Campbellsport Begins Burning Garbage Here

Starting on Friday, Nov. 8, the village of Campbellsport will truck its garbage to Kewaskum for disposal. An agreement has been made by that village with Kewaskum for the use of the local \$70,000 incinerator for the burning of the garbage.

Cards were sent out last week to residents of Campbellsport by Village Clerk Eldon Spradau informing them how the garbage will be handled in the future and explaining what rules must be followed in order to have trucks of that village pick it up. Previously Campbellsport had hauled its garbage to a dump but the change was made because of the prevalent rat infestation and nauseating odors at the dump.

Rubbish collections will be made in Campbellsport Thursdays while garbage will be picked up starting late the same day and early Friday. The village of Kewaskum will be paid for each load hauled here to be burned.

PSYCHOLOGIST ADDED TO CHILD GUIDANCE CENTER, FILLS STAFF

With the arrival of the new clinical psychologist, the Washington-Ozaukee Child Guidance Center has realized its goal of a full staff for the first time since the center was established several years ago. Edwin A. Rautio of Pottstown, Pennsylvania, joined the staff on Oct. 10 and is presently working with Mr. Bauer, the psychiatric social worker, and Dr. Zell, the psychiatrist, in their quarters at 141 Main st., West Bend.

Mr. Rautio received his B.A. degree in psychology from the University of Massachusetts and his M.A. degree in clinical psychology from the University of Denver.

His past experience includes elementary teaching in the Denver public schools and serving in the capacity of psychologist at Pennhurst State school in Spring City, Pennsylvania.

Friends of the center are pleased that Mr. Rautio has joined the staff so that the center will be in a position to expand its services to the residents of Washington and Ozaukee counties.

Dedicate New High School This Sunday

PROGRAM IN AUDITORIUM TO BE FOLLOWED BY OPEN HOUSE OF BUILDING

The annual observance of National Education Week for this community will begin with the formal dedication of the new Kewaskum Community High school building this Sunday afternoon, Nov. 10. The dedicatory program will begin at 2:00 o'clock and will be held in the auditorium.

The program, which includes numbers by the band and girls' glee club of the high school, a piano solo by Carol Miller, and short talks by school and board of education personnel, will feature an address of dedication by George E. Watson, state superintendent of schools. Presiding will be Melvin Riley, president of the community high school board.

The complete program for the afternoon appeared in last week's issue of the Statesman.

Following the program of dedication all are invited to take a guided tour of the building. The public is cordially invited to attend the dedication and to tour the building. Senior students will serve as guides for the tour.

The \$600,000 (cost of building only) high school has a 22-teacher staff. The building includes eight conventional classrooms, two music rooms, two science rooms, a drafting room, two homemaking rooms, a library, cafeteria, ag shop and industrial arts room, spacious double gym which can seat 1,200 spectators. Heat is furnished by an oil-fired furnace.

Boy Hurt When Car Strikes His Bicycle

Paul, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Allen, Kewaskum, suffered head injuries when the bicycle he was riding was struck by an auto on East Main st. at about 3:50 p. m. Tuesday. The car was driven by Margaret L. Kalmus, 26, R. 2, West Bend.

The mishap occurred about 50 feet east of the Milwaukee river bridge on Main st. Mrs. Kalmus was westbound on the street when the boy drove his bike out from the rear of an eastbound moving vehicle into the path of the Kalmus auto. The front of the car struck the right side of the bicycle, throwing young Allen to the pavement. The right front headlight of the auto was damaged as was the frame of the bike. Mrs. Kalmus was traveling at a slow rate of speed.

The boy, a pupil at the Kewaskum public schools, was taken by Chief of Police Roland Pledl to a local physician's office for examination and then removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. His injuries were not believed serious.

Indians Hand League Leading N. Fondy First Defeat in 20-0 Upset

**SETBACK ENABLES BRANDON
TO TAKE OVER LEAD;
KEWASKUM THIRD**

The Kewaskum Indians threw the Tri-County conference football championship race into an uproar Tuesday night by upsetting highly favored, league leading, and previously undefeated North Fondy du Lac. And the Indians did it by a surprisingly decisive margin of 20 to 0 in an unexpected rout. This was Kewaskum's second 11-man game.

The setback dropped the Orioles out of first place for the first time this season. Brandon, which nosed out Campbellsport Tuesday afternoon, moved into the lead. North Fondy had won 5 and tied 1 game before being upset here. Brandon now has won 4 and tied 1. Kewaskum, with 4 and 2, has jumped into undisputed third place.

The Orioles, who have completed their regular season's schedule, now must await the outcome of two more games to be played by Brandon. At a meeting of conference officials last week it was agreed that all games postponed during the flu epidemic would be re-scheduled if they would have any effect on deciding the championship. Saturday afternoon Brandon will play at Random Lake and Tuesday in the finale Brandon hosts Oakfield. Two wins would give Brandon the title and a split would result in a tie for the title with N. Fondy. Two Brandon losses, hardly likely, would give the Orioles the championship.

Coach Ernie Mitchell's team, playing their best of the season, scored in the first, third and final

periods against Fondy. Dan Binder scored the first touchdown in the opening quarter on a 35-yard run and the extra point was missed. The score was 6-0 in the third period when Kewaskum's Norm Rodenkirch went over on a quarterback sneak and Binder ran the ball over for the extra point, making it 13-0. Then in the fourth quarter Mark Rodenkirch scored on a 50-yard run and Norm Rodenkirch made the extra point. North Fondy, up against an inspired Indian team didn't look like a championship team and were far outclassed. Their attack appeared weak.

This was Kewaskum's final tussle of the season. Although they have a postponed game against Hustisford's tail enders, this contest will not be made up because it has no bearing on the standings. The Indians have third clinched.
