TESSAR SCORES 36 POINTS; PLAY MAYVILLE SATURDAY FOR FIRST HALF TITLE

In another close, torrid battle the Kewaskum Chevrolets had to rally in the closing minutes again to come out on top of the West Bend Lithias here Sunday night. They won by only five points, 87-82, to clinch at least a tie for the first half title with one game left to play.

After racing up and down Kewaskum's huge floor, Lithia players, who used to complain of the small gym in year's past, voiced the opinion that they would almost rather be back in the old, small one.

Cedarburg and Horicon were both upset over the week end, eliminating them from the first half title race. That leaves only Kewaskum and Mayville, the usual contenders, in

the running and sets the stage for the important, deciding game between the two teams at Mayville this Saturday night. The Chevs have a 5-1 record and Mayville 4-2. A win for Kewaskum will clinch the title. A defeat will give them a tie with Mayville and necessitate a playoff for the first half championship. This should be a scorcher.
