ORDER EFFECTIVE ON JULY 1 TOWN SCOTT TERRITORY MAY BE ADDED SOON

On Wednesday, April 16, the joint school committee of Washington and Fond du Lac counties passed a resolution and adopted an order effective July 1, 1958, that attached to the Kewaskum Community High School District the remainder of the territory of the town of Farmington, that is not now in the district, and all of Sections 25 and 26, and a portion of Section 27 in the town of Barton. This action followed the public

hearing held on the proposal March 13, 1958, at the Kewaskum High school, and affects the attachment of the territory as proposed at that hearing.






