Bikes Stolen From School Grounds By Milwaukee Youths

TWO VEHICLES TAKEN AT HOLY TRINITY SCHOOL; BOYS APPREHENDED

Two Milwaukee boys, ages 15 and 16, who stole two new bicycles from the bike rack at the Holy Trinity school grounds shortly after 1 p. m. on Tuesday were apprehended on Wednesday north of Boltonville by Chief of Police Roland Pledl, after he was tipped off by a motorist who saw the boys with the bicycles.

The youths, one residing at 2915 W. Highland ave. in Milwaukee and the other an escapee from the Mother of Perpetual Help Boys Home, 2915 W. Highland ave., were turned over to the Washington county juvenile department. The 15-year-old boy is on probation for burglary in Milwaukee and the 16-year-old was reported to have stolen cash and other items from the boys' home before the two ran off. Both boys are former residents of this community and attended school here.

The bikes, one a red and white Schwinn, valued at \$65.00, and the other a red and white Lancer, also valued at \$65.00, were owned by Jack Stellflug, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Stellflug, and Robert Schaefer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Armond Schaefer. Both are pupils at the school.

The theft was not discovered until about 3:30 p. m. when school left out. The boys informed their parents that their bikes were missing and they in turn notified police.

A search of every street in the village was made by Chief Pledl, who was unable to find the vehicles. Further investigation revealed that two strange boys were seen loitering in Holy Trinity church at about 1 p. m. by the parish nuns. It appeared the boys were waiting for the sisters to leave, possibly with the intention of larceny from the church, but one nun remained until the boys left. It was not known at that time that the bicycles had been taken.

After unsuccessfully combing the village, Chief Pledl followed a hunch and searched the Mauthe lake area. Two men there told him that two boys answering the description were seen on Hwy. 8 near Mauthe lake. After the supper hour the chief and the fathers of the boys whose bikes were taken returned to the Kettle Moraine area but were unable to locate the boys.

On Wednesday morning, at about 8:30 o'clock, August Bilgo, Kewaskum rural mail carrier who had heard of the theft, called the police department and reported that he saw the boys west of Beechwood. He questioned them and the boys acted suspicious. Chief Pledl and Stellflug left to search the area and after about two hours of looking finally located the boys north of Boltonville, where they were drinking water from a creek aside of the road. The boys had dismantled parts of the bicycles to prevent identification.

Indians Blow Last Two Games, Finish Fourth

NOSED OUT IN LAST INNING
BY ROSENDALE AND CAMPBELLSPORT

The Kewaskum Indians, who were tied for first place with 4-1 going into the last week of play, blew all chances of tying for the championship by being nosed out in both of their last two contests by one-run margins. Playing at Rosendale Thursday and Campbellsport Tuesday, the Indians were beaten out in both games in the final inning. The setbacks dropped them to fourth place in the final standings with a 4-3 record on the season.

The Dalers shaded Kewaskum 7-6 there Thursday. The teams were tied at 6-6 after three innings and played shutout ball until the last of the 7th when Rosendale pushed over the winning run. The Indians lost a golden opportunity to grab a tie for the league lead with Lomira.

Bob Berg and Mark Rodenkirch each banged out homers for Kewaskum but Larry Wickert suffered the loss when, with two out in the last of the 7th, he walked Jerry Marchant and Larry Conners. DuWayne Bellings singled to load the bases and then a wild pitch gave the Dalers the win. Jim Marschall, who relieved Gene Smit, was winning pitcher. The Indians made 7 hits and Rosendale 8.

In a make-up game at Campbellsport Tuesday the Bells won their fifth straight in shading the Indians, 10-9, after dropping the first two of the season. Again the teams were tied, 9-9, going into the last of the 7th, when the Bells pushed over the lucky winning run. Kewaskum outhit Campbellsport, 11-8.

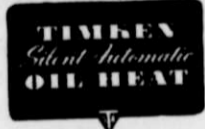

A new system of warning the public of severe weather conditions is in process now, and will go into effect just as soon as installations can be made. This new weather warning network will provide the public with almost instantaneous warnings in the southeastern portion of the state. Radio and television stations cooperating in the network include:

WEMP radio; WFOX radio; WISN radio and WISN-TV, channel 12; WITI-TV, channel 6; WMIL radio; WOKY radio; WRIT radio; WTMJ radio and WTMJ-TV, channel 4; and WXIX-TV channel 19.

The Weather Bureau, Department of Commerce, will be the first federal agency to cooperate with the Federal Civil Defense Administration in establishing nationwide facilities to measure fallout radiation levels in the event of a nuclear attack on the United States. The Weather Bureau would make observations of radiation levels at each of 260 weather bureau observatories located throughout the nation, and report this intelligence hourly over the Depart-

ment of Commerce's national teletype service. This information would be made available to federal, regional, state and local governments.

The new service is scheduled to be placed in operation by June 30.

25 Years Ago

The Kewaskum Statesman
May 12, 1933

The Badger State baseball league was organized at West Bend. The six teams joining include North Fond du Lac, Mayville, Port Washington, Kewaskum, Sheboygan Falls and West Bend. A 20-game schedule was adopted with opening games on May 14. Art Koch of Kewaskum was elected a director.

In the most daring and horrifying hold-up ever conducted in this community, Michael Pesch, 58, and his sister Kate, both residing two miles north of the village on the River Road, were unmercifully tortured by three bandits Sunday afternoon and robbed of their cash, liberty bonds, mortgage papers, deeds certificate of deposits, personal notes and other legal papers. The robbery was committed between 3:30 and 5:30 p. m. A fourth bandit remained at the wheel of a powerful new Cadillac sedan parked behind wood piles. The bandits ransacked the whole house, from basement to attic, looking for the money. They cut up mattresses and nearly all the furniture, dumped out boxes and drawers, even cut open hams and poured out lard in search of money. The money and personal papers and bonds were found in a box in a trunk in Miss Pesch's bedroom. Approximately \$1,650 in cash and 19 liberty bonds, valued at \$8,900 were taken. Another \$100 was taken from Kate's handbag. The bandits were seen in the village earlier in the afternoon, driving around, and though everyone noticed the big car no one took the license number. Pesch told a Statesman reporter that he was in the kitchen when the trio entered with drawn revolvers. He refused to hand over the money and the men threatened to shoot him. He was blind-folded and tied

but refused to talk. One bandit then heated a piece of iron and branded Pesch on his leg while another one beat his tied hands until they swelled to enormous size. He was also struck several times on the head with the butt of a revolver. When Kate entered the house after gathering eggs she was also blind-folded, tied and gagged, and laid face-down on the floor. The more she pleaded for mercy the tighter the band over her mouth was drawn. After two hours of trying to force the Pesches to reveal the hiding place the bandits made their get-away, leaving them bound. After an hour's frantic work Pesch freed himself and painfully made his way to the Chas. Krahn home one-half mile away from where Marshall George Brandt and Deputy George Kippenhan were called. Then the Washington and Fond du Lac county sheriffs were notified. It is believed the men were gangsters from Chicago and that someone from the community acted as a tipster.

tended the meeting of the posts of the district, at which Mr. Aaron Cleek of Oshkosh was elected 6th District commander.

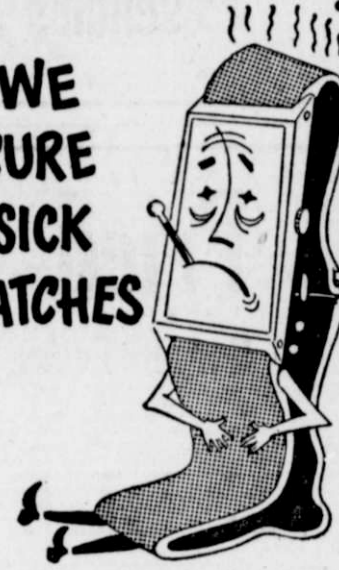
