## Alice Kumrow Wins Homemaker Award

RECEIVES HIGHEST SCORE IN HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW EXAM AT HIGH SCHOOL

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow in Kewaskum High school is Alice Kumrow, R. 1, Kewaskum.

She received the highest score in a written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes, administered Dec. 3, to senior girls in the graduating class. Her examination paper will be entered in competition to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and will also be considered for the runnerup award in the state. For her achievement, she will receive an award pin designed by Trifari of New York.

The national winner in the fourth annual Betty Crocker search conducted among 327,000 young women in 11,800 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools will be named April 17 at a banquet in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City.

General Mills is sponsor of the program designed to assist schools in education for home and family living. This year's huge entry brings the four-year participation over the million mark. A total of 1,071,000 girls has enrolled in this national homemaking project since it was launched in 1955. A total of \$106,000 in scholarships will be awarded this year.

Each state Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York City. A \$500 scholarship will be awarded the second ranking girl in each state. The school of the state winner will receive a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica.

The scholarship of the young woman named All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000. Girls who rank second, third and fourth in the nation will receive \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

## Local Civil Defense Group Attends Award Dinner in Milwaukee

HEAR TALK BY GOV. HOEGH, FEDERAL CIVIL DEFENSE ADMINISTRATOR

Members of your civil defense group in Kewaskum, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Martin, Gottlieb Walz, Mr. and Mrs. Roland Pledl and Miss Bernice Trapp, attended the Milwaukee Junior Chamber of Commerce distinguished service award dinner in the Wisconsin Club, Jan. 21, to hear the special talk by Gov. Leo A. Hoegh, federal civil defense administrator.

Due to the snow storm, Mr. Hoegh could not come in from Washington D. C., therefore, his speech was teletyped to Milwaukee in the afternoon and read at the banquet by Frank Starr, Battle Creek, Michigan, regional civil defense director, who had come in to Milwaukee Monday.

In his speech, Mr. Hoegh said: "One of the major roadblocks in development of a truly protective civil defense program is the basic federal law under which my agency operates. The existing legislation, passed during the Korean war, declares that civil defense is primarily the responsibility of the several states and their political subdivisions.

"Does anyone here actually believe that the state of Wisconsin, or the city of Milwaukee, or Sheboygan, or perhaps the residents of Fond du Lac, are primarily responsible for self-defense against foreign invasion?"

He said that the Durham bill, which creates a federal-state-local partnership for civil defense and permits direct aid to every level of government, had been unanimously passed by the house of representatives and is now in the senate armed services committee.

"Passage of it is vital to every level of civil defense," he declared. He said that urging its passage was one of the most important things a citizen could do to strengthen CD, along with acquainting yourself with the civil defense regulations in your own community.

Mr. Hoegh emphasized that national preparedness is the major weapon against war—preparedness in a military as well as a non-military way. He called this "Operation You." Attack is not likely when the enemy knows that a country's defenses, as well as every private citizen, are well prepared for any attack.

He summarized what we can do toward this end now:

1. Have a family shelter, preferably in the basement, equipped with two weeks supply of food and water. This shelter should also have a battery-operated radio.
2. Become acquainted with the warning signals, and what they mean. The signals for Kewaskum have been published in this newspaper previously, and additional copies are available at the Kewaskum Municipal building.
3. Have a community plan for emergency action.
4. Protection from radio-active fallout.
5. First-aid knowledge.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the Campbellsport E and R church, the Rev. Dale

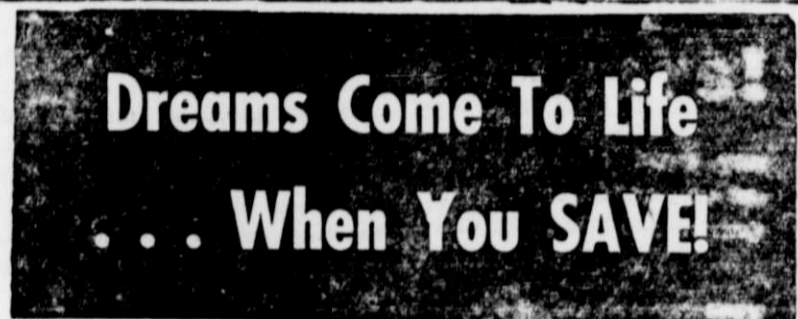

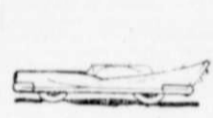

## 25 Years Ago

Jan. 27, 1933

An old cheese factory 3 miles west of Campbellsport on Hwy. 67, occupied by Paul Kleinhans, was raided by federal prohibition agents Tuesday. It is reported that a 350 gallon still was found in the residence as well as a quantity of mash and alleged liquor. The equipment was destroyed and the liquor and mash dumped. The automobile of Mr. Kleinhans was also taken.

Joe Reiner of West Allis and Edward and Andrew Schroeder of Saukville were arrested in Milwaukee and admitted the hold-up and shooting of the late Arthur J.

Koch of Beechwood. The shooting was committed about midnight July 8, 1932 during a holdup. The three escaped without taking any money. With Koch at the time was Arthur Fritz, an employee. Thinking it was a joke, Mr. Koch, who was behind the bar, refused to raise his hands when commanded to do so. One of the men shot and practically the entire charge of No. 410 gunshot entered his body, most of which lodged in the liver. The deputy sheriff, George F. Brandt of Kewaskum, was called. Mr. Koch was rushed to the Sheboygan hospital where he recuperated but died at his home on Dec. 8 of blood clots from the shot wounds.

Mrs. William Gossman, 55, of

New Fane died at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, Jan. 25, due to injuries she sustained when she fell down the basement steps at her home the Sunday before. She severed the spinal cord and fractured bones in her neck. Mrs. Henry Firks, 68, of New Fane also died at the hospital.

Figuring the normal average of three persons for every paper circulated, 2,400 persons glance through the pages of the Statesman each week. So if you aren't a regular advertiser, now's the time to start. An increase in business will be your yardstick in showing how it is paying off. The big agencies are turning to it more and more and they ought to know.

To show you how quick advertising gets results—one businessman advertised for a night watchman and the next night he was robbed already. Another man in business who went broke blamed it all on advertising. He didn't advertise but his competitors did.

About time we got around to thanking Louis Bath for the delicious oranges he sent up from Florida.

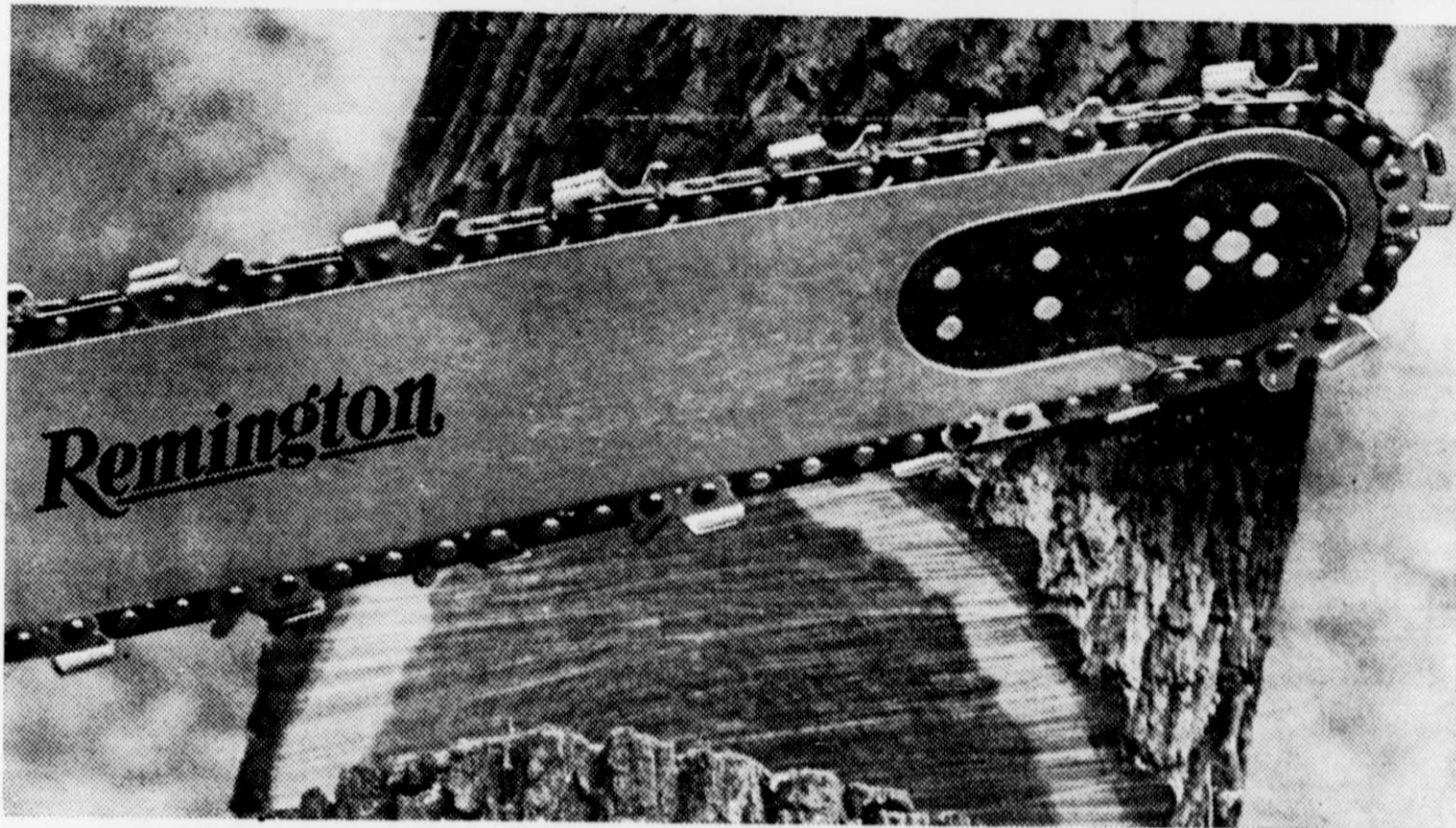

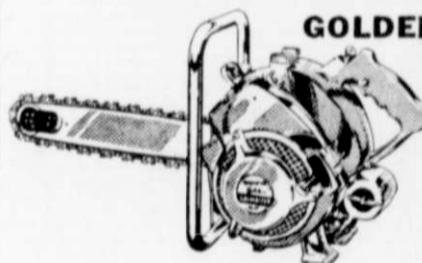

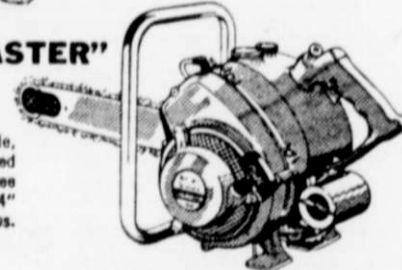

The club members voted for each member to be given a 4-H pencil in honor of having 100% achievement in 1957.

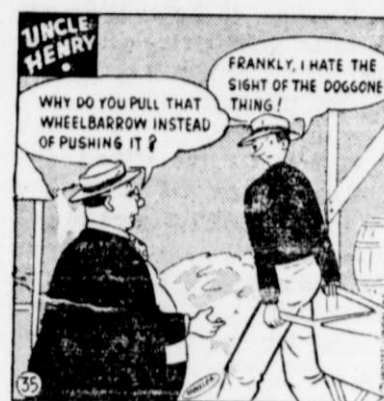

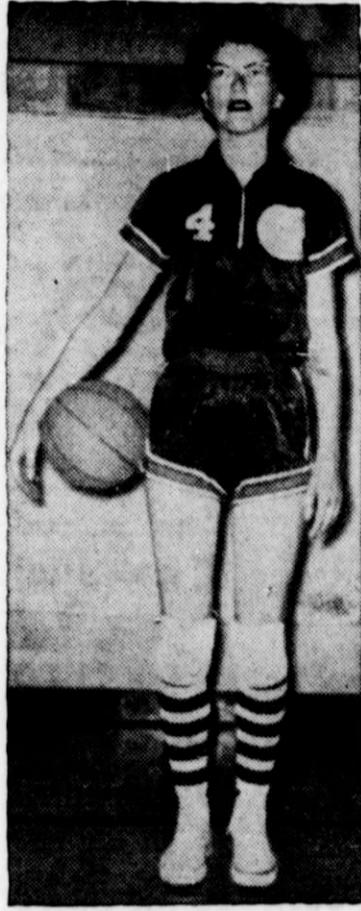

### Indians Upset First Place Dalers, 52-48; Nosed Out at Brandon

The Kewaskum Indians pulled the upset of the season by knocking off league leading Rosendale here Tuesday night, 52-48, in a surprise. The victory gave the Indians a 6-3 record and a second place tie with Campbellsport. The Dalers still occupy the top spot with 7-2 for the season but the race is a tight one again.

A sad note was also detected in Kewaskum's play the past week when they were nosed out at Brandon by the 7th place team Friday night, 67-65. This was an unexpected upset for Brandon. Had the Indians won this one, as was expected, they would now hold a first place tie with Rosendale. This setback could cost them the conference championship. However, the team is doing better than expected at the beginning of the season.

The Mitchellmen gained their upset over favored Rosendale Tuesday from the free throw line. Kewaskum dropped in 20 gift tosses while the Dalers could make good

on only 10. The fouls were practically the same on both sides. The Indians sank only 16 baskets compared to 19 for the opponents.

The game was well played and extremely close throughout, keeping the fans screaming and on the end of their seats. Kewaskum trailed 14-10 at the quarter but scored 14 points to the Dalers' 8 in the second period to go ahead by 24-22 at halftime. During the entire second half not more than a few points separated the teams at any time. The winners dropped in 15 and Rosendale 12 to make the third quarter score 37-34.
