Deaths of Henry Muckerheide and Mrs. Clara Ramel

Henry C. Muckerheide, 79, a lifetime resident and former official of the town of Kewaskum, passed away at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, early Tuesday, Mar. 25, one week after suffering a heart attack.

Mr. Muckerheide did custom sawing and threshing for many years. He also formerly served as town chairman and supervisor for the town of Kewaskum for several years.

He was born on Nov. 27, 1878 in the town of Kewaskum, a son of the late William and Dorothy Muckerheide. His marriage to the former Rose Haug took place on June 8, 1909, in Holy Trinity church Kewaskum. She predeceased him on Dec. 11, 1952.

Surviving are two daughters and two sons, Odella (Mrs. Neal Nicholson) of Hartford, Elizabeth (Mrs. Anthony Kerry) of West Bend, Al and Sylvester Muckerheide, both of R. 2, Kewaskum; nine grandchildren, five great-grandchildren, four sisters, Elizabeth (Mrs. Dorwin Perkins) of R. 2, Kewaskum, Rose (Mrs. Oscar Thull) of West Bend, R. R., Marie (Mrs. William Holzmer) of Kenosha, and Miss Agnes Muckerheide of R. 2, Kewaskum, and one brother, John Muckerheide of R. 2, Kewaskum.

Mr. Muckerheide was a member of the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity congregation.

The body was in state after 2 p. m. Thursday at Miller's Funeral home. Funeral services were held at 9:30 a. m. Friday in Holy Trinity church, the Rev. F. C. La Buwi officiating. Burial took place in the new parish cemetery.

Mrs. Clara Ramel, 75, nee Moldenhauer, who made her home with her son Herbert in Kewaskum, passed away on Monday, Mar. 24, at the Enders Nursing Home at Glenbeulah.

She was born on Oct. 1, 1882, in the town of Kewaskum and was a resident of Kewaskum and surrounding area most of her life. Mrs. Ramel also made her home at West Bend and near Boltonville for several years. Her marriage to Frank Ramel took place in 1905 and he preceded her in death on June 26, 1918. The deceased was a daughter of the late Martin and Albertina Moldenhauer.

Mrs. Ramel was the mother of five sons, three of whom, Alvin, Harvey and Raymond, predeceased her. Surviving are Herbert of Kewaskum and Ruben of Boltonville. She also leaves one daughter-in-law, four grandchildren and two brothers, Joseph Moldenhauer of Kewaskum and Paul Moldenhauer of R. 1, Kewaskum.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Wednesday until 11 a. m. Thursday and at St. Lucas Lutheran church from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. Thursday. The Rev. Gerhard Kanless officiated and interment was in St. John's Lutheran cemetery, New Fane.

There will be no Division I unstarred ratings as in the past. The new plan will of necessity considerably limit the giving of Division I ratings, and judges were so instructed.

Here is the new rating system as it now stands:

Division I—Superior. Represents the very best conceivable performance for the event and class being judged. This replaces the Division I, starred.

Division II—Excellent. An unusual performance, commendable in many respects. A performance of distinctive quality only slightly below Division I rating, due to minor defects in performance or interpretation. This takes the place of

Voters to Elect Three Village Trustees Apr. 1

SEVEN CANDIDATES IN RACE; COUNTY, STATE JUDGES ALSO TO BE VOTED ON

Opposition for the trustee offices to be elected has caused interest in the spring election next Tuesday, Apr. 1, to gain momentum this week as the day for casting ballots for village, county and state offices approaches.

Seven candidates are in the race for the three village trustee offices to be elected. The three incumbents, Arvin Merwin, Carl F. Schaefer and Marvin Schaefer, are seeking re-election. They will be opposed by Henry Becker, Marie Dei, Luke Mueller and Joseph Schwind, all newcomers running for office. A justice of the peace for a two year term will also be elected. Robert G. Kroncke is the only candidate for this office.

It is expected that Tuesday's election will attract a good turnout of voters because of the contest for the trustee offices. With four new candidates hoping to unseat the present office holders, discussions on the candidates and election have been on the increase daily in the village as the day for balloting draws near.

Voters will also cast ballots for a justice of the supreme court with Emmet L. Wingert, who was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the death of former Justice Edward Gehl, being opposed by William H. Dietrich, Hartford attorney.

Judge Milton L. Meister, Washington county judge, is unopposed for election as the first judge of the newly created 25th circuit which is composed of Washington and Ozaukee counties.

Voting in Kewaskum will be done at the municipal building and the election polls will be open at 9 a. m. and close at 6 p. m. Absentee ballots for the spring election are now available at the village commissioner's office and may be filled out there up until the day before election.

80 Local Students Complete Driver Education Course

Announcement was made this week by Principal Clifford M. Rose that 80 students at Kewaskum high school have just completed a classroom course in driver education. Student certificates indicating satisfactory completion of the program have been issued by the motor vehicle department. They are accepted in lieu of the knowledge test if application is made within one year for a permit to learn to drive.

"The most important objective of a driver education course is to help young people become better citizens through the acquisition of knowledge and improved attitudes in relation to the proper use of motor vehicles under all conditions. Accident statistics reveal that the majority of traffic accidents are brought about by human errors," the principal said.

The instructor, Eugene LaMarche, has devoted many hours to acquaint the students with the rules of the road and good driving practices. Much time was spent on evaluation of the physical, mental and emotional qualifications of drivers and understanding the application of these factors in safer driving.

\$50,050 in County Aids Paid School Districts

County aids totaling \$50,050.00 have been mailed to the treasurers of school districts of Washington county this past week.

School districts that meet all of the requirements are paid at the rate of \$350.00 per teacher. The West Bend City School District Jt. No. 1 received \$11,200.00; the city of Hartford, \$8,750; village of Barton, \$1,750.00; village of Germantown, \$1,400.00; village of Jackson, \$1,050.00; village of Kewaskum, \$2,800.00, and the village of Slinger, \$4,550.00. All other districts did receive amounts in proportion to the number of teachers employed.

Each November, Washington county levies a tax for common school aid. All common schools that levy a tax of at least 3 mills of their full valuation for the operation and maintenance of their school for the previous year are eligible for this aid. Districts operating both elementary and secondary schools must levy at least 5 mills to qualify.

Eligibility for county school aid is determined by the State Department of Public Instruction and such certification is made to the county clerk.

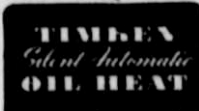

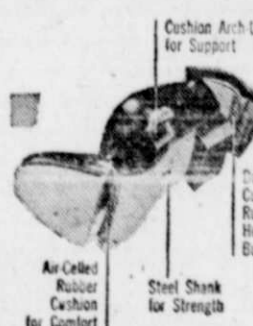

Other boys on the squad but not on the team, who came out night after night for practice to make the team better included Otto Weddig, Killan Honck, Herbert Hopkins, Delbert Backhaus, Earl Bartelt, Sylvester Muckerheide, Robert Rosenheimer, Marlin Kocher and Sylvester Volm. Frank Nitz and George Pierringer, both married men from Port Washington, were arrested by

Sheriff Freund of Fond du Lac county in connection with the robbing of Strachota's store at St. Killan on Feb. 21. They are awaiting hearing and bond has been set at \$1,000 each. The arrest came after Sheriff Freund and Marshall Geo. F. Brandt had been working on the case. Merchandise found at Port was identified by Mr. Strachota.

New article of incorporation papers to reorganize the Kewaskum Creamery, were filed with the secretary of state. Names appearing on the papers are Thomas and Wm. R. McCaul and R. E. Sheppard of Tomah. Officers of the new organization will be elected.

The West Bend National Bank was permitted to open, the restrictions being of anti-hoarding nature and for the gold retention.

Icy roads were responsible for an auto accident on Hwy. 55 in the marsh south of the village, in which Mrs. Anthony Fellenz of the village suffered injuries to her head and leg. Her husband, the driver, escaped injury. They collided with a car driven by William Taube, Milwaukee. Both cars were damaged considerably.

Spring officially commenced Monday but Old Man winter did

not want to leave us. He shed his blanket of snow to the tune of eight inches that day. The snowfall ushered in spring with God's blessing. The snow blocked roads and kept snowplows busy.

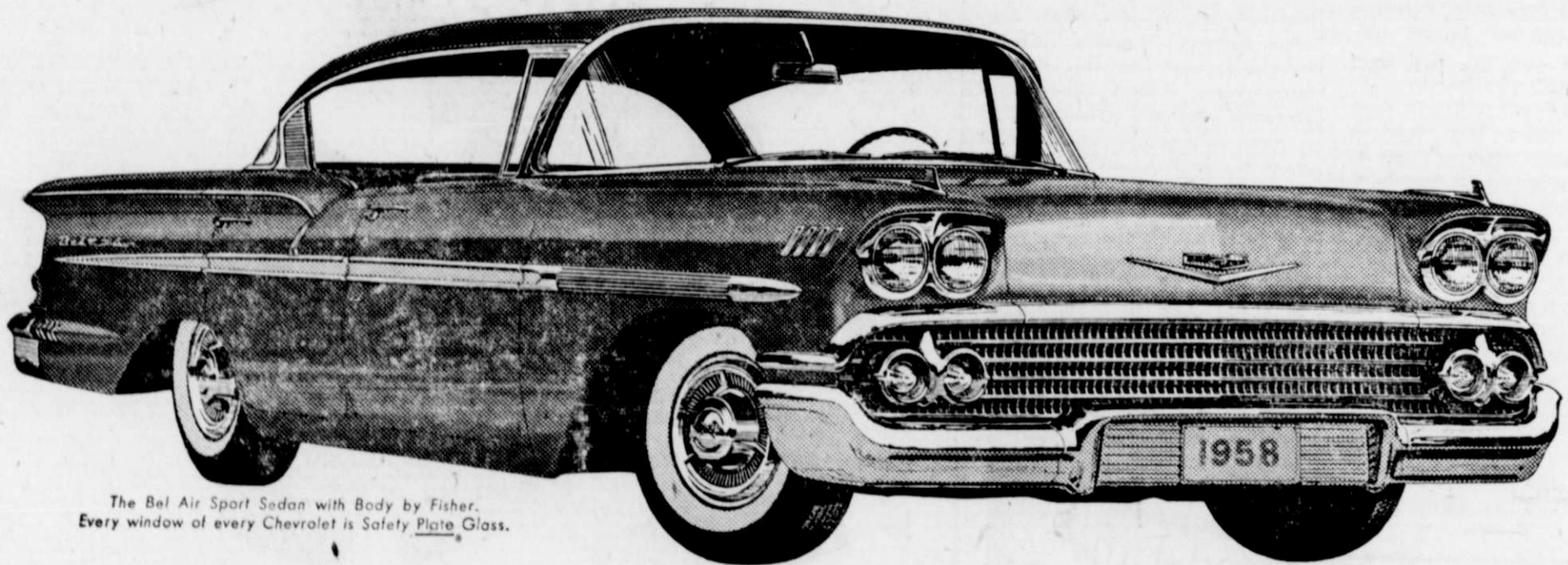

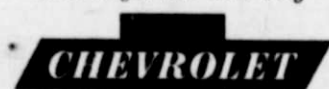

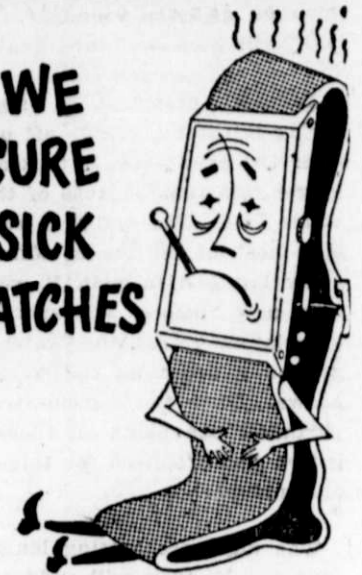
