## Explosion at Sewage Plant Tuesday Blows Off Concrete Deck of Sludge Storage Tank

### Windows Broken, Roof Damaged; Gas Causes Blast

A terrific explosion in the sludge storage tank at the Kewaskum sewage plant located just south of the village on the Kewaskum hill Tuesday afternoon blew off the thick concrete deck (or roof) of the large tank, shattered windows, broke a large window frame, damaged the sewage plant roof protruding out over the tank, twisted and broke a guard rail around the tank and caused other damage.

The blast occurred between 3 and 3:15 p. m. and is believed to have been caused by an accumulation of gas in the sludge tank. Repairs were being made in the basement of the plant at the time but it is not known whether this had anything to do with the cause of the explosion. Engineers will be called in later in an effort to determine the exact cause of the blast.

The superintendent of the plant, Adolph Grueschow, was the only person inside the building at the time. He was in the pump room on a lower floor when the explosion occurred and was not injured. The noise of the concussion was heard for some distance and scared persons residing in the area.

The sludge tank is on the south side of the sewage plant. It is built entirely of concrete and was covered by a concrete deck. The tank is a large one measuring about 16 feet square. Superintendent Grueschow stated that the safety valve on the deck of the tank was open and he was unable to understand how the explosion could have occurred. The tank was utilized to store sludge drawn off from the treatment tanks.

The concrete deck was blown apart and most of it dropped into and settled in the tank. Smaller chunks of the concrete and the broken safety valves were strewn around the area from the force of the concussion. About a dozen small windows immediately above the tank were shattered and the large frame holding the windows was bent out of shape. One large piece of concrete was thrown up against the protruding roof, knocking a hole into it and damaging it otherwise. A double railing around the tank was blown loose and twisted apart in sections.

No other damage was noticed at the time. An estimate of the damage was not made. The explosion will not impair the operation of the plant.

### Plan Mothers' March, Polio Benefit Dance Here for Dimes Drive

#### FIRST LARGE CONTRIBUTION MADE BY TAP AS CAMPAIGN GETS UNDERWAY IN COUNTY

The first sizeable contribution to the 1958 March of Dimes campaign in Washington county was made this week to Herbert Matenaer, general chairman, by the Teens Against Polio (TAP) organization.

The TAP, operating under the direction of Carl Ziegler, district chairman; Lynn Foell, county chairman, and Barbara Fuge, West Bend, city chairman, conducted a two-day "Blue Crutch" drive throughout this area last Friday and Saturday, Jan. 3 and 4, and turned the receipts over to Matenaer on Tuesday.

Chairman Matenaer stated that he was "very gratified" with the results of the "Blue Crutch" drive and expressed his appreciation to all the teenagers who participated in the fund raising event, thanking them for taking part and complimenting them on their ability to perform an outstanding act of service on behalf of the Washington county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

As the annual polio drive swung into high gear in the county, Matenaer also announced that March of Dimes fund appeals are being mailed this week and next to all rural residents of the county who have telephones. This is the first time in the history of the local polio chapter that this system of soliciting contributions is being used, the campaign director stated. He explained that the growth of the county over the past several years has made it extremely difficult to obtain drive chairmen from the townships with their ever-increasing populations. ### Essay Contest for Students Sponsored By Medical Society

MRS. R. G. EDWARDS, VILLAGE, CHAIRMAN OF EVENT FOR WASHINGTON COUNTY

The Washington-Ozaukee County Medical society is sponsoring an essay contest in conjunction with the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons' 12th annual national essay contest.

Mrs. R. G. Edwards, wife of Dr. R. G. Edwards of Kewaskum, is chairman of the event for the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Washington-Ozaukee County Medical society which is handling the contest for the society.

In addition to \$2,675 in prizes offered on the national level by AAPS, the Washington-Ozaukee Medical society has contributed \$200 on the county level for students in the two counties who enter the essay contest. The prizes will consist of \$100 for first place; \$50 for second place; \$25 for third; \$15 for fourth and \$10 for fifth place.

Nationally 14 major prizes are being offered with a first place prize of \$1,000; second place, \$500; third place \$250; and four prizes of \$100 each and seven prizes of \$75 each.

Contestants may choose the topic on which they prefer to write including "The Advantages of Private Medical Care" or "The Advantages of the American Free Enterprise System."

"Packaged Library" kits will be distributed to schools throughout Washington and Ozaukee counties for students who wish to enter the contest. Additional loan packets may be secured from the State Medical Society of Wisconsin at Madison, P. O. Box 1109, Madison, Wis., or directly from the national organization by addressing communications to the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons, Freedom Programs, Inc., 185 N. Wabash Ave., Chicago 1, Ill.

Actual writing competition began about Jan. 1, 1958 after the Christmas recess. Further information concerning the contest can be

obtained in circulars included in the packets to be distributed to the high schools.

Essays in the contest must be submitted to the chairmen before March 1, 1958 for the Washington-Ozaukee competition. Chairmen for Washington county include Mrs. Richard Driessel for West Bend; Mrs. Maurice Monroe is chairman for Hartford and Slinger; Mrs. James Albrecht for Jackson area and Mrs. R. G. Edwards for the Kewaskum area.

In Ozaukee county Mrs. Charles Kauth is chairman for Port Washington, Mrs. P. B. Blanch for Cedarburg and Mrs. K. Pelant for Grafton.

The first three winners in the Ozaukee-Washington county contest will be submitted nationally by April 1, 1958 to the AAPS Freedom Programs, Inc.

Physicians from throughout Washington and Ozaukee counties, members of the bi-county medical society, have contributed to the essay contest fund to make possible prizes on the bi-county level.

Winners in the bi-county contest will be entered in the national contest and will become eligible for the national prizes. There is no contest on the state level in Wisconsin, however.

Students from high schools throughout the two counties, Washington and Ozaukee are invited to enter the essay contest.

In addition to giving a general picture of the polio situation, each "Maller" contains a return envelope addressed to Matenaer at polio headquarters in West Bend. Matenaer expressed confidence that "the residents of Washington county will respond as they always have to the annual March of Dimes appeal and mail back their generous contributions to the 1958 drive as soon as possible."

The campaign director also extended his thanks to the women who are stamping and mailing the

letters this week, and to Mrs. Robert Haebig and Mrs. Joseph Weiss of West Bend under whose direction the mailing is taking place. He especially invited all residents of the county who do not receive a direct request for their contribution to send their donations directly to: Herbert Matenaer, March of Dimes Director, West Bend, Wis.

Plans for the annual Mothers' March Against Polio are also being formulated in West Bend, Barton, Kewaskum, Slinger, Jackson, Germantown and Newburg. This year the March will be conducted on the evening of Tuesday, Jan. 28, Matenaer said. Mrs. Robert Haebig is in charge of the event in West Bend. ## Mayville Beats Chevs to Tie for First Half Title; Championship Playoff Here Sunday

TESSAR SCORES 43 POINTS AS TEAM IS UPSET, 95-88

The Kewaskum Chevrolets were upset at Mayville Saturday night, 95-88, to end up in a tie for first place with that team in the first half title race in the Land o' Lakes league. Both teams have 5-2 records with play completed last week end and will play off for the first half championship in Kewaskum this Sunday night, an open date. A win at Mayville would have given the Chevs the undisputed crown.

Despite a 43-point scoring spree by the veteran, unstoppable Johnny Tessar, the loop's leading scorer, Kewaskum was unable to top the hot Mayville cagers. Tessar wound up with 36 points the week before in the West Bend game, giving him a total of 79 in his last two starts. He is well ahead in scoring with 201 points in 7 games in the first half, an average of 28.5 points per game.

The Chevs looked good in the first quarter as they took a 28-21 lead. Mayville put on a press and began rushing them at the start of the second period. By the time Kewaskum had solved this style the Maytags closed the gap and went ahead 51-49, at the intermission. The Chevs had a weak third stanza and fell 10 points behind, 79-69. They came back strong with one of their typical rallies in the final quarter to tie the count with two minutes left. But this time luck went the other way and Mayville put on a late surge to win by 7 points.

The losers played one of their better games of the season and fought hard but Mayville was too sizzling hot in shooting to match on their home floor. Helping the Chevs' cause a great deal was big Don Meisenheimer, who had one of his best nights and swished in 22 points. Augie Bilgo was a bearcat on rebounds and chipped in 9 points. Pace setters for the winners were Griepentrog with 23 points, Zimmerman with 16, Harvey with 14 and Genzmer with 10 points.

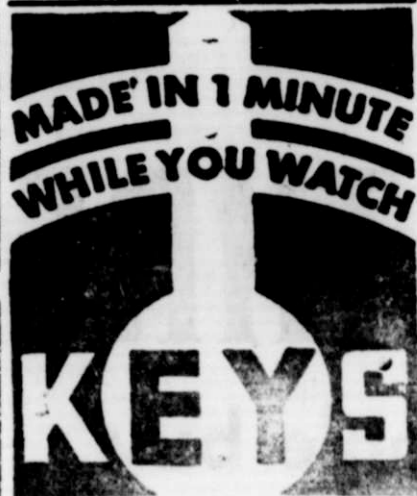

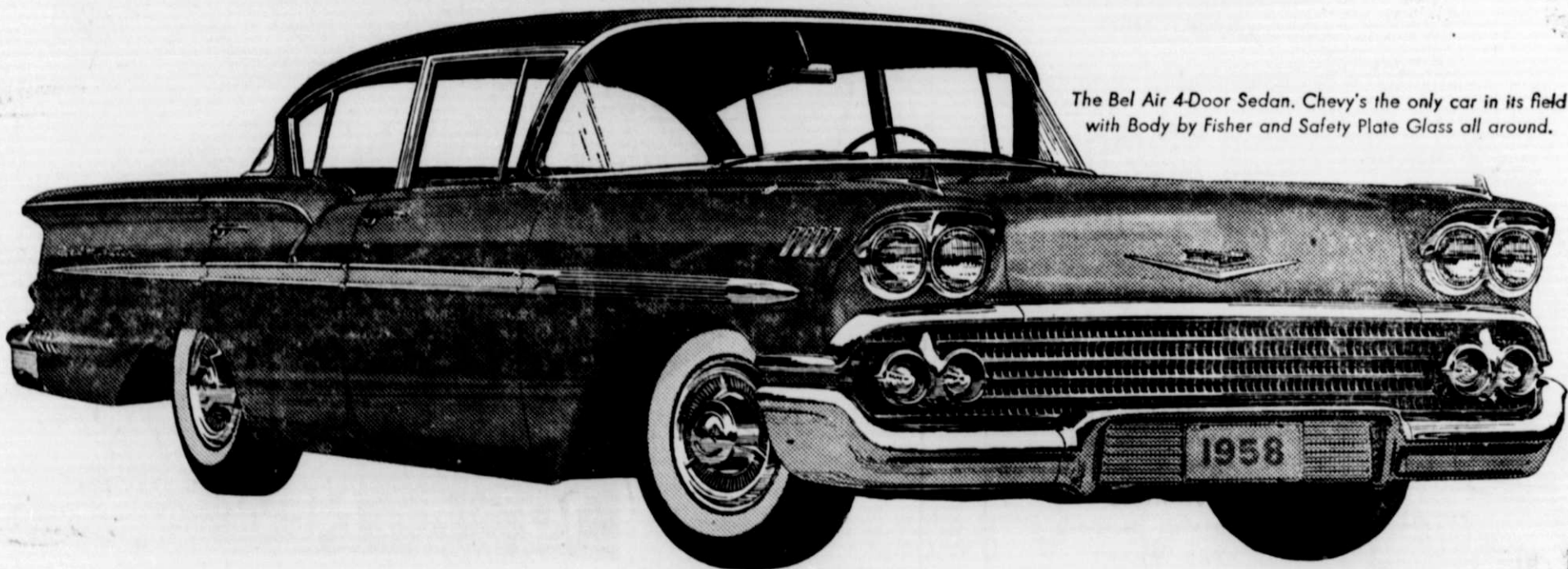

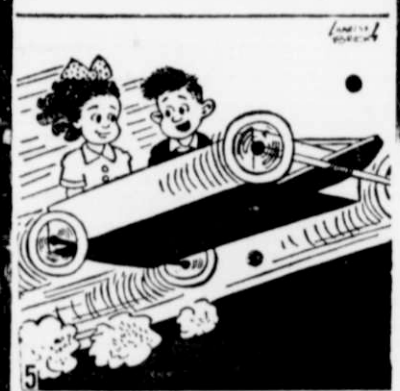
