HUNTERS CAUSE FIRE IN WOODS ON ED UELMEN FARM

Although the siren was not sounded, several members of the fire department contacted by phone took the equipment to the Ed Uelmen farm in the town of Auburn, near New Fane, at 5:45 p. m. Saturday to help put out a blaze in the woods, According to Clyde Smith, Kettle Moraine area state forest supervisor, the fire was started by careless hunters who attempted to smoke a squirrel out of a large hollow tree.

The conservation department fire fighting equipment and crew was first called and extinguished the flames which were spreading through dry leaves and grass in the woods. But they didn't have sufficient hose to reach the tree and Kewaskum firemen were summoned to finish the job. The tree, near the center of the woods, was very difficult to reach and firemen remained at the scene about two hours getting in and out of the woods and snuffing the blaze.



Board Authorizes Fire Department to Install Two Additional Sirens

Regular Meeting October 7, 1957

The Villaage Board of Kewaskum Washington County, Wisconsin me in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and al Board members present.

The minutes of the previous meet ing were approved as presented up on motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried.

Fire Chief H. J. Schaefer and Firemen J. Geidel and E. Kuepe appeared to discuss the installation of additional Fire sirens. Motion was made by J. Stellpflug, seconded by W. Tessar and carried that, unless the Village engineering firm specifies otherwise, the Fire Dept be authorized to purchase and in stall two (2) additional sirens to be strategically placed, one at the West side and one at the East side of the village.

Upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried, the Commissioner was authorized to enroll the Sewage Plant Operator as a member of the Central States Sewage and Industrial Wastes Association and to remit the required fee.

The Chief of Police was authorized to purchase, at the most advantageous price, two (2) tires for the squad car.

The Board, upon motion by M. Schaefer, seconded by J. Eberle and duly carried, authorized the purchase of a used furnace and stoker for the Village garage from Clayton Stautz for \$70.00 and a used sewer rcd from Mrs. Kluever for \$15.00.

The application of Fred Peck for an Operator's License was approved upon motion by J. Stellpflug, second. ed by M. Schaefer and carried and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee.

The objection of Lloyd Hron to the billing for curb and gutter was reviewed. It was the contention of the Board that the Village acted in good faith in accepting the advice of its engineering firm in removing the old curbing and constructing the new, that the billings as made was fair and just and therefore the objection must be denied.


