Village Tax Rate Set at \$22.50 Per Thousand; Same Last Year

At the budget hearing held by the village board in meeting Monday evening, Dec. 2, the 1958 budget was approved and a tax rate of \$22.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation was adopted. This tax rate is the same figure as that set in 1956 by the board.

The main reason why the tax rate remained the same as last year is that the school levy showed an increase of only slightly more than \$8,000 while the village tax levy was decreased by approximately \$9,000 to balance the budget. There were no significant changes in the state and county taxes.

The 1957 tax rates and amounts levied are as follows: State—\$1,638.75 at the rate of \$0.2238 per thousand; county—\$32,362.46 at the rate of \$4.4195; school (Dist. 1 and 2)—\$92,154.50 at the rate of \$12.5849; state loan to school district No. 2—\$4,792.73 at the rate of \$0.6546; vocational school tax—\$169.82 at the rate of \$0.0232; village—\$15,096.74 at the rate of \$2.0616; debt retirement and interest—\$18,543.75 at the rate of \$2.5324; total levy—\$164,758.75 at the rate of \$22.50.

In comparison, the 1956 rates and amounts levied were: State—\$1,482.59 at the rate of 20 cents per thousand; county—\$31,635.88 at the rate of \$4.38; school—\$88,921.73 at the rate of \$12.33; village—\$31,710.77 at the rate of \$4.40; debt retirement and interest—\$8,576.68 at the rate of \$1.19; total—\$162,327.65 at the rate of \$22.50.

Dick Ehnert Wins FFA Corn Project Contest

Dick Ehnert, R. 1, Kewaskum, has won the Kewaskum F. F. A. chapter's corn project contest with an average of 123.6 bushels per acre. A total of 96 individual test yields were made, as many of the boys participating had several different hybrids and varieties.

Other boys getting 100 bushels or more per acre were Bruce Muckerheide, 112.8; Pat Muckerheide, 112.4; Harold Haack, 110.6; Eugene Mueller, 106.6; James Heisdorf, 105.7; Ronald Oppermann, 103.4, and Ronald Voeks, 101 bushels per acre.

Since 1957 was a comparatively dry year, especially in the Kettle Moraine sandy loam area, the chapter average was considerably lower, 72.3 bushels per acre. This average is still above the 1956 State of Wisconsin record average of 61 bushels and the indicated 1957 average of 59 bushels.

According to O. E. Behnke, vocational agriculture instructor at Kewaskum, there are about two tons of well dried corn in the shop from the yields brought in by the boys so that yields could be computed. The corn will be sold to the highest bidder by Dec. 6 and the proceeds put into the chapter treasury.

The following hybrid corn varieties were planted and donated by the companies: Pioneer 377A and 379A, Kingscrest KB4 and KL, Funks 85AA, 85A and 440, Wisconsin 464A, DeKalb 236 and 248, Renks R88A and R101.

Several Injured In Auto Mishaps

An auto driven by Robert M. Sparks, 18, Kewaskum, was extensively damaged at about 1:30 a. m. Friday at the intersection of Hwy. 45 and V at the overhead bridge north of the village. According to the accident report Sparks was traveling southeast on V when he failed to stop for the Hwy. 45 arterial. The vehicle struck a guard post and plunged into a 15 foot ravine on the east side of the intersection. Norman Hirsig, 18, Kewaskum, a passenger in the Sparks car, suffered a bruised hip.

Two people were injured Saturday morning in a collision on Hwy. 33 about three miles east of Allenton. The accident occurred as Martin Steinbach, 42, R. 1, Allenton, came over a hill and overtook a car driven by Alfred Krueger, 48, Campbellport. Unable to stop due to icy pavement, the Steinbach car struck the rear of the Krueger machine. Krueger lost control of his auto due to the impact and his car struck an electric pole and went into a field, while Steinbach's vehicle went into the ditch and through a fence. ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO REVISE, AMEND, REPEAL AND RE-CREATE SECTIONS 1, 6, 8 (e) AND 9 OF ORDINANCE NO 57-3 RELATING TO THE REGULATION OF TRAFFIC IN THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WISCONSIN.

The village board of the village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 1 of ordinance No. 57-2 is hereby amended to include the statutory provisions describing and defining regulations with respect to vehicles and traffic in the following enumerated sections of the Wisconsin statutes, exclusive of any provisions therein relating to the penalties to be imposed or the punishment for violation of said statutes, which are hereby adopted and by reference made a part of said ordinance:

- 342.40, 342.43 (2) (Motor Vehicle Auction Dealers)
- 343.125 (1) and (2) Chauffeurs' Licenses)
- 343.60, 343.61 (1) and (4), 343.62 (1), 343.71 and 343.72 (Driver School Regulations)
- 346.93 (Intoxicants in Vehicles Carrying Minor)

SECTION 2. Section 6 of ordinance No. 57-2 is hereby repealed and recreated to read as follows:

Section 6. Erection of Official Traffic Signs and Signals. The

village commissioner is hereby authorized and directed to procure, erect and maintain appropriate standard traffic signs, signals and markings conforming to the rules of the state highway commission giving such notice of the provisions of Sections 2, 3, 4 and 5 of this ordinance as required by state law. Signs shall also be erected in such locations and manner as authorized by the governing body as to give adequate warning to users of the street, alley or highway in question.

SECTION 3. Section 8 (e) of ordinance No. 57-2 is hereby repealed and recreated to read as follows:

(e) Statement of Notice. Any official or enforcement officer accepting a stipulation of guilt or a bail under the provisions of this section or prosecuting a violation of this ordinance shall comply with the provisions of ss. 343.27 and 343.29 of the Wisconsin statutes and shall inform the accused of the effect of a stipulation of guilt, forfeiture of bail or plea of guilty or nolo contendere. Such official or officer shall require the accused to sign a statement of notice which shall be in substantially the following form:

SECTION 4. Section 9 of ordinance No. 57-2 is hereby repealed and recreated to read as follows:

Section 9. References to Statutes. The term "Wisconsin statutes" wherever used in this ordinance shall mean the Wisconsin statutes of 1957, as amended, created or otherwise affected by the enactments of the 1957 legislature in regular and special session.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and (publication) as provided by law, except the provisions of ss. 342.40, 342.43 (2), relating to motor vehicle auction dealers, 343.125 (1) and (2), relating to chauffeurs' licenses; and 343.60, 343.61 (1) and (4), 343.62 (1), 343.71 and 343.72 relating to driver school regulations adopted by reference in section 1 of this ordinance which shall take effect January 1, 1958.

Record Christmas Mail Expected; Postmaster Urges Early Mailing

Acting Postmaster Harry E. Koch said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas. Post office facilities have been expanded, extra help will be available, and everything is geared up to handle a record Christmas mail in Kewaskum this year."

The postmaster suggested that you take special care in preparing gift packages for the mails. Make sure that all addresses are legible and complete.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the post office before attempting to mail them," the postmaster warns. The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your package.

When wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper for extra protection against shock, and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord. Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Another good idea is to place a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label of your package to prevent defacing in transit, and always make sure to include the recipients full name, street address, city, zone and state.

Postmaster Koch says that if you will follow these three simple rules, you are certain to have your gifts delivered before Christmas Day: Wrap them securely, address them correctly, and mail them early.

By sorting your Christmas cards and tying them in two separate bundles, stating All For Out Of Town Delivery, or All For Local Delivery, with the addresses all facing one way, you're sure to speed their arrival.

Christmas cards and packages for out-of-town destinations should be mailed before Dec. 10, and your Christmas mail for local delivery should be sent at least a week before Christmas.

Concluding his appeal for your help in "Mailing early for Christmas," the postmaster said, "I am counting on 'the lady of the house' to really make this campaign a big

success. She's usually the one who selects the Christmas cards, buys most of the gifts, and sees to it that the Christmas mailing list is up-to-date."

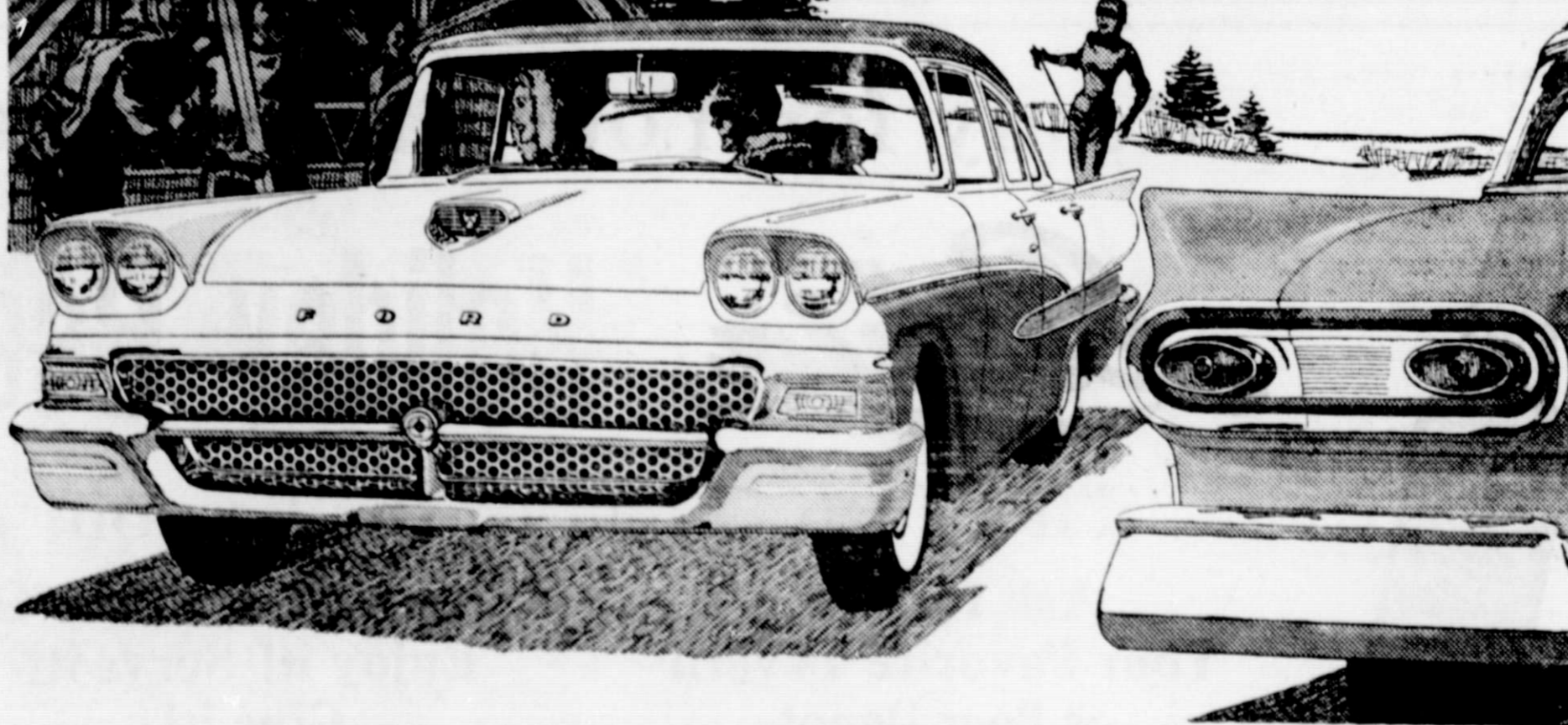
