Orv Behnke Resigns As High School Agriculture Instructor

Bernard Murray To Succeed Him, Begin Work Feb. 3

Orval Behnke has resigned after completing four years as vocational agriculture instructor in the Kewaskum Community High school, it was announced this week by Principal Clifford M. Rose. Behnke is discontinuing the teaching profession to enter the insurance business. He and his family will continue their residence in Kewaskum.

Behnke will be replaced as ag instructor by Bernard Murray, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, who taught for two years in the Holton (Michigan) High school. He was discharged from the armed services on Dec. 4, which will make it possible for him to begin his work in Kewaskum on Monday, Feb. 3.

The new instructor attended high schools in Marion and Eagle River, Wis. and graduated from the latter school in June, 1951. He won honors in high school as chapter farmer, was president of the FFA, captained the baseball team, represented his school at Badger Boy's State, was valedictorian of his graduating class and participated in forensics. Mr. Murray won his high school's honor scholarship and the Peter Young scholarship.

Mr. Murray, his wife and child will move to Kewaskum during the last week in January. We welcome them to our community. Before her marriage Mrs. Murray taught in the West Bend schools.

Behnke made many fine contributions to the school as a member of the high school staff and I am certain that his associations with the adults in the community as instructor of the adult evening classes were numerous and well received. We regret having Mr. Behnke leave us and the teaching profession for we feel that he is that type of person we need and like to see working with our young people. Polio Still Threat For 29 Million

The danger of paralytic polio attacks in substantial numbers will continue to exist so long as millions of Americans of susceptible age fail to get Salk shots, spokesmen for the March of Dimes

Although 80,000,000 persons have been vaccinated, 29,000,000 persons, or 27 per cent of the 109,000,000 up to 40 years old, had received no Salk protection

near year's end. March of Dimes officials also reported that only 35,000,000or 32 per cent of polio's most potential target—had availed themselves of the full three-shot series that provides 90 per cent immunity.

The March of Dimes is now winding up its month-long campaign here and across the country to raise funds needed in 1958 for the care and rehabilitation of thousands of polio patients. Urging all the unvaccinated—and the partly vaccinated—to complete the three-shot series is also an important part of the

drive.
"If we had any reservations about the vaccine's power, the 1957 decline in new polio cases pretty well dispels them," one spokesman said. "There were about 7,500 cases last year, which compares with 15,400 the year before and a 35,266 yearly average between 1952-56.

"We can still knock out new polio if we use available supplies of vaccine now. If unprotected people only knew of the physical suffering and personal tragedies polio might have in store, they wouldn't hesitate."
