



West Bend, Wisconsin Gentlemen:

The Washington County Park Commission does hereby present a proposed amendment to the Zoning Ordinance for Washington County No. 1 together with revised zoning map, made a part thereof, for the consideration and approval of the Washington County Board of Supervisors and the respective townships excepting the Towns of Germantown and Richfield which have withdrawn from the jurisdiction of this ordinance and have established zoning ordinances of their own according to the provisions of Section 60.74 Wisconsin Statutes. The Washington County Park Commission unanimously recommends to the County Board the adoption of this amendment.

With the continued substantial growth in population and the migration of homes and industries from cities to suburbs and rural areas with its problems of increased car, truck traffic, it is felt that the proposed amendment will make possible a more orderly planning for the future. After almost two years of study and consideration including consultations with each of the Town Boards of the townships affected and State Planning Board and after two public hearings, the Park Commission is unanimous in its recommendation of the proposed amendment for your approval. An ordinance to promote the health, safety, morals and general welfare; to regulate and restrict the height, number of stories and size of buildings and other structures, the percentage of lot which may be occupied, the size of yards, courts and other open spaces, the density of population, the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and other purposes; and for the said purposes to divide Washington County, Wisconsin, into districts of such number, shape and area as are deemed best suited to carry out reading. # SECTION I. INTERPRETATIONS AND PURPOSES

designed for and occupied exclusively by 2 families. 14. Dwelling, Multiple. A building or portion thereof designed for and occupied by more than 2 families including tenement houses, row houses, apartment houses and apartment hotels.

The use of property, including the use and location buildings, the size of lots and the dimensions of required yards, otherwise not allowable under the terms of this ordinance, which is permissible by reason of special provisions of this ordinance, or for which a special permit may be issued by the County Park Commission or the board of adjustment, under conditions specified in this ordinance.

16. Family. The body of persons who live together in 1 dwelling unit as a single housekeeping entity. 17. Frontage. All the property abutting on one side of a street between 2 intersecting streets or all of the property abutting on one side of a street between an intersecting street and the dead end of a

18. Garage, Private. An accessory building or space for the storage only of not more than 4 motor-driven vehicles.

19. Garage, Public. Any building or premises, other than a private or a storage garage, where motor-driven vehicles are equipped, repaired, serviced, hired, sold or stored.

20. Garage, Storage. Any building or premises used for the storage only of motor-driven vehicles, pursuant to previous arrangements and not to transients, and where no equipment, parts, fuel, grease or oil is sold and vehicles are not equipped, serviced, repaired, hired or sold. 21. Home Occupation. A gainful occupation conducted by members

of the family only within their place of residence. 22. Hotel. A building in which lodging, with or without meals, is offered to transient guests for compensation and in which there are more than 5 sleeping rooms with no cooking facilities in any individual room or apartment.

41. Structure. Anything constructed or erected, the use of which requires a permanent location on the ground or attached to something having a permanent location on the ground.

42. Structural Alterations. Any change in the supporting members of a building or any substantial change in the roof structure or in the exterior walls.

43. Surveys and Plans. Surveys and plans as referred to in this ordinance, and as relating to the construction of highways, shall be considered as accepted by the county or town board if county or town funds have been used in the improvement carried out according to such

44. Temporary Structure. A movable structure not designed for human occupancy nor for the protection of goods or chattels and not forming an enclosure.

45. Tourist Camp. A tract or parcel of land, with or without buildings, or other equipment, on which 1 or more camp cabins are located, or where temporary accommodations are provided for 2 or more automobile tailers or house cars, open to the public free or for a fee. 46. Traffic Lane. A strip of roadway intended to accommodate a

single line of moving vehicles. 47. Variance. A departure from the terms of this ordinance as applied to a specific building, structure or parcel of land, which the board of adjustment may permit, contrary to the regulations of this ordinance for the district in which such building, structure or parcel of land is located, when the board finds that a literal application of such regulations will effect a limitation on the use of the property which does not generally apply to other properties in the same district and for which there is no compensating gain to the public health, safety

48. Vision Clearance. An unoccupied triangular space at the intersection of two or more streets or highways or highways and railways which is bounded by the street lines, highway or railway right-of-way lines and a setback line connecting points specified by measurement from the corner on each street, highway or railway line.

49. Yard. An open space on the same lot with a building, unoccupied and unobstructed from the ground upward except as otherwise

50. Yard, Front. A yard extending the full width of the lot between the front lot line and the nearest part of the main building, excluding uncovered steps.

51. Yard, rear. A yard extending the full width of the lot, being the mimimum horizontal distance between the nearest part of the main building, excluding uncovered steps, and the rear lot line; provided that in the case of irregular or triangular lots, the rear lot line shall be a line 10 feet long, within the lot, parallel to the front lot line or the main chord thereof, and at the maximum distance from the front

# SECTION IV. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, the following regutions shall apply to all districts:

No provision of this ordinance shall be construed to bar an action enjoin or abate the use or occupancy of any land, buildings or other structures as a nuisance under the appropriate laws of the State of

# A. Buildings and Uses

1. The use of buildings hereafter erected, converted, enlarged or structurally altered and the use of any land shall be in compliance with the regulations established herein for the district in which such land or building is located.

2. Every building hereafter erected, converted, enlarged or structurally altered shall be located on a lot and in no case shall there be more than 1 main building on 1 lot.

3. Nothing herein contained shall require any change in the plans, construction, size or designated use of any building or part thereof for which a building permit has been issued before the effective date of this ordinance and the construction of which shall have been started within 6 months from the date of such permit. 4. Nonconforming Uses: (a) The lawful use of a building or premises existing at the time of the enactment of this ordinance or any amendment thereto

may be continued although such use does not conform with the provisions of this ordinance for the district in which it is located, but no building or premises containing a nonconforming use shall be enlarged or extended unless and until a permit therefor shall first have been secured from the county park commission. See Section XVII (5). (b) If no structural alterations are made, a nonconforming use of a building may be changed to another nonconforming use of the same or a more restricted classification; provided, however,

5. Where a lot abuts on 2 or more streets or alleys having different average established grades, the higher of such grades shall control only for a depth of 150 feet from the line of the higher average established grade.

6. On through lots which extend from street to street, the height of the main building may be measured from the mean elevation of the finished grade along the end of the building facing either street.

#### D. Front, Side and Rear Yard Regulations

1. No part of a yard or other open space provided about any building for the purpose of complying with the provisions of this ordinance shall be included as part of a yard or other open space required for another building.

2. Any side yard, rear yard or court abutting a district boundary line shall have a minimum width and depth in the less restricted district equal to the average of the required mimimum widths and depths for such yards and courts in the districts which abut the district boundary line.

3. Where part of a frontage is occupied by buildings having setbacks which are greater or less than setbacks required by this ordinance for the district in which such frontage is located, the following rules shall apply; provided that a setback of more than 100 feet from the center line or 42 feet from the right-of-way line, whichever is the greatest distance, shall not be required in any case.

#### (a) For Vacant Lots

(1) Interior Lot Between 2 Buildings

Where lots which are occupied by main buildings are located on both sides of a vacant lot and within 200 feet thereof as measured between each such building and the nearest side line of such vacant lot, the setback line in the said vacant lot shall be established at the point of intersection of its center line, drawn from the front lot line, and a line connecting the nearest points on the setback lines in the said occupied lots.

(2) Interior Lot, Building on Only One Side

Where a lot which is occupied by a main building is located on only one side of a vacant lot and within 200 feet thereof as measured between such building and the nearest side line of such vacant lot, the setback line in the said vacant lot shall be established at the point of intersection of its center line, drawn from the front lot line, and a line connecting the nearest points on the setback line in such occupied lot and the setback line required by this ordinance in the adjoining lot on the opposite side of the said vacant lot.

(3) Interior Lot, No Nearby Building

Where no lot which is occupied by a main building is located within 200 feet of a vacant lot, as measured according to the above rules, the setback in such vacant lot shall be the setback required by this ordinance.

#### (4) Corner Lot

Where a lot which is occupied by a main building is located within 200 feet of a vacant corner lot, as measured between such building and the nearest side line of such corner lot, the setback line in the said vacant corner lot shall be the average of the setback in such occupied lot and the setback required by this ordinance.

## (b) For Occupied Lots

(1) Interior Lot Between 2 Buildings

Where lots which are occupied by main buildings are located on both sides of a building on an interior lot and within 200 feet thereof, as measured between the nearest parts of such buildings, no alterations to such building, except uncovered steps, nor any accessory building on the same lot shall project beyond a setback line established as provided in (a) (1) above, or the setback line established by the original construction of such building, which ever requires the lesser setback.

(2) Interior Lot, Building on Only One Side

Where a lot which is occupied by a main building is located on only one side of a building on an interior lot and within 200 feet thereof, as measured between the nearest parts of such buildings, no alteration to the second said building, except uncovered steps, nor any accessory building on the same lot shall project beyond a setback line established as provided in (a) (2) above, or the setback line established by the original construction of the second said building, whichever requires the lesser setback.

(3) Interior Lot, No Nearby Buildings

Where no lot which is occupied by a main building is located within 200 feet of a building on another lot, as measured between the nearest parts of such buildings, the setback for the second said building shall be the setback required by this ordinance. (4) Corner Lot

Where a lot which is occupied by a main building is located within 200 feet of a building on a corner lot, as measured between the nearest parts of such buildings, no alteration to the building on such corner lot, except uncovered steps, nor any accessory building on the same lot shall project beyond a setback line established as provided in (a) (4) above, or the setback line established by the original construction of the building on the said corner lot, whichever requires the lesser setback.

4. Buildings on through lots and extending from street to street may waive the requirements for a rear yard by furnishing an equivalent open space on the same lot in lieu of the required rear yard SECTION V. # E. Motor Vehicles and Parking


1. No commercial motor vehicle exceeding 2 tons capacity shall be stored in any storage garage.

2. In any Commercial or Industrial District, wherever a lot abuts upon a public or private alley, sufficient space for the loading or unloading of vehicles shall be provided on the lot in connection with any business or industrial use so that the alley shall at all times be free and unobstructed to the passage of traffic.

3. Each motor vehicle parking space required by this ordinance shall have an area of not less than 160 square feet, exclusive of provisions for ingress from and egress to the public street or alley. Any parking lot established under the regulations of this ordinance may be required by the county park commission to be graded and surfaced so as to provide for adequate drainage and a dust free surface. 



(e) At Railroad Grade Crossings. At grade intersections of Class A and B Highways with railroads, there shall be vision clearance triangles in each sector of such intersections. Each such vision clearance triangle shall be established by a supplementary setback line, which shall be a straight line connecting points located on the setback lines along the highway and the railroad right-of-way lines and 100 feet back from the intersections of such highway setback lines and railroad

right-of-way lines. See diagram.

4. Structures Prohibited Within Setback Lines No new building, new sign or other new structure, including cemeteries, nor any part thereof, shall be placed between the setback lines established by this ordinance and the highway except as provided by this ordinance, and no such building, sign or structure or part thereof existing within such setback lines on the effective date of this ordinance, shall be altered, enlarged or added to in any way that increases or prolongs the permanency thereof, unless a permit therefore shall have been issued by the board of adjustment. No such building, sign or structure or part thereof existing within such setback lines on the effective date of this ordinance shall be reconstructed in its original existing location after having been destroyed by fire, storm or other such destruction unless a permit therefor shall have been issued by the board of adjustment. Such value prior to destruction shall be determined by 3 disinterested persons appointed by the chairman of the board of adjustment with the consent of the other members of the said board. As a condition precedent to the issuing of a permit for the alteration, enlargement or reconstruction of any such building, sign or structure, the board may make such reasonable requirements as will further and protect the purpose and intent of this ordinance.

# 5. Structures Permitted Within Setback Lines

The following kinds of structures may be placed between the tback line and the highway:

(a) Open fences.

(b) Telephone, telegraph and power transmission poles and lines and micro-wave radio relay structures may be constructed within the setback lines, and additions to and replacements of existing structures may be made, provided the owner will file, with the clerk of Washington County, an agreement in writing to the effect that the owner will remove all new construction, additions and replacements erected after the adoption of this ordinance at his expense, when necessary for the improvement of the highway.

(c) Underground structures not capable of being used as founda-

tions for future prohibited overground structures. (d) Access or service highways constructed according to plans as approved by the county highway committee. In giving such

To permit the location of any of the following uses in any district from which they are excluded by this ordinance, provided that such uses shall comply with all other provisions of this ordinance. In granting a permit under this subsection, the park commission may consider, in addition to those effects enumerated in the introductory paragraph of this section, the effects on the value or usefulness of neighboring properties of the appearance of buildings and structures proposed to be erected or of premises proposed to be occupied or used, especially as to such adjuncts and accessories as stacks, stock or waste piles, cranes and hoists, cupolas and towers and similar structures or uses.

(a) Airport, provided that the park commission shall find, as a condition precedent to issuing the permit, that the proposed location is necessary to the public convenience.

(b) Charitable institutions.

(c) Micro-wave radio relay structures and mechanical appurten-

(d) Penal and correctional institutions.

(e) Public hospitals, when such hospital building shall be located not less than 100 feet from any lot in any Residence District not used for the same purpose.

(f) Public utility or public service corporation buildings or structures, provided that the county park commission shall find such buildings or structures to be reasonably necessary for the public convenience, safety or welfare.

(g) Sand and gravel pits and quarries, not including the manufacture of products on the premises other than the production

of crushed stone, gravel and sand. (h) Storage garage or parking lot in connection with a housing

development project.

Radio and television towers. (j) Public dumping grounds designated by a municipality when the boundaries of such dumping grounds are defined by the county park commission at the time of approval of its location.

5. After public hearing to permit the alteration or enlargement of a non-conforming use, provided the park commission shall find that such alteration or enlargement will not significantly affect the character of the neighborhood and the value of neighboring

After public hearing, grant a permit for the structural alteration or erection of a building or structure located or to be located within 1 mile of the boundary lines of any licensed airport to a height greater than permitted by this ordinance, provided that the county park commission first shall have determined that the height, use and location of such buildings or structure will not constitute a hazard to the normal, safe operation of aircraft.

7. When a housing project consisting of a group of 2 or more buildings containing 8 or more dwelling units is to be constructed on a site not subdivided into customary lots and streets, or where an existing lot and street layout make it impractical to apply the requirements of this ordinance to the individual building units, the county park commission may approve a development plan provided it complies with the regulations of this ordinance as applied to the whole plat.

8. "To grant a permit for a temporary building for commerce or industry in a residential district which is incidental to the residential development, such permit to be issued for a period of not more than 1 year.

# SECTION XVIII. BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

1. Establishment

There shall be a board of adjustment consisting of 3 members. The first three members shall be those serving on the effective date of this ordinance, who shall continue in office until the expiration of the terms for which they were appointed. Successors shall be appointed by the chairman of the county board with the approval of the county board at the expiration of each term and their terms of office shall be 3 years in all cases beginning January first in the year in which they are appointed or until their successors are appointed. The members of the board shall all reside within the county and outside of 'the limits of incorporated cities and villages; provided, however. that no two members shall reside in the same town. The board shall choose its own chairman. Vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired term of any member whose term becomes vacant in the same manner as the original appointment.

2. Rules.

(a) The board shall meet at the call of the chairman, or at such other times as the board may determine, at a fixed time

(b) All meetings of the board shall be open to the public. (c) The board shall keep minutes of its proceedings showing the vote of each member upon each question, or, if absent or failing to vote, indicating such fact, and shall keep records of its examinations and other official actions, all of which shall be immediately filed in the office of the board and shall be a public

(d) Whenever the board of adjustment shall have under consideration an appeal, such board shall give notice to the members of the town board of the township affected by such appeal, and the members of such town board shall be requested to meet with said board of adjustment and have the opportunity of making such recommendations as they deem proper.

(e) The board shall have power to call on any other county departments for assistance in the performance of its duties and it shall be the duty of such other departments to render all such assistance as may be reasonably required.

(f) Meetings of the board shall be conducted in accordance with the above rules and such other rules as may be adopted by the county board, pursuant to Section 59.99 (3) of the Statutes.

(g) In the case of all appeals, the board of adjustment shall call upon the county park commission for all information pertinent to the decision appealed from.

3. Appeals. Appeals to the board of adjustment may be taken by any person aggrieved or by any officer, department, board or bureau of Washington County affected by any decision of the building inspector. (b) All applications for a building permit shall be accompanied by a location sketch drawn to scale, showing the location, actual shape and dimensions of the lot to be built upon, the exact size and location of the building on the lot, the existing and intended use of the building, the number of families to be accommodated, its situation with reference to the highway, the distance between the nearest point on the building and the center line of the highway and such other information with regard to the proposed building and neighboring lots or buildings as may be called for on the application or may be necessary to provide for the enforcement of this ordinance.

(c) A record of all certificates issued shall be kept in the office of the building inspector.

(d) No building permit shall be required in any of the following cases, to wit: (1) for building an accessory building costing less than \$200.00 which conforms to setback lines and sideyard requirements; (2) for any improvement or alteration to an existing building costing less than \$200.00 which shall not effect a change in use; (3) for any maintenance repairs regardless of the cost; and (4) for farm buildings and structures having a ground area of not more than 300 square feet, not permanently fixed to the ground and readily removable in their entirety. This exemption, however, shall not apply to roadside stands used for the sale of farm products or other goods or services.

(e) The term "building" as used in this section shall include any building, structure or use of land which is governed by the requirements of this ordinance; also any material alteration in the heating plant, sanitary facilities or mechanical equipment of any such building which may effect a change in its use.

3. Certificate of Occupancy

(a) No vacant land shall be occupied or used and no building or structure hereafter erected, altered or moved shall be occupied or used until a certificate of occupancy shall have been issued by the building inspector. Such certificate of occupancy shall be applied for coincident with the application for a building permit and shall be issued within 10 days after the erection, alteration, repair or moving of such building shall have been completed in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance and in conformity with the statements on the application for a building permit.



#### ORDINANCE No. 2

Providing for a Civil Defense Organization and for Protection and Promotion of Public Safety, Health, and Welfare in the County of Washington During Civil Defense Emergencies

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Washington Do Ordain as Follows:

SECTION 1 POLICY AND PURPOSE.

(a) "Civil Defense" shall mean the preparation for and the carry ing out of all emergency functions, other than functions for which the military forces are primarily responsible, to minimize and repair injury and damage resulting from distaster caused by enemy attack, sabotage, or other hostile action, or by fire, flood or other natural

(b) By reason of the increasing possibility of disasters of unrecedented size and destructiveness, and to insure that preparations will be adequate to cope with such disasters, and to provide for the common defense, to protect the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare, and to preserve the lives and property of the people, it is hereby declared necessary:

(1) To establish a local civil defense organization, (2) To provide for the exercise of necessary powers during

civil defense emergences; and

(3) To provide for the rendering of cooperation and mutual aid between this county and other political subdivisions. (c) It is further declared to be the purpose of this ordinance and the policy of the county that all civil defense functions of this county be coordinated to the maximum extent practicable with existing services and facilities of this county and with comparable functions of the federal, state and county government and other political subdivisions, and of various private agencies to the end that the most effective preparation and use may be made of manpower, resources, and facili- and approval. Motion carried ties for dealing with any disaster that may occur.

SECTION 2. CIVIL DEFENSE COMMISSION

(a) How Constituted. There is hereby created a civil defense commission composed of the Chairman, County Board of Supervisors, and as many additional members as may be determined by the County Board of Supervisors by resolution who shall be appointed by the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, subject to the confirmation of the County Board of Supervisors, and who shall serve without compensation. The Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors shall serve without compensation. The Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors shall serve as chairman of the commission and the Civil Defense Co-ordinator shall serve as secretary of the commission.

(b) Duties of Defense Commission. The Civil Defense Commission shall be an advisory and planning group and shall advise the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, Co-ordinator and the County Board of Supervisors on all matters pertaining to civil defense. The civil defense commission shall meet upon the call of the chairman.

SECTION 3. CIVIL DEFENSE COORDINATOR.

(a) Appointment. The office of co-ordinator of civil defense is hereby created. The visors and shall receive such salary as may be authorized by the and approval. Motion carried. County Board of Supervisors. He shall take and file an official oath.

Deputy and assistant co-ordinators may be appointed by the coordinator subject to the approval of the civil defense commission, as may be deemed necessary, and such appointees shall receive such compensation as may be determined by the County Board of Super-

(b) Duties and Authority of Co-ordinator.

(1) The co-ordinator shall be the executive head of the Civil Defense organization and shall have direct responsibility for the organization, administration and operation of the Civil Defense organization subject to the direction and control of the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors and County Board of Supervisors. He shall coordinate all activities for civil defense within the county, and shall maintain liaison and cooperate with civil defense agencies and organizations of other political subdivisions and of the state and federal government, and shall par ticipate in county and state civil defense activities upon request, and shall have such additional authority, duties and responsibilities as are authorized by this ordinance and as may from time to time be required by the County Board of Supervisors.

(2) The co-ordinator shall prepare a comprehensive general plan for the civil defense of the county and shall present such plan to the County Board of Supervisors for its approval. When the County Board of Supervisors has approved the plan by resolution, it shall be the duty of all municipal agencies and all civil defense forces of the county to perform the duties and functions assigned by the plan as approved. The plan may be modified in like

SECTION 4. UTILIZATION OF EXISTING SERVICES AND

FACILITIES. In preparing and executing the civil defense plan, the co-ordina tor shall utilize the services, equipment, supplies and facilities of the existing departments and agencies of the county to the maximum extent practicable; and the officers and personnel of all such depart ments and agencies are directed to cooperate with and extend such services and facilities to the co-ordinator.

SECTION 5. EMERGENCY REGULATIONS.

Whenever necessary to meet a civil defense emergency for which adequate regulations have not been adopted by the County Board of Supervisors, the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors and in Motion carried. his absence, the co-ordinator of civil defense, may by proclamation promulgate and enforce such orders, rules and regulations relating to the conduct of persons and the use of property as shall be necessary to protect the public peace, health and safety, and preserve lives and property and to insure the cooperation necessary in civil defense ac tivities. Such proclamations shall be posted in three public places and may be rescinded by the County Board of Supervisors by resolution at any time.

SECTION 6. MUTUAL AID AGREEMENTS

The co-ordinator of civil defense may, subject to the approval o the County Board of Supervisors, enter into mutual aid agreements with other political subdivisions. Copies of such agreements shall be filed with the state director of civil defense.

SECTION 7. DECLARATION OF EMERGENCIES.

Upon the declaration by the governor, by the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors or the civil defense co-ordinator in the absence of the Chairman of the County Board of Supervisors, or by the County Board of Supervisors of a state of emergency, the co ordinator of civil defense shall issue all necessary proclamations as to the existence of such state of emergency and shall issue such disaster warnings or alerts as shall be required in the civil defense plan.

The civil defense organization shall take action in accordance with the civil defense plan only after the declaration of an emergency The clerk called the roll and all members reported present except and the issuance of official disaster warnings. Such state of emer gency shall continue until terminated by the issuing authority, provided that any such declaration not issued by the governor may be terminated at the discretion of the County Board of Supervisors.

SECTION 8. PENALTIES. It shall be unlawful for any person wilfully to obstruct, hinder or delay any member of the civil defense organization in the enforce petition. ment of any order, rule, regulation, or plan issued pusuant to this ordinance, or to do any act forbidden by an order, rule, regulation or plan issued pursuant to the authority contained in this ordinance For a violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance he shall forfeit not less than \$100 nor more than \$500, and in default of pay ment thereof, shall be imprisoned in the county jail for a period not

SECTION 9. Any Ordinances or Resolutions heretofore adopted and in conflict herewith are herewith repealed.

Committee:

The current concern locally and throughout the world with emotional health has been reflected within Washington and Ozaukee Counties in part by the maintenance of the Child Guidance Center. As an active force within the communities we have been working with individuals, families, groups and professional organizations to help recognize, treat, and prevent emotional illness.

In approaching the problem of emotional illness, we recognize that there are no easy answers. The three directional approach that we foster in the Center, utilizing personnel from the fields of medicine, social science, and psychology, encourages the broad consideration of the many factors which may be affecting the communities. We also consult with other individuals in the communities to further broaden the approach to preventive mental health.

The difficulties are many, the problems enormous, but these problems have been recognized and solutions are being sought. How Many Children Received Service?

From July 1, 1956 through June 30, 1957, 105 children and their families received direct help which consisted of diagnosis and/or treatment.

DIAGNOSIS AND TREATMENT Active cases carried over July 1, 1956

Reopened cases (Previously closed prior to July 1, 1956) 3 Total active cases 105 Cases terminated prior to June 30, 1957 67 Total active cases June 30, 1956

The total number of active cases represents approximately a 10% increase over the number of active cases last year. The demand for service averages 51/2 new cases per month. This demand will increase steadily during each succeeding year of operation as more and more people learn of the Center from families who have received help and

Who suggested to the parents that they apply for service? All parents want to be good parents. Every parent may not recognize a problem of adjustment in his child which can be more easily understood and worked out with specialized help. All parents may not know this help is provided at the Child Guidance Center. A suggestion from the teacher, physician, clergyman, public health nurse or other persons concerned with the welfare of children frequently

influences the parent's decision to apply for service.

toward undesirable adjustment can be corrected. More boys than girls received service-72% boys and 28% girls. This is a ratio of approximately 21/2 to 1 which is consistent with the ratio reported by child guidance centers all over the country.

the year 1956-1957 was confined to three main areas. Reorga of elementary districts in the Towns of Erin and Wayne and the attempted reorganization of the Slinger School District.

The electors of School Districts one, two, and four in the Town of Erin overwhelmingly approved the plan of the committee that consolidated the three districts into one new one. This new district is now in the process of acquiring a new centrally located site and will in the near future erect a modern multi-room school structure.

In the Town of Wayne, the plan of the committee was, again, overwhelmingly approved by the electors and all of the elementary commented on the claims filed by the jury commissioners. Mr. Berend districts in that town were consolidated into one district. For the present, the new district is operating five attendance centers, but will in the future consider building and operating one centrally located ed by Mr. Kuhaupt that Report No. 14, of the Clerk of Circuit Court new school building.

The electors in these areas of our county have through this type of reorganization provided a large and sound tax base for their district giving it far more strength and flexibility than the smaller separate districts had. They are now in a position to provide expanded and up-to-date facilities in an economic manner. They have, also, placed themselves in a more favorable position in the matter of finding teacher personnel. The general shortage of teachers has caused teachers to be more selective in their choice of schools, and those districts offering new and modern facilities with multi-room plants find it easier to hire teachers. It is, also, felt that the teacher can do a better ob of instruction if her effort can be confined to fewer grade levels

and not spread over all eight. The electors in the Slinger area turned down the proposal of the mmittee that would have created a Union Free High School District t of the present Slinger District and certain territory adjacent to it. The plan received majority support in the Village of Slinger itself, ut was defeated in the rural area. This represented a tremendous timately result in the electors themselves asking for the reorganiza- orable body but that only Report No. 1 appear in the County Board n originally proposed by the committee.

Ladies and Gentlemen: Home Demonstration work in Washington County during the past year is briefly outlined in this report. Major projects are outlined statistically. A detailed report of all activities carried out will be avail-

able at my office. The primary purpose of the Home Demonstration program is to improve home, family, and community living. It is a completely voluntary program and depends upon homemakers for leadership. Over 700 women from all areas of the County are enrolled in 48 groups, with two in the process of organization.

Monthly, from September through May, nearly 100 leaders from the groups attend training meetings on educational phases of homemaking. They return to their local groups with project information which they teach within their membership.

Home Demonstration work is carried on through the leader training meetings, news items, telephone, office calls, bulletins, circular letters, home calls, general meetings, and personal contacts. To carry out objectives of this program it becomes necessary to use all of the above media continually.

Your generous support has been appreciated in building and working with the Extension Service. Without the assistance and cooperation of many people throughout the county, a program such as this could not function. Much appreciation is extended to everyone who has worked with Home Demonstration program. I also wish to thank the County Extension staff which assists in many areas of the program.

The rate for 1957 for the municipality (Washington County) was 3.06% for prior service credits, plus 3% for Wisconsin Retirement plus 21/4% for Federal Social Security, a total of 8.31%. The employee's and official's contribution was 3% for the Wisconsin Retirement and 21/4% for Federal Social Security, a total of 51/4%.

During 1958 the rate for the municipality will be 2.89% for prior service credits, plus 3% for Wisconsin Retirement plus 2.25% for the Federal Social Security, a total of 8.14%. The employee's and official's contribution will be 3% for the Wisconsin Retirement and 2.25% for Federal Social Security, a total of 5.25%.

The County Judge, as per state statutes is included in a separate classification. Under this plan, the County Judge contributes the maximum to Social Security which is \$94.50 in 1958. Section 4. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the chairman or clerk previous to debate. If any member requires it, all motions, except to adjourn, postponed or commit, shall be in writing. Any motion may be withdrawn by consent of the Board before the decision for amendment.

Section 5. Every member present, when a question is put or when his name is called, shall vote unless the Board shall, for special cause, excuse him; but it shall not be in order for a member to be excused after the Board has commenced voting.

Section 6. A motion to adjourn shall always be considered in order and be not debatable, and a call for the previous question and a motion to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate; but a motion to adjourn shall not be received when the Board is voting on another question.

Section 7. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Board, he shall arise from his chair and respectfully address himself to the chairman and shall confine himself to the question under the debate and avoid personality.

Section 8. When two or more members shall arise at once, the chairman shall name the member who is to speak first.

Section 9. No committee shall absent themselves by reason of their appointment during the sitting of the Board without special

Section 10. Every resolution or other matter shall be introduced on leave and referred to the appropriate committee if considered necessary. All resolutions shall be laid over for a second reading before voted upon. All resolutions carrying an appropriation shall after the first reading be referred to the budget committee for their recommendation as to its effect, upon the same day that it is introduced except by suspension of the rules.

Section 11. When a motion or question has once been made and carried in the affirmative or negative, it shall at any time on the same or succeeding day be in order for any member of the majority, or when the Board is equally divided, for a member who voted in the negative to move for a reconsideration thereof.

A motion to reconsider being put and lost shall not be renewed.

Section 12. No member or officer of the Board shall be permitted to read newspapers or magazines within the bar of the Board while

Section 13. All resolutions brought in by any member or committee shall be endorsed by the member of the committee bringing

Section 14. When a member is called to order, he shall sit down and shall not speak except in explanation, until the chairman shall have determined whether he is in order or not; and every question or order shall be decided by the chairman, subject to an appeal to the Board by any member, and if a member be called to order for words spoken, the exceptional words shall be taken down in writing, that the chairman and the Board may be better enabled to judge.

Section 15. A majority of all members elected to the Board must be present to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; and three of their number, however, can adjourn from time to time and have a power to compel the attendance of absent members.

Section 16. Any committees required to or entitled to report upon a subject referred to them may make a majority and minority

Section 17. All appropriations of money shall require the affirmative vote of not less than a majority of the members present and shall be voted for by the roll call vote, and entered among the proceedings of the Board. In all resolutions where a roll call vote has been requested, or is required, the names of all members voting thereon be published in the annual report and that said report show which members voted for or against said resolution.

Section 18. The following standing committees shall be appointed by the chairman of the County Board and each committee shall consist of the number of members and its duties shall be as follows:




