of phosphorus.

2—Ears with pointed tips and loose chaffy kernels suggest a potash shortage.

3—Small ears with unfilled tips can be caused by nitrogen deficiency. Corn needs nitrogen throughout the growing season. The plants need very large amounts during the maximum growth period in July and August.

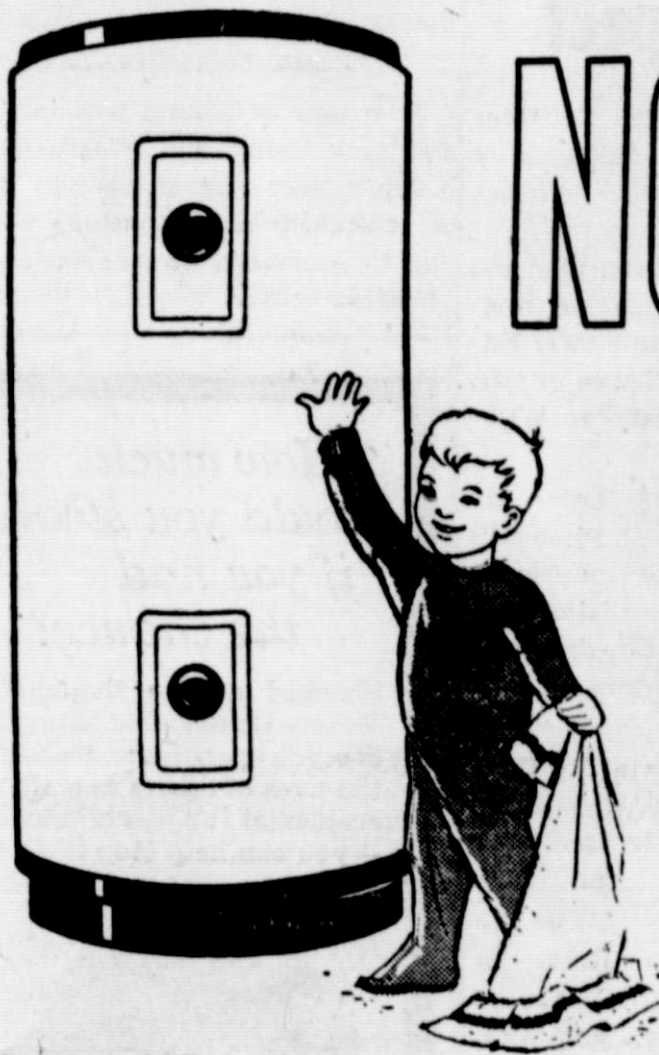
4—Poorly filled ears with scattered kernels can be caused by dry weather which slows silking and interferes with pollination of the kernels. Very hot weather at tasseling time can kill pollen and also cause poorly filled ears.

5—Small nubbins indicate the plant population is too large for the fertility level of the soil.

6—Large ears weighing more than two-thirds of a pound can mean that the plant population is too small to take full advantage of available nutrients.

If you find these signals in your corn crop this fall, you can take steps to correct nutrient shortages in the soil and improve your chances of getting good yields next year, the Illinois agronomists say.

The use of lime and fertilizer, based on soil tests, can help increase yields. But other good management practices and weather conditions are important too. So is the water supply, for a 100-bushel corn crop uses several hundred thousand gallons of water. High yields depend also on practices that build soil structure, improve drainage and maintain reserves of organic matter.

# Village Board Allows Additional \$1,016.44 On Plat Map Contract

**HAEBIG, KRONCKE APPOINTED JUSTICES OF PEACE**

Regular Meeting August 5, 1957

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present except Trustee Stelpflug.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by C. Schaefer, seconded by J. Eberle and duly carried.

Because of a previous legal technicality, K. William Haebig was appointed as Justice of the Peace for the term ending April 1959, and Robert G. Kroncke was appointed Justice of the Peace for the term ending April 1958, upon motion by C. Schaefer, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried.

The claim of Dr. R. G. Edwards, for a refund on 1956 taxes paid under protest, in the amount of \$32.29, was allowed upon motion by A. Merwin, seconded by C. Schaefer and duly carried because of the following reason: a parcel of land adjacent to the Car Hop property was computed as having a frontage of 100 feet whereas the actual frontage is only 25 feet.

The claim of the local union of the Allied Industrial Workers, for a refund on 1956 taxes paid under protest, in the amount of \$147.60, was allowed upon motion by A. Merwin, seconded by C. Schaefer and duly carried because said union is a non-profit organization and property owned by such organiza-

tions are tax exempt. The claim of the McMahon Engineering Co. for additional work on the plat map contract was reviewed by the board. As per letter of the engineering firm 38 additional parcels were surveyed and staked. The rear lines of 8 parcels had to be resurveyed and restaked in the abandoning of the alley connecting Main Street to Habeck Street and lying between Kewaskum Street and Stark Street.

Motion was made by W. Tessar that an additional amount of \$1,016.44 be allowed on the Plat Map contract to be computed as follows: 38 parcels surveyed and staked at \$25.00 per parcel or \$950.00; 8 parcels, rear lines resurveyed and restaked at \$8.33 per parcel, 1/3 of above cost or \$66.64.
