49 Young Ladies Enter 'Miss Kewaskum' Contest; Ballots Placed in Business Places

Queen and Court To Be Given Many Valuable Prizes

STREET OPENING BOOSTER BUTTONS BEING SOLD BY GIRLS; MISS WISCONSIN TO CROWN QUEEN

The gals of Kewaskum and surrounding area, circulated by this newspaper, really responded in a big way in the "Miss Kewaskum" contest to choose a queen and her court of four other girls to reign over the street opening celebration Friday and Saturday, Oct. 11-12.

Entries in the queen contest closed on Wednesday, Sept. 18, with a surprisingly large number of 49 young ladies entering competition in the six days since entries opened with last Friday's issue. Publicity and entry blanks for the queen contest were published in the Statesman only and the results were very gratifying. Names of all the contestants, an official ballot and rules for the balloting will be found in a large ad on page five of this issue.

Read the list of entries carefully and then vote for your choice on the ballot at the bottom of the ad. The five girls receiving the most ballots during the next two weeks shall be considered finalists in the contest. "Miss Kewaskum" will be selected from the final five by a board of five judges on the first evening of the celebration, with the remaining four girls being the queen's court. Winners will not be announced until Saturday. Voting will be closed at the end of the business day on Wednesday, Oct. 2. The queen will be officially crowned Saturday, Oct. 12, at 2:30 p. m. by Miss Joan Hentschel of Milwaukee, who is "Miss Wisconsin" of 1957.

The official ballot as printed in the ad may be deposited in any ballot box which will be set up in all business places in Kewaskum. Additional ballots are available at all these places and will be given with each purchase. These ballot boxes and ballots will be placed in the business establishments at the same time this week's Statesman is put in the mail.

Booster buttons for the celebration were put on sale on Wednesday of this week by the contestants, who receive one vote for each button sold. The gals responded tremendously to the sale of buttons and most of them made several requests for additional buttons after selling the original 40 given them.

Hundreds of dollars in prizes donated by the businessmen will be awarded to the queen and her court. Rifles and ammunition are furnished. By buying advance tickets you receive 4 shots for \$1.00 while on the day of the shoot the fee is 3 shots for \$1.00.

Other events include trap and deer rifle target shooting. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events bring their own shotguns and rifles. In addition, there are games for every member of the family, food, hot and cold drinks, along with ample shelter.

Indians to Open Football Season Here Friday Night

BRANDON OPENS TRI-COUNTY LEAGUE SEASON; SEVEN LETTERMEN BACK

The Kewaskum Community High school Indians will pry off the lid on the 1957 football season in the Tri-County conference when they take on Brandon under the lights Friday night, Sept. 20. Coach Ernie Mitchell will begin his 15th season with a squad of about 50 candidates who have been working out for the team.

Seven lettermen are among the Indians' prospects, which is fewer than most teams in the league have. The schools in the circuit and the number of lettermen are North Fond du Lac (defending champs), nine; Oakfield nine; Campbellsport, eight; Hustisford, eight; Lomira, six; Brandon, five, and Random Lake, five.

Kewaskum has four home games this year and all will be played at night. After Brandon the Indians will meet Oakfield, Campbellsport and North Fond du Lac, all of the stronger teams, at home. The team will play both 8-man and 11-man games. Against Brandon and Oakfield (smaller schools) they will play 8-man football and with Campbellsport and North Fondy the regulation 11-man games will be played. All contests will take place on Friday nights.

Install New Post Office Fixtures, Hours Changed

All of the new fixtures and equipment which arrived at the post office recently were installed the past week. Approximately 450 new lock boxes were installed and the greater majority of them are already taken. Besides these a number of patrons are also getting their mail through general delivery.

The new fixtures include a new lock box section and paneling, service counter, sorting tables, rural carrier cases, lockers, cabinets and parcel post rack. Not any of the old equipment remains in use.

Acting Postmaster Harry E. Koch announces that effective Monday, Sept. 23, the window service section will open at 8:45 a. m. and close at 5:15 p. m. daily. Saturday hours will be from 8:45 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. Now that the new equipment has been installed these hours will go into effect according to the Post Office Department general order No. 56314, dated April 5, 1957.

The lock box section will remain open as usual from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m. Monday through Saturday including holidays. Those patrons who have not as yet made arrangements for a lock box may do so at anytime during the new hours.

The postmaster also wishes to thank all patrons for the fine cooperation during the temporary setup and while the new fixtures were being installed.

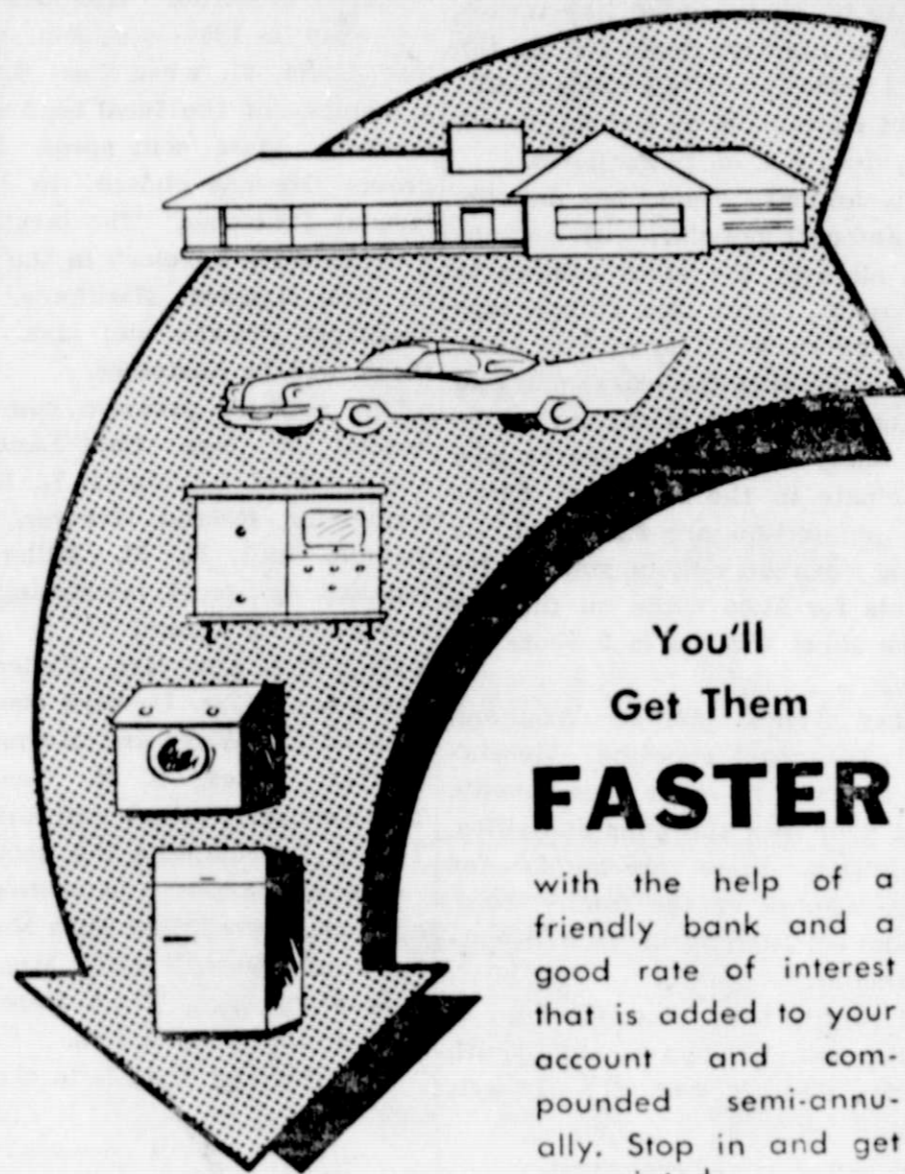

Village Board

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE TRAFFIC UPON THE STREETS, ALLEYS AND HIGHWAYS OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. STATE TRAFFIC LAWS ADOPTED. The statutory provisions describing and defining regulations with respect to vehicles and traffic in the following enumerated sections of the Wisconsin Statutes, exclusive of any provisions therein relating to the penalties to be imposed or the punishment for violation of said statutes, are hereby adopted and by reference made a part of this ordinance as if fully set forth herein. Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute incorporated herein by reference is required or prohibited by this ordinance.

SECTION 2. SPEED LIMITS

(a) STATE SPEED LIMITS

ADOPTED. The provisions of ss. 346.57, 346.58 and 346.59 of the Wisconsin statutes, relating to the maximum and minimum speed of vehicles are hereby adopted as part of this section as if fully set forth herein.

SECTION 3. THROUGH STREETS DESIGNATED.

The following streets in the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, in the interest of public safety, are hereby declared to be through streets: Fond du Lac Ave., Main St., Railroad St.

SECTION 4. PARKING LIMITATIONS.

(a) PARKING LIMITS. When signs are erected in any block giving notice thereof, no person shall park a vehicle for longer than the period therein specified.

SECTION 5. VEHICULAR WEIGHT LIMITATIONS.

(a) CLASS "B" HIGHWAYS DESIGNATED. All streets and alleys within the Village of Kewaskum,

Wisconsin, except the following enumerated streets and alleys, are hereby designated class "B" highways and shall be subject to the weight limitations imposed by s. 348.16 of the Wisconsin statutes:

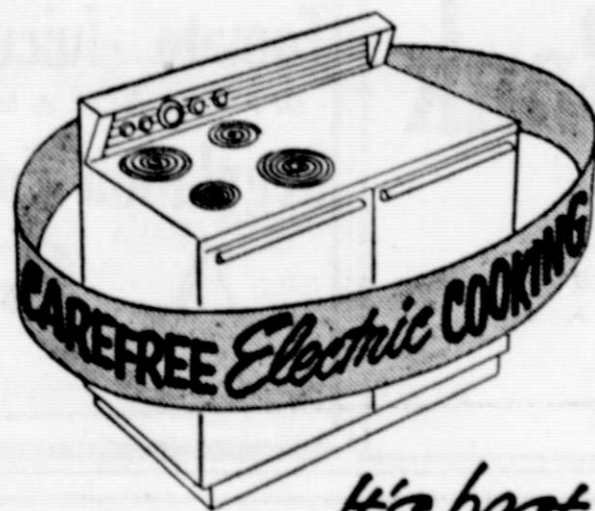

with pneumatic tires or has a combined vehicle load weight exceeding 6,000 pounds shall be operated or moved on any street or alley not part of the heavy traffic route in the Village of Kewaskum, except for the purpose of obtaining orders for, moving or delivering supplies or commodities to or from a place of business or residence facing thereon, provided that in no event shall the weight of vehicle and load on such other street exceed the limitations of ss. 348.15 or 348.16 (3) of the Wisconsin statutes pertaining to class "A" highways or deliveries on class "B" highways.

SECTION 6.

ERECTION OF OFFICIAL TRAFFIC SIGNS AND SIGNALS.

The Chief of Police is hereby authorized and directed to procure, erect and maintain appropriate standard traffic signs, signals and markings conforming to the rules of the state highway commission giving notice of the provisions of sections 2, 3, 4 and 5 of this ordinance. Signs shall be erected in such locations and manner as authorized by the governing body as to give adequate warning to users of the street, alley or highway in question. No provision of said sections shall be enforced unless and until such signs are erected and in place and sufficiently legible to be seen by an ordinarily observant person.

SECTION 7. PENALTY.

(a) Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200 together with the costs of prosecution, and in default of payment of the forfeiture and the costs of prosecution shall be imprisoned in the county jail until said forfeiture and costs are paid, but not exceeding 90 days, provided that the minimum forfeiture for a violation of any provision of section 2 of this ordinance shall be \$10.00 and the minimum forfeiture for a violation of any provision of section 1 of this ordinance described and defined in ss. 346.61 through 346.64 of the Wisconsin statutes shall be \$75.00.

(b) The provisions of s. 345.16 of the Wisconsin statutes shall apply to adjudications of violation of any provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 8. ENFORCEMENT.

(a) STIPULATION OF GUILT. The Chief of Police or officer designated by him, upon request of any person charged with a violation of any provisions of this ordinance within 48 hours after issuance of a citation therefor may accept a written stipulation of guilt and required penalty from such person. Such stipulation shall be in substantially the following form:

(b) FORFEITED PENALTY. The sum to be forfeited pursuant to the stipulation for violation of this ordinance shall be as provided in the schedule of penalties established by the Chief of Police and approved by the Village Board.

(c) FORFEITURES TO TREASURER. The officer accepting forfeited penalties shall deliver them to the Village Treasurer at least once in each 7 days.

(d) BAIL BONDS. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the right of the proper authorities to accept bail bonds, deposits or certificates or money deposits as provided in ss. 66.114, 345.13 or 345.15 of the Wisconsin statutes.

(e) STIPULATION OF NOTICE. Any official accepting a stipulation of guilt or bail under the provisions of this section shall comply with the provisions of ss. 343.27 and 343.29 of the Wisconsin statutes and shall inform the accused of the effect of a stipulation of guilt or a forfeiture of bail.

SECTION 9. REFERENCE TO STATUTES. The term "Wisconsin statutes" wherever used in this or-

dinance shall mean the Wisconsin statutes of 1957.

SECTION 10. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES. All ordinances regulating traffic upon the streets, alleys and highways of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, and all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance heretofore enacted by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, are hereby repealed.

SECTION 11. SEVERABILITY. The provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed severable and it is expressly declared that the Village Board would have passed the other provisions of this ordinance irrespective of whether or not one or more provisions may be declared invalid and if any provision of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of

such provisions to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 12. EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after September 15, 1957.
