Street Opening Success Despite Chilly Weather

CROWNING OF QUEEN, PARADE,
FISH FRY ARE FEATURES;
OFFICIALS ATTEND
RIBBON CUTTING

Despite pretty chilly weather that kept many persons away and broke up the festivities at an early hour both nights, Kewaskum's street opening celebration Friday evening and Saturday afternoon and night was a fine success. The community-wide festival marked the completion of the new Fond du Lac ave. (Hwy. 45) construction project. While the entire project is not completed, it will be ready for traffic soon.

Feature of the celebration naturally was the crowning of Miss Kewaskum and members of her court who reigned over the week end festivities. The finalists in the contest (who sold the most booster buttons and received the largest number of

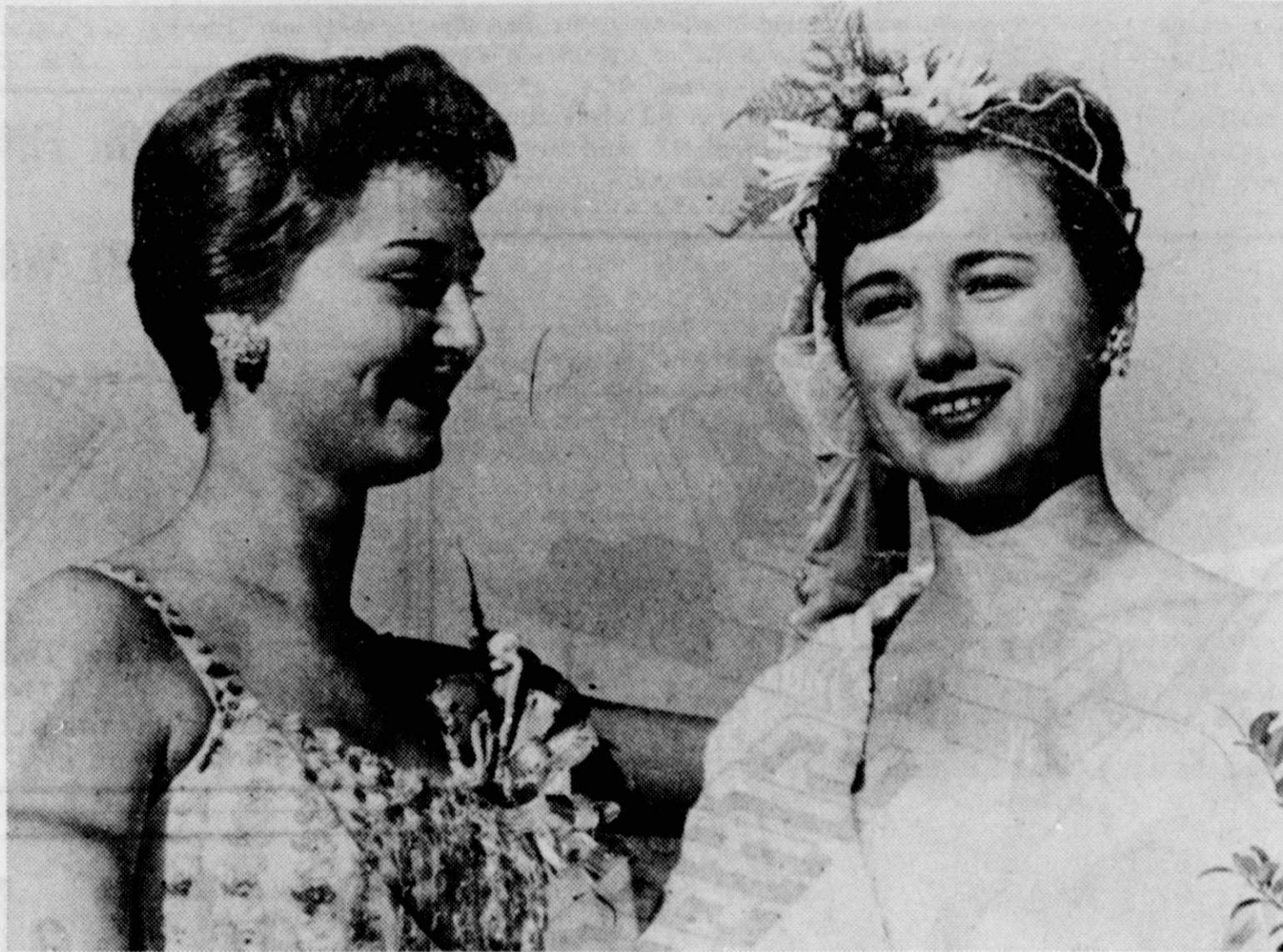
votes in the business places) appeared on the stage Friday evening to be interviewed by the judges. The queen was then selected by the three out-of-town judges but her name was sealed in an envelope and kept secret until Saturday afternoon. The queen and members of her court all received a host of costly prizes donated by Kewaskum merchants and businessmen.

The ribbon cutting ceremony Saturday evening was attended by state, county, highway and village officials. They included Senator Frank Panzer, Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter, J. F. Meier of the state highway commission, E. M. Romaine, chairman of the county board, spokesman for the contractor, Village President James Reigle and others who were called upon for brief talks. Queen Dreher cut the ribbon opening the highway with members of her court in attendance. Because cars were not yet permitted on the street, it was decided to have a local youngster drive down the new pavement in a miniature auto. The honor went to four-year-old Jack Tessar, son of the Allen Tessars.

The outdoor community fish fry which opened the event Friday evening at 5 p. m. went over very big. The fish were ordered so fast that hungry people had to stand in line for their plate of delicious boneless perch. Later in the evening a square dancing exhibition was held on Main st., followed by public square dancing. These dancers had a large circle of spectators around them. All evening a street party was held with music, concessions and refreshments.

Saturday's festivities began at 1 p. m. with a kiddies' parade which originated at the old high school and wended its way through the streets to Fond du Lac ave. The small fry really went all out and

38 Area High Schools To Be Represented at Session Here Monday

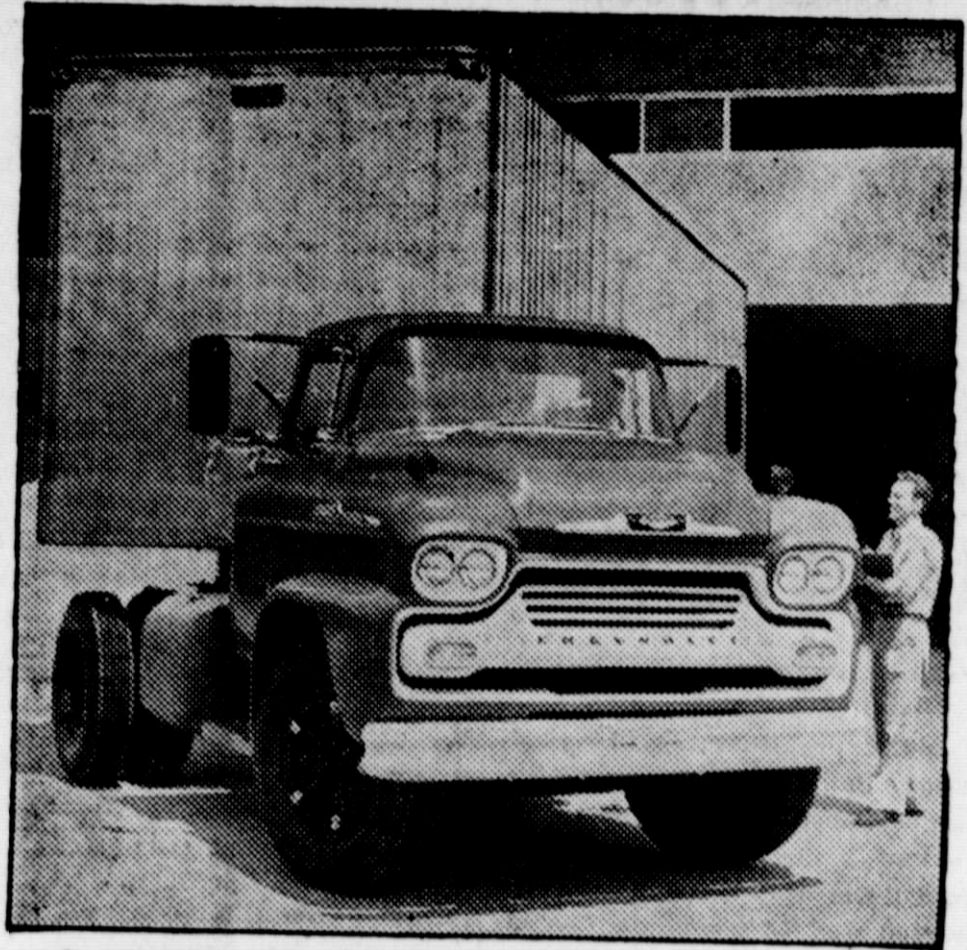

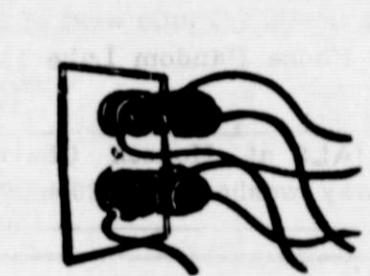

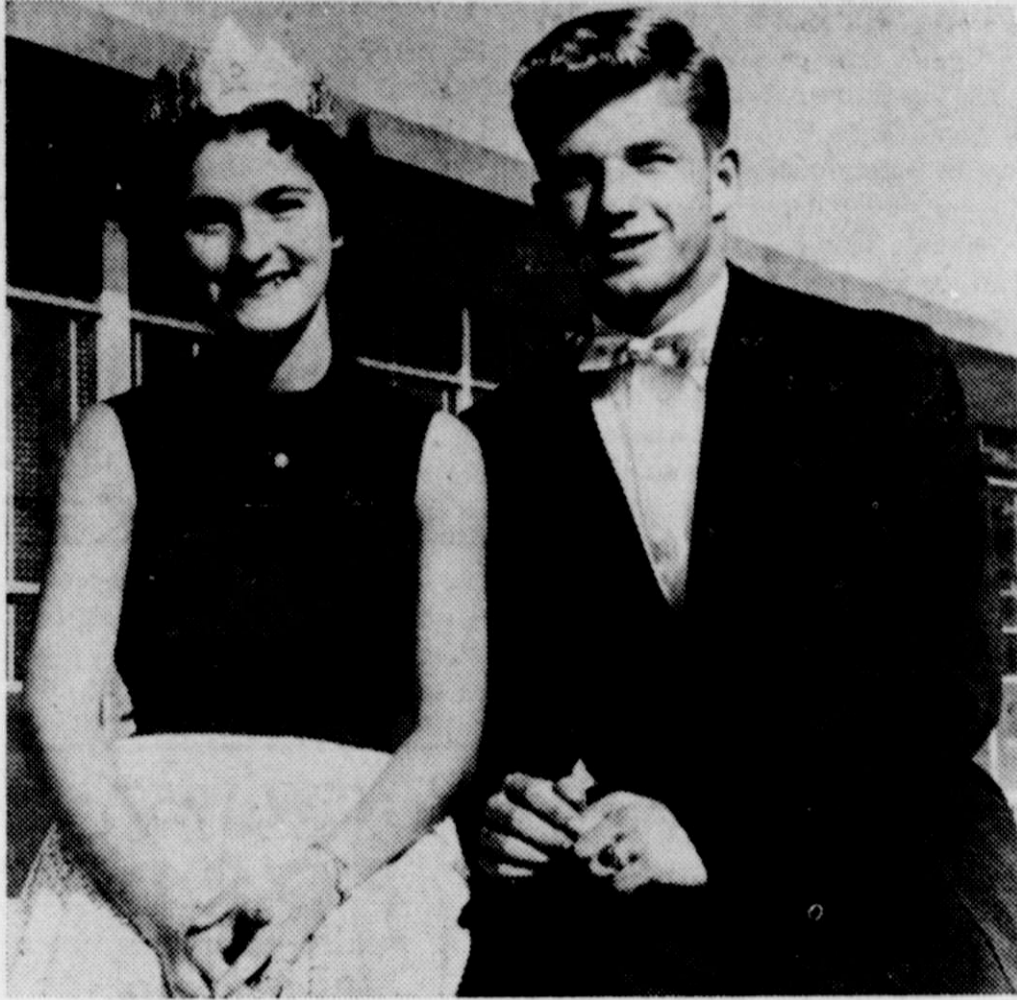
