Over 800 people, pastors district spiritual directors and laymen from Dodge, Fond du Lac, Ozaukee, Washington and Sheboygan counties gathered at the new Kewaskum high school auditorium Monday ev. ening to hear talks on the Catholic Census and Information Program.

The large crowd filled the greater part of the spacious school gymnasium. The meeting was originally scheduled for the Holy Trinity parish hall but when reservations beyond expectations poured in it became necessary to transfer the meeting to the high school. The church hall could not have accommodated the gathering.

Parking facilities for hundreds of cars had to be provided and traffic immediately following the meeting caused some congestion. After the main meeting at the high school large percentage of those attending moved to the Holy Trinity hall where a meeting for committees was held and was followed by the serving of refreshments.

Post-Polio Census in County Being Assembled

The census of post-polio patients now being assembled by the Washington County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis includes victims of so-called nonparalytic polio, as well as those severely crippled by the disease, Anton P. Staral, chairman of the chapter, pointed out this week.

"Medical research in recent years has demonstrated that some patients, originally listed as nonparalytic cases, may develop muscular weaknesses, curvature of the spine and limb deformities, even after a lapse of several years."

After the census of all post-polio patients has been completed, an intensive study of their current medical needs will be conducted. Both the census and evaluation programs are financed by the National Foundation.

Not all those registered in the presesnt canvass will require help at this time, nor can help be given to all who desire it.

"What we are doing now is to get an up-to-date picture of the size of the problems so that we can measure our own responsibilities to the polio victims of the past,"

"We want to know how many post-polio patients, regardless age or date of onset of the disease can be helped by modern rehabilitation techniques and thereby regain useful lives. Many of the techniques either did not exist or were not widely used when patients were being treaated years ago.

"An important part of our job is to acquaint former polio patients with the survey program. Spot checks have shown that there are many patients particularly those diagnosed as nonparalytic cases, for whom no record has been maintain. ed. We intend to do everything humanly possible to help those who need aid, either now or in the next few years."





Mrs. Brawdy, who had been hired by the County Health committee and was to have reported for work on Tuesday, Sept. 3, was unable to follow through with her agreement and filed her letter of resignation with the committee.

Possibly, the general public in reading this article can assist the committee in securing the services of a nurse by informing anyone who is qualified and might be interested in the position. To be qualified a person must have a certificate in public health nursing which has been approved by the State Board of Health.

Harry Sheski, county superintendent of schools, and secretary of the County Health committee, will be most happy to discuss this position with anyone who will call at his office in the court house.


