Allen Bohn, 8, **Hurt When Car** Strikes Bicycle

CYCLIST KILLED IN COUNTY OTHER ACCIDENTS OVER HOLIDAY WEEK END

Allen, 8 year old son of Mr. and Francis Bohn, Kewaskum, was injured at about 4:30 p. m. last Thursday when his bicycle was struck by a car on Fond du Lac ave. in front of Honeck Chev-

The mishap occurred when the boy drove his bicycle into the path of a car driven by David H. Leonhardt, 28, of Fond du Lac, According to the police report, Bohn pulled out of a driveway leading to the Honeck garage, drove onto the highway and into the path of the northbound Leonhardt vehicle

The bumper of the auto struck the bicycle, throwing Allen onto the hood of the car and then forward to the pavement. He suffered a fractured left leg, bruises and lacerations to his face and forehead. The boy was rushed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. He will be confined there at least several weeks

A truck parked at the curb obscured the views of both the driver and Bohn boy. Fortunately Leonhardt was traveling at a slow rate of speed, estimated at 25 miles per hour. He immediately applied his brakes but was unable to stop n time to avoid hitting the boy.







DAISIES WON'T TELL!

A Springtime surprise party and you were asked to bring the cake? Here's one that is easy to carry, cuts to advantage, and looks like a breath of Spring! Its two-toned icing, various shaped pieces, and top surprises will impress.



1/2 cup shortening

1½ cups Beet Sugar 4 egg whites 21/2 cups sifted cake flour

21/2 teaspoons baking powder

teaspoon salt cup milk

1/2 teaspoon lemon extract teaspoon almond

extract Cream shortening and Beet Sugar together un-til fluffy; blend in egg whites one at a time. Stir in sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk; add flavorings.

 Pour into well-greased and floured loaf pan (14x9x2). Bake in 375° F. oven 20 to 25 minutes or until top springs back when lightly touched. Cool on cake rack.


