GOAL SET AT 100 PINTS FOR MOBILE UNIT'S VISIT TO HIGH SCHOOL

A blood donor clinic will be held ir Kewaskum on Friday, March 7, when local residents who are members of this area's Community Blood Donor club will try to match the success of the recent mobile unit in West Bend.

The blood clinic here will be held between 1 and 6 p. m. in the new Kewaskum High school gymnasium, it was announced this week by Henry Rosenheimer, chairman of the event, and a director of the Community Donor club. Goal for the unit will be 100 pints of blood.

Patients who are residents of the Kewaskum community have used 140 pints of blood from the Community Donor club "bank" since the last mobile unit was held in the village in August of 1957, it was pointed out. All residents of the area are automatically entitled to the service of the blood program.

The Kewaskum Woman's club is assisting with the campaign and the women's group of Peace E and R church will prepare and serve refreshments to the donors.

#### **County Heart Fund Drive Is Underway**

DOOR-TO-DOOR COLLECTION IN COUNTY PLANNED FOR FEB. 23, HEART SUNDAY

Disease of the heart and blood vessels were again responsible for more deaths in Washington county during the past year than all other

Based on statistics compiled by the Wisconsin Heart association, 185 of the deaths in Washington county during 1956 were due to heart and circulatory diseases With deaths from all causes during the period totaling 352 deaths from cardiovascular diseases amounted to over 50 per cent.

According to Attorney Deane R Bascom, chairman of the 1958 Heart Fund, these figures are based on statistics collected by the Wisconsin State Board of Health. They closely parallel the national pattern for 1956, the latest year for which vital statistics for all of the United States are available. On the national level, deaths resulting from diseases of the heart and blood vessels accounted for 53.9 per cent of the total deaths.

The 1958 Heart Fund drive now being conducted in Washington ucation and community programs of the Wisconsin Heart Association, will continue until the climax Feb. 23, Heart Sunday, when Heart Fund volunteers will conduct a door-to-door collection covering most of the county.


#### **Chevs Shade Horicon** On Late Rally, 68-67, **Take Undisputed Lead**

## **Village Board Reviews Recommended Changes**

PASS RESOLUTION TO ALLOW SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS ON PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS

> Regular Meeting February 3, 1958

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with Village Attorney O'Meara acting as temporary chairman. In the absence of President Reigle, Trustee Stellpflug, upon motion made, seconded and duly carried, presided as acting President. All Trustee members were present.

The minutes of the previous meetings, upon motion by M. Schaefer, seconded by J. Eberle and duly carried, were accepted as presented.

Mr. Clifford Stautz, representing School Dist. No. 2 presented a request for adjustment on their 4th quarter Water bill for water used in sprinkling athletic field. Request was rejected because such adjustment would be in violation of Public Service Commission rules.

Mr. T. C. McManus of the Mc-Mahon Engineering Co. reviewed with the Board his recommendation of changes in the street development report. It was decided that another meeting on this report would be held February 17, 1958 at 7:30 P. M.

The following ordinance was introduced by Trustee J. Eberle:

ORDINANCE NO. 58-1 THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWAS-KUM, WASHINGTON COUN-TY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

The grade or elevation of the centerline, curbs and gutters and sidewalks of the Village streets is hereby fixed and permanently established as proposed on maps on file with the Village Commissioner and prepared by McMahon Engineering Company of Menasha. Wisconsin, said maps dated Februpry 3, 1958.

WHEREAS, the Village Board Schaefer's Service, deems it necessary in the best interests of the village that special assessments to defray the cost of In Street Development public improvements in the Village Miller Electric, Light Bulbs

have the cost thereof spread over a period of four (4) years at the option of the party against whom such special assessment is levied.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RE-SOLVED, by this Village Board that special assessments levied to defray the cost of any public improvements may be paid in annual installments in accordance with the provisions of Section 66.54 (7) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED. that the provisions of Section 66.54 (7) of the Wisconsin Statutes shall be limited, in that all annual installment payments of special assessments authorized hereunder shall be paid for within a period of four (4) years from the date of the resolution making the levy, and that the interest on the deferred installments shall be charged at the rate of one-half per cent (1/4)% per annum per month.

It was moved by Trustee Tessar and seconded by Trustee Merwin that resolution No. 58-1 shall be adopted. Upon roll call vote, there being 4 "AYE" and 2 "NAYE", the resolution was declared adopted.
