Kiwanis Turkey Shoot Sunday At Bar-N Ranch

ANNUAL EVENT TO INCLUDE
TRAP, DEER RIFLE RANGES,
GAMES, FOOD, BEVERAGES

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its fifth annual live turkey shoot on Sunday, Sept. 29, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, 6 miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine Drive.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become outstandingly popular. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state attend as participants and spectators. The turkey shoot is handled as follows:

Large live tom turkeys are placed in protected crates at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots, (four shots on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

Other events include trap and deer rifle target shooting. Sportmen desiring to enter these events bring their own shotguns, rifles and ammunition. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

The shoot is sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club and all profits go to the Kewaskum youth benefit and community benefit funds.

Village Extends Welcome to Rev. Hammen, Family

NEW PEACE CHURCH PASTOR
TO BE INSTALLED SUNDAY

All of Kewaskum this week is extending a very cordial welcome to Rev. Clarence Hammen, his wife Ella, son Phillip and father-in-law, Mr. Kupper. Rev. Hammen comes to Peace church, Kewaskum, from Friedens congregation, Fort Atkinson, having served as pastor there since June, 1950.

Rev. Hammen comes to Kewaskum with an outstanding record as a minister, teacher, organizer and leader. He served Salem church, Berlin, Wis., from September, 1927 to June, 1931. While there he was elected to the office of secretary of the Appleton, Sheboygan and Fond du Lac area and also elected to the Wisconsin Synod Board of Christian Education.

From June, 1931 until February, 1940 he served Unity church at Antigo, Wis. In 1932 he was elected chairman of the State Board of Christian Education and was chairman of the state conventions at Wausau in 1932 and Milwaukee in 1933. Rev. Hammen served St. John's Evangelical and Reformed church at Massillon, Ohio from February, 1940 to October, 1944. Under his leadership the congregation prospered and built a garage, re-built the church and installed a pipe organ. From 1944 until 1950 he served St. Paul's Evangelical and Reformed church in Elgin, Ill. In 1950 he was elected as delegate to the General Synod from the North Illinois Synod.

Leaving Elgin, the Hammens came to Fort Atkinson. While there in 1955 he was elected to the offices of vice-president to the Wisconsin Council of Churches and of the South Wisconsin Synod. At present Rev. Hammen still serves in the capacity of vice president of both aforementioned organizations. Kewaskum is indeed fortunate to be able to procure a man of this caliber.

Rev. Paul Kehle, president of the synod will deliver the sermon for installation this Sunday, Sept. 29, and Mr. Norman Schowalter of West Bend will deliver the charge to the congregation.

Hwy. 45 From Here to West Bend to Be Built

OK CONSTRUCTION FOR NEXT
YEAR; LAND TO BE BOUGHT;
REIGLE SENDS LETTER

The proposed rebuilding of Hwy. 45 between Kewaskum and West Bend has been placed on the 1958 state highway improvement program, Assemblyman Elmer J. Schowalter of Jackson revealed the past week. A letter to the Washington county assemblyman from Harold L. Plummer, state highway commission chairman, confirmed the construction work as follows:

"The Barton-Kewaskum project of U. S. Highway 45 is scheduled for our 1958 construction program as 5.31 miles of grading, ballast, base and high type bituminous concrete pavement estimated to cost \$638,000. Very definitely the work will be undertaken in 1958 and we will attempt to complete it the same year. We cannot be fully positive about its completion because of the size of the project, the extent of work and unknown weather and other conditions ahead, but we will make a good try."

Jim Reigle, president of the village of Kewaskum, who was also notified of the approval of the project, wrote to Assemblyman Schowalter expressing his pleasure on approval of the highway work for '58. Reigle's letter states in part:

"Thanks for the help on the highway project with the Madison office.

"Mr. Plummer's letter is certainly good news. When these projects are completed, Kewaskum should be all set for a number of years in so far as major highway improvements are concerned.

"I know that your interest and assistance has been most helpful in getting these projects approved."

Requests for the work on Hwy. 45 between here and West Bend, referred to as the "swamp road", have been made for years. Residents of Kewaskum and West Bend, as well as throughout the county, have been popping for improvements on the highway for a long time and the improvement is sorely needed.

Al Rettler, county highway commissioner, reported receipt of information from the Dist. No. 2 office of the highway commission at Waukesha that they are now working on the right-of-way plats for the Hwy. 45 project and may begin purchasing necessary land for construction before Jan. 1, 1958.

List Over 150 Former Patients in Census of Polio Now on in County

Over 150 former polio patients in Washington county have been listed to date in the countywide census conducted by the Washington County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

A special census committee has been named by the chapter chairman Anton P. Staral and this group has been working on compiling an accurate listing of polio patients. Members of this committee are Mrs. Robert C. Haebig, 812 Highland View Drive, West Bend; Mrs. Joseph Weiss, 625 Maple Street, West Bend; Mrs. Robert E. Monroe, 1061 Cedar St. West Bend; Mrs. Paul Freehauf, R. 2, Hartford; Mrs. Donald Freehauf, 60A. Grand Ave., Hartford; Mrs. Ned Sengpiel, Kewaskum, Miss Clara Jaehrig, Fredonia, R. 1 and Mrs. Harlan Kannenberg, Jackson, R. 1. These people will be glad to assist anyone with the canvass and a telephone call or a card will be all that is necessary from a polio patient, and a polio survey report will be for-

warded as soon as possible. It is the hope of the Washington county census committee that every polio patient will be recorded.

Facts gathered here will serve as a basis for an intensive study of the current medical needs of all post-polio patients, originally diagnosed as nonparalytic, develop weaknesses and even deformities after a lapse of years.

"Not all polio patients are known to us through our chapter rolls," Mr. Staral explained, "Thus we welcome the aid of our doctors, and teachers as well as health authori-

ties in locating those for whom no continuing record has been kept.

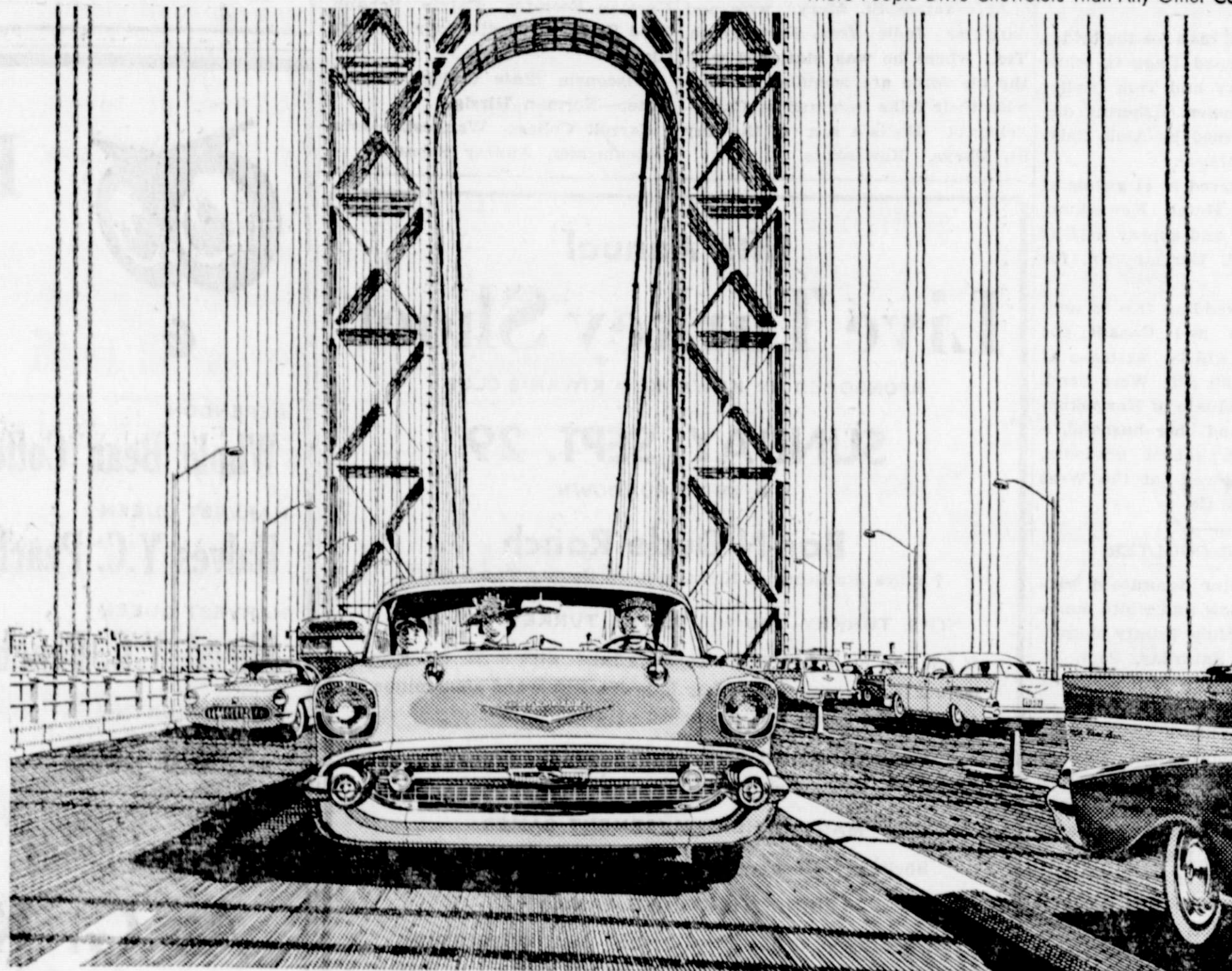

He stressed that any member losing milk due to fire, windstorm, or lightning striking cows gets up to 75 per cent of his total production for 60 days paid to him by the Pure Milk Co-op.

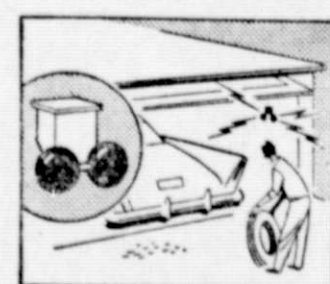
