## 7 Candidates Seek 3 Village Trustee Offices

FILE NOMINATION PAPERS FOR SPRING ELECTION TUESDAY, APR. 1

Last Friday, Mar. 14, was the deadline for candidates to file nomination papers for the three trustee offices and justice of the peace office to be elected in the spring election in the village on Tuesday, April 1.

There will be opposition for the trustee offices on the ballot, on which seven candidates will seek election to the three positions. Incumbent trustees whose terms will expire are Arvin Merwin, Carl F. Schaefer and Marvin Schaefer. All three will seek re-election and will be opposed by three new candidates, namely Henry Becker, Marie Dei, Luke Mueller and Joseph Schwind.

Robert G. Kroncke is the only candidate for the two-year term as justice of the peace.

The three trustees and justice are the only offices to be elected this year. The three other trustees, Joe Eberle, John Stelplug and Wayland Tessar, and other village officials hold over in office for another year.

The election will be held in the municipal building and the polls will be open from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m. on Tuesday, April 1.

## 3 Teenagers Hurt In Accidents, Car Rams Semi-Tractor

Patricia Kucharek, 19, of R. 3, Campbellsport, (Forest lake), was injured at about 1:45 a. m. Sunday in an auto crash on East Water st. in the village. Miss Kucharek was traveling south on the street when she lost control of her auto, which careened onto the Schaefer Trucking Co. parking lot and crashed into a large semi-tractor owned by Henry Timblin, 23, Kewaskum.

The car struck the semi-tractor, which was parked off the street on the lot, with terrific force, pushing it sideways against another semi-tractor and trailer owned by Timblin which was parked parallel to the first truck. Both trucks and the automobile were damaged. The entire front of the car was pushed in and property damage to the left front side of the truck was estimated at approximately \$4,000. The second truck received only minor damage.

Miss Kucharek suffered deep lacerations to her head, cuts on both legs and knees and bruises throughout her body. She was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl reports that following the accident Ellsworth Horne, R. 3, Campbellsport, with whom Miss Kucharek makes her home, was arrested for reckless driving. He was charged with speeding past the scene of an accident when red warning beacons were in operation, failing to stop for a stop sign and passing emergency vehicles.

Two youths were seriously hurt and a third received lesser injuries at 11:15 p. m. Saturday when their car went out of control on County Trunk V at the north Campbellsport village limits and rolled over at least twice, coming to a stop on the high school football field.

Ronald Johann, 19, of St. Michaels, suffered a serious head injury and a severe cut on his left eye; Curtiss Prescott, 19, Allenton rural route, who graduated from Kewaskum High school, sustained a serious head injury, and Richard Niedzwiecki, 17, Menomonee Falls, received chest and arm injuries. Two other youths escaped unhurt.

Johann, the driver, and Prescott were removed by Campbellsport ambulance to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac. Niedzwiecki was treated by a Campbellsport physician.

Thomas McBride, 17, Menomonee Falls, formerly of Kewaskum, one of the passengers who escaped injury, told authorities that Johann was traveling southeast on V when a truck approached from the opposite direction. McBride did not know exactly what happened but said that the Johann auto left the road and rolled over. He reported that he and his companions had to raise the demolished auto in order to free one of the injured, reportedly Prescott, who was pinned beneath.

The investigating officer said that the car showed skid marks of 41 paces to the edge of the blacktop surface, traveled another 25 paces off the road to where it dug into the ground, then rolled 23

## No Action Is Taken on Annexation of Areas to Local School District

ISSUE TO BE RECONSIDERED AT MEETING ON APRIL 16; 250 ELECTORS ATTEND

The hearing on the proposed annexation of areas of the towns of Farmington and Barton to the Kewaskum Union High school district at the Kewaskum High school last Thursday evening was attended by approximately 250 electors.

A petition of residents of the areas proposed for annexation was submitted opposing such action. No action was taken following the hearing.

Following the public hearing a joint committee met and decided to withhold a decision on the matter until the school committee can meet with the Kewaskum school board on Apr. 16 to further consider the matter.

According to Deane Bascom, chairman of the Washington County School committee and chairman of the joint committee of Washington and Fond du Lac counties, opinion was divided on the annexation.

The director of the Cheeseville school board, Hiram Larson, stated that the majority of the electors present at the meeting were opposed to annexation of the new districts.

## Mrs. Lehman P. Rosenheimer Dies Monday

Mrs. Lehman P. Rosenheimer, 76, a well known resident of Kewaskum, passed away at 12:05 a. m. Monday, Mar. 17, at Columbia hospital, Milwaukee, following an extended illness of about six months. She had been a patient at the hospital for the past 22 weeks. Her late husband was a prominent Kewaskum merchant, civic leader, village official and club member.

Mrs. Rosenheimer, nee Mathilda Lay, was born on Mar. 18, 1882, in Kewaskum, a daughter of the late H. J. Lay and Katherine Petri Lay. She was a lifelong resident of this village. Her marriage to Lehman P. Rosenheimer took place on Jan. 24, 1907, and he preceded her in death four and one-half years ago, on Sept. 25, 1963.

Mrs. Rosenheimer was the mother of four children, one of whom, Dr. Robert J. Rosenheimer, predeceased her. Surviving are two daughters, Florence (Mrs. E. F. Vilter) of Milwaukee and Ruth (Mrs. Wm. E. Wierdsma), also of Milwaukee, and one son, Lehman L. Rosenheimer of Kewaskum. She also leaves seven grandchildren, one great-grandson, and many other relatives and close friends. A brother, Otto E. Lay, Kewaskum, died in 1941.

She was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, West Bend chapter, a charter member of the Kewaskum Woman's club, a member of Peace E and R church and the Ladies' Guild of that church, and a former member of the Kewaskum library board.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday and at the Peace E and R church from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 o'clock Wednesday. The Rev. C. F. Hammen officiated at the last rites, following which burial took place in the Rosenheimer family cemetery at Slinger.

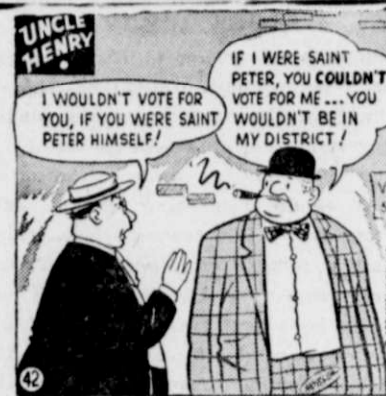

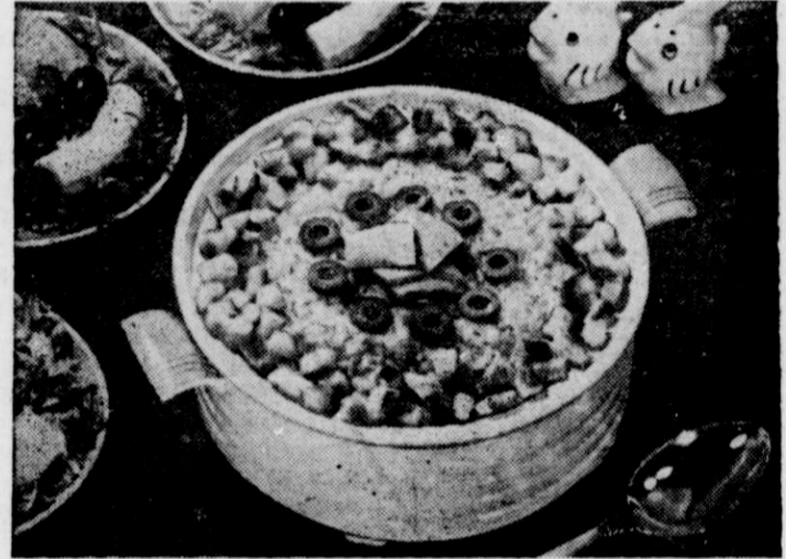

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/4 teaspoon tabasco sauce

Spread the bread with softened butter and cut into one-inch squares. Place half the squares in a buttered 1 1/2 quart casserole dish. Sprinkle 3/4 of the cheese over this and top with sliced olives, saving a few for garnish.
