## John Metz and Grandson, 8, Killed in Train-Car Crash at Crossing Near Kewaskum

### Car Demolished When Driven in Locomotive's Path

CRASH THIRD AT CROSSING  
INVOLVING MEMBERS  
OF SAME FAMILY

John Metz, 63, of R. 2, Kewaskum, and his eight-year-old grandson, Michael Metz, of St. Killian, were killed instantly at 12:48 p. m. Monday when their car was struck by a northbound Chicago and North Western passenger train in the town of Kewaskum about a mile north of the village. The accident occurred on the crossing known as the William Kohn crossing, located on the town road running west from County Trunk V.

The boy, whose parents, Mr. and Mrs. Matthias Metz, reside at St. Killian, was visiting with his grandparents during the Easter vacation. The John Metz farm is located on County Trunk V near the scene of the accident and the pair was on their way there when they were killed.

The train's engineer, Walter Raymond, 1066 Michigan ave., North Fond du Lac, said he saw the Metz car approaching from the west on the town road and blew his whistle in warning. When he saw the car was not going to stop, he applied emergency brakes but could not stop the train in time. J. A. Kurzynski, 45 East Thirtieth st., Fond du Lac, was the conductor.

The auto was about half across the tracks when it was struck. Had Metz been a couple of seconds sooner or traveling a little faster he would have made it across. An embankment on the east side of the track kept the car from being thrown clear and it was carried about 100 feet down the track before being tossed aside next to a signal tower. Parts of the demolished vehicle were strewn far along the track.

Metz and his grandson, who was riding with him, were returning from doing some chores on the nearby farm of his brother Peter Metz. The accident was the third in which some member of the Metz family has been involved at the same crossing. Peter Metz was injured in a similar collision at the crossing on Dec. 12, 1917 and Mrs. Peter Metz and her son Leroy were shaken up when their car skidded broadside into a train at the crossing on Jan. 24, 1951.

The crossing is marked with only a wooden "stop-look-listen" railroad warning sign but Metz, as well as the others in the family who were involved in crashes there, cross the tracks regularly and were familiar with the crossing. Why Metz failed to heed the train's warning whistle and come to a stop is not known.

The fatalities were Washington county's third and fourth of the year.

### Dairy Barn, Stock Lost in Farm Fire

The dairy barn on the Robert Schnitzler farm, formerly owned by Mr. and Mrs. John S. Schaefer, located several miles northwest of Kewaskum, was completely destroyed by fire of undetermined origin Wednesday afternoon.

Also destroyed in the blaze were nine heifers, a bull and six milk cows. Seven cows and several pigs were saved when they were driven from the barn. Burned also were tons of hay, feed, a threshing machine and other equipment.

A son of the Schnitzlers had just finished cleaning the barn and noticed the fire from the house. He saved what stock he could while Mrs. Schnitzler ran to a neighbor's home to call the Campbelsport fire department.

Firemen were unable to save the barn, which was enveloped in flames, and gave their attention to the other buildings.

The bodies, both of whom were thrown clear of the totally wrecked car, were removed to the Miller Funeral home in the ambulance.

He was a member of the Holy Name society of Holy Trinity church.

His wife survives together with three children, Matthias, town of Wayne (St. Killian), Clara at home and Eileen (Mrs. Ronald Cornelius), of Milwaukee; a sister, Anna (Mrs. Lawrence Wallenfels) of Largo, Fla.; two brothers, Peter Metz of the town of Kewaskum and Joseph Metz of Barton, and six grandchildren. The farm relief bill in Washington passed the House by a vote of 315 to 98. Due to pending conditions the time for paying taxes has also been extended. Farmers who wish to apply for government seed loans may get blanks at their county agent's office. President Roosevelt has signed the 3.2 percent beer and wines bill, which legalizes beer and wine in states where it is not prohibited when the clock strikes midnight Apr. 6, in Washington, D. C., or 11 p. m. Kewaskum time. All saloonkeepers and "tavern" owners in the village are preparing to have the "golden fluid" on tap, ready for sale as soon as the law permits. It is estimated the legalization of beer and wines will bring in an additional \$125,000,000 into the treasury and help considerably in balancing the budget.

### Bascom to Be Candidate For District Attorney

DEANE R. BASCOM, West Bend attorney, has announced his candidacy for the office of district attorney for Washington county, to be elected in the fall elections.

The announcement follows the statement last week by L. J. Goring, present district attorney, that he will not seek re-election for another term.

Bascom, a graduate of West Bend High school, received his bachelor of science degree from Georgetown university, Washington, D. C., and his bachelor of laws degree from the University of Wisconsin. He has been in private law practice in West Bend for nine years.

No newcomer to the political scene in Washington county, Bascom has served two terms as representative of the fifth ward on the County Board of Supervisors, and has been a justice of the peace for three years.

At present, he is chairman of the Washington County School committee, a position he has held for the last five years. "This electronic posting machine will greatly increase the operating efficiency of our bank and provide quicker and more satisfactory service to our customers," said M. L. Rosenheimer, President.

"There is no doubt that the electronic equipment will streamline our operation," Rosenheimer continued. "The machine will bring satisfaction to our employees by removing the drudgery from a day's work. More important, the machine produces the bank's and the customers' records with an unprecedented degree of accuracy and speed.

"Even though the equipment will operate with the speed of electronics, the bank will preserve all the time-tested advantages of standard printed records," Rosenheimer concluded. "Customers will not have to learn anything 'new'. Accounting forms posted by the machine are identical in appearance with those printed by conventional machines."

Manufactured by National Cash Register and called the "Post-Tronic," the new machine makes possible the automatic pickup of old account balances on conventional bank forms, as well as several other major bookkeeping innovations. Banks can establish a degree of accuracy in checking-account bookkeeping which heretofore could be realized only by time-consuming and costly duplication of effort.

The "Post-Tronic" is equipped with an electronic reading and recording mechanism that automatically stores a depositor's checking-account balance on conventional-type monthly statements in the form of invisible magnetic symbols. As a result, an operator cannot make an incorrect pickup of a depositor's balance, eliminating a frequent source of error.

The machine also verifies electronically that the proper check is charged against the proper account. It automatically aligns the bookkeeping form to the next proper posting line. Should an account at any moment become overdrawn, the machine notifies the operator

immediately. If the operator should commit any one of several possible errors in preparing a statement, the machine becomes inoperative until proper corrective steps have been taken.

The bank pointed out that in handling the thousands of transactions that take place every day, accuracy is always the primary consideration. All systems are designed to check and double-check every record made of a transaction. Electronics simplifies the task.

By making unnecessary many manual operations now required, the machine also frees the operator from fatiguing detail work and greatly simplifies the problem of training new employees. Because of its automatic operations and error-eliminating features, the "Post-Tronic" reduces in some cases up to 50 per cent the time required for a single posting run.
