HUNTERS CAUSE FIRE IN WOODS ON ED UELMEN FARM

Although the siren was not sounded, several members of the fire department contacted by phone took the equipment to the Ed Uelmen farm in the town of Auburn, near New Fane, at 5:45 p. m. Saturday to help put out a blaze in the woods. According to Clyde Smith, Kettle Moraine area state forest supervisor, the fire was started by careless hunters who attempted to smoke a squirrel out of a large hollow tree.

The conservation department fire fighting equipment and crew was first called and extinguished the flames which were spreading through dry leaves and grass in the woods. But they didn't have sufficient hose to reach the tree and Kewaskum firemen were summoned to finish the job. The tree, near the center of the woods, was very difficult to reach and firemen remained at the scene about two hours getting in and out of the woods and snuffing the blaze.

Pinned Under Car, Young Man Dies

A Boltonville young man, Arlyn Edward Knutson, 20, died at 1:45 a. m. Sunday of injuries suffered Saturday afternoon when a car on which he was working fell off of blocks on which it was raised, and pinned him beneath it. The accident happened at the Lawrence Staehler garage in Boltonville. Knutson was employed as a machinist at the Newburg machine shop.

The young man was born Jan. 15, 1937 in Wauwatosa. He came to Newburg in 1944 and was married to Arlene Staehler at St. Michaels on Feb. 11, 1956. The couple has one child, Randy. Other survivors, together with the widow, are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Knutson of Newburg, and his parents-in-law.

Funeral services were held at 1:30 p. m. Wednesday at the Reglinger funeral home at Newburg with the Rev. H. E. Totzke of Saukville officiating. Burial was in Highland Memorial Park in Milwaukee.

Four More Killed In Hwy. 41 Crash

Four more persons died when two cars collided head-on on Hwy. 41 north of Allenton early Monday morning. Victims of the crash were Howard L. Dorow, 38, and Russell Werth, 27, Milwaukee police officers, and Donald Buza, 22, Milwaukee, and Jerry L. Jacowski, 19, R. 1, Almond, Wis.

It was believed Buza fell asleep at the wheel and his southbound auto careened into the northbound lane of traffic, striking the rear of a vehicle driven by Jesse Thompson, 32, Milwaukee, before it struck Werth's auto head-on.

The accident, one of many fatal ones on new Hwy. 41, raised the county death toll to 26 for 1957 or two more than the entire year's total for 1956.

Cars driven by Mrs. Gisela Lessmann Rudzitis, 27, of R. 2, Kewaskum, and Mrs. Otto (Alice) Giese, 49, also of R. 2, Kewaskum, collided at the intersection of Main and West Water sts. (Hwys. 23 and S) in the village at about 1:15 p. m. Sunday.

According to the police report, the Giese car was traveling east on Main st. and the Rudzitis auto was southbound on West Water and failed to stop for the arterial sign at the intersection. The Rudzitis vehicle skidded across the highway into the path of the Giese car.

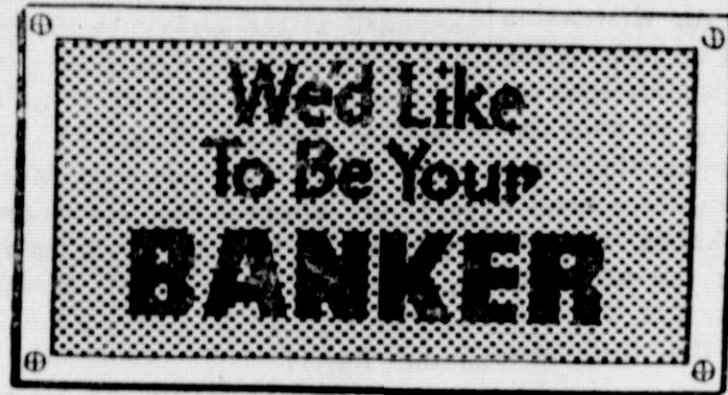

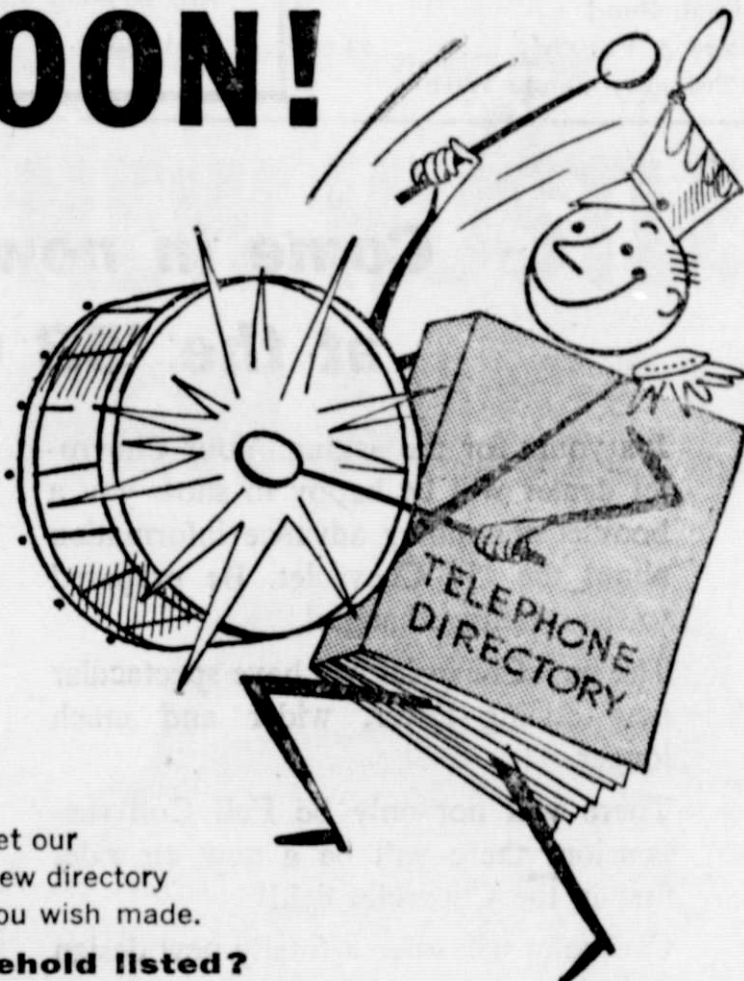

Board Authorizes Fire Department to Install Two Additional Sirens

Regular Meeting
October 7, 1957

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried.

Fire Chief H. J. Schaefer and Firemen J. Geidel and E. Kueper appeared to discuss the installation of additional fire sirens. Motion was made by J. Stellpflug, seconded by W. Tessar and carried that, unless the Village engineering firm specifies otherwise, the Fire Dept. be authorized to purchase and install two (2) additional sirens to be strategically placed, one at the West side and one at the East side of the village.

Upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried, the Commissioner was authorized to enroll the Sewage Plant Operator as a member of the Central States Sewage and Industrial Wastes Association and to remit the required fee.

The Chief of Police was authorized to purchase, at the most advantageous price, two (2) tires for the squad car.

The Board, upon motion by M. Schaefer, seconded by J. Eberle and duly carried, authorized the purchase of a used furnace and stoker for the Village garage from Clayton Stautz for \$70.00 and a used sewer rd from Mrs. Kluever for \$15.00.

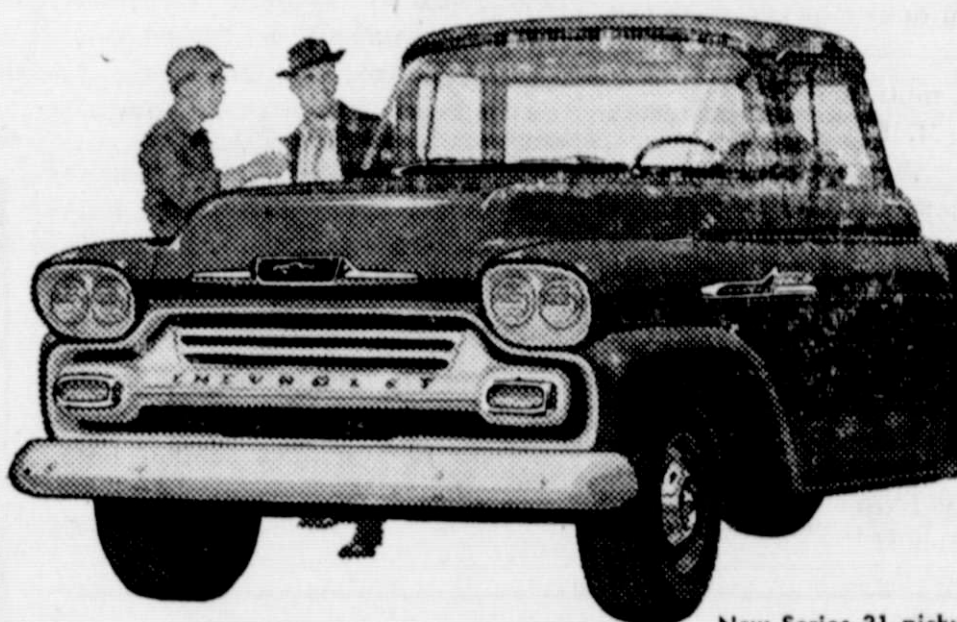

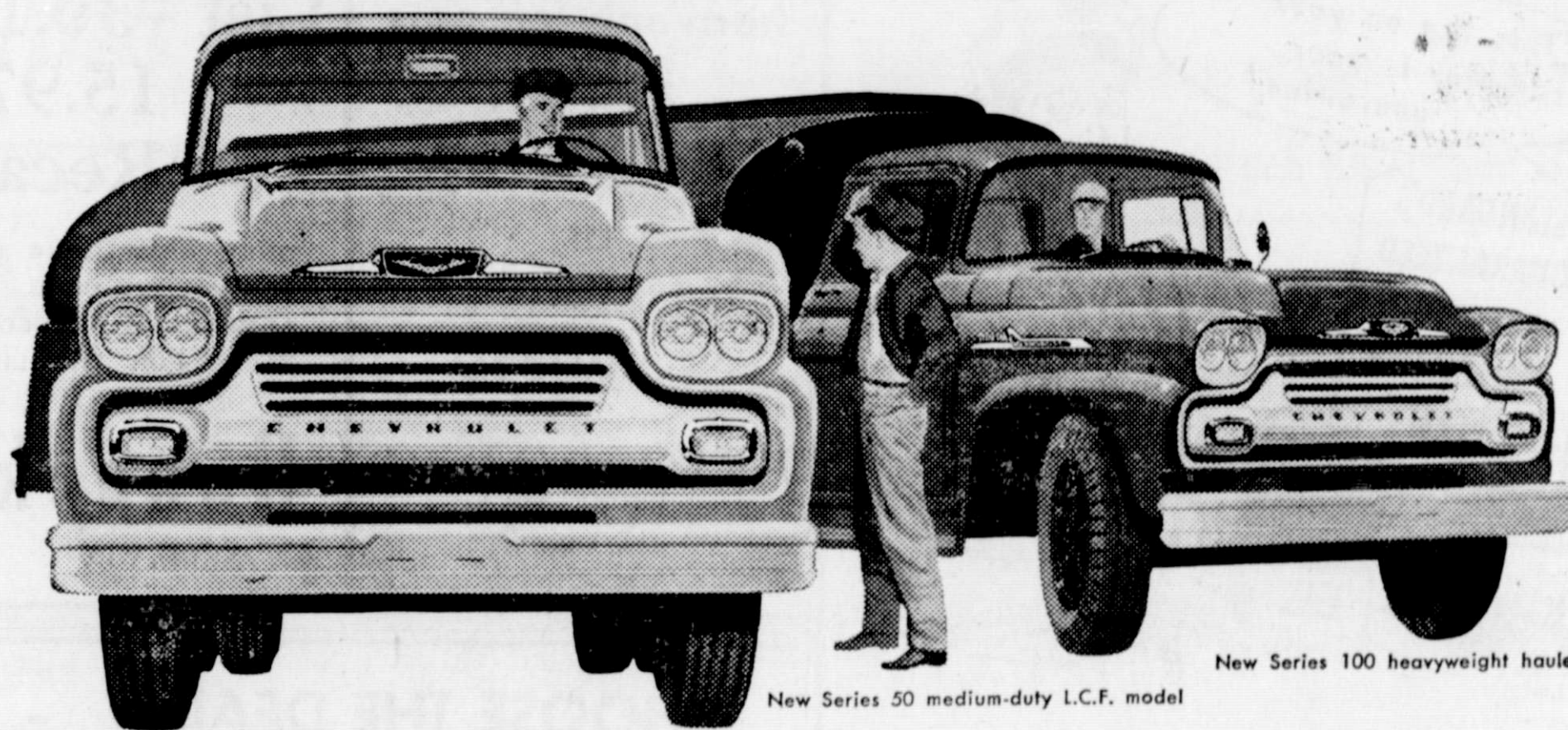
