## Electric Co. Files Application For Construction of \$853,839 Substation North of Kewaskum

### To Include 138,000 Volt Transmission Line & Equipment

The Wisconsin Electric Power company, Milwaukee, on May 23 filed an application with the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin for authority under section 196.49, statutes, and chapter PSC 112, Wisconsin Administrative Code, to construct, install and place in operation 15,000-kva substation and associated 138,000-volt electric transmission line and switching equipment at an estimated cost of \$853,839 north of Kewaskum, Washington county.

The commission will investigate such application without public hearing. The commission deems it necessary in order to carry out its duties herein to investigate the books, accounts, practices and activities of the Wisconsin Electric Power company and that the expenses incurred or to be incurred by the commission which are reasonably attributable to such investigation will be assessed against and collected from the Electric Power Co. in accordance with the provisions of section 196.85, Wisconsin Statutes, and chapter FSC 5, Wisconsin Administrative Code.

The notice was dated at Madison on the 9th day of June, 1958, and was signed by Edward T. Kaveny, secretary, Public Service Commission of Wisconsin.

Herman Luft, 75, farm resident of R. 2, West Bend, drowned at approximately 9:30 a. m. Wednesday when he fell out of a boat on the Newburg dam pond. Luft was entering a small boat operated by Bill Beimborn, 14, Newburg, when he toppled into five feet of water. Beimborn's father, Adolph, pulled Luft from the water. The West Bend rescue squad worked over Luft but was unable to revive him and he was pronounced dead by the county coroner. The man suffered a gash on his head and bruises.

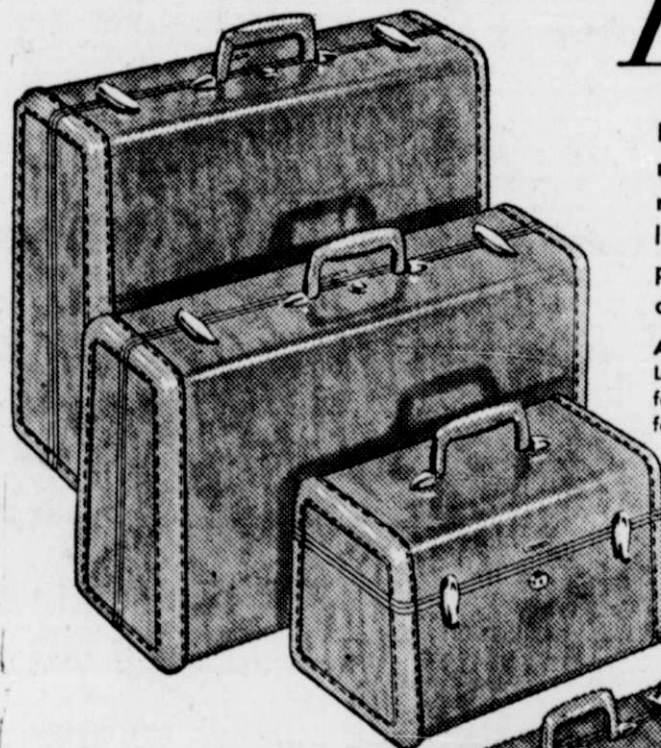

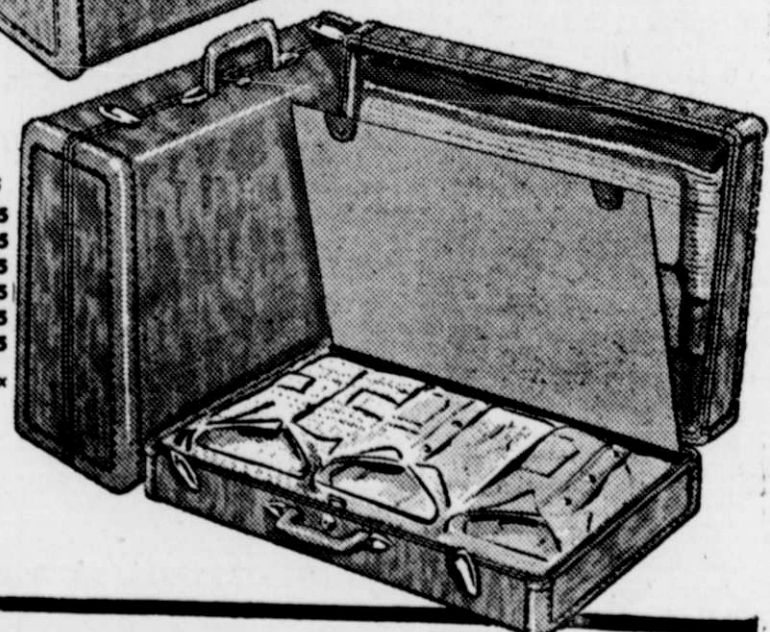

**Fruited Pork and Beans**  
1 cup chopped dried apricots and prunes  
1/2 cup water  
2 cans (1-pound each) pork and beans with tomato sauce  
Cook dried fruit in water in covered saucepan until water is absorbed. Stir in beans; heat. Makes 4 generous servings.

**Pork and Beans With Orange Topping**  
2 cans (1-pound each) pork and beans with tomato sauce  
1 orange, peeled and cut into sections  
Whole cloves (2 per orange section)  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
Pour beans into a shallow pan or casserole. Stick cloves into orange sections; arrange on top of beans; sprinkle with brown sugar. Bake in a hot oven (400°F.) about 20 minutes. Makes 4 servings. **FNS**

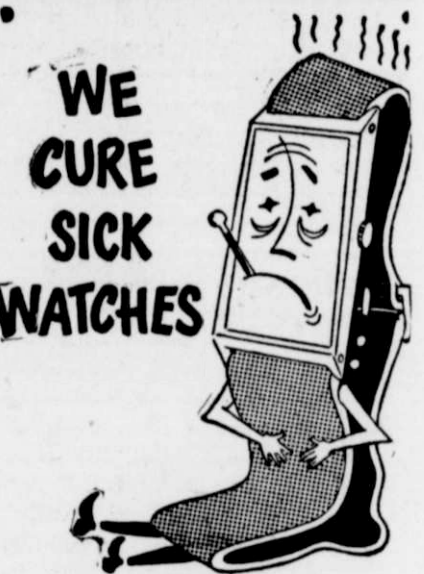

## PLEASE CLIP AND SAVE Civil Defense Information on Tornadoes

In view of the recent tornado in Wisconsin, and since we are in the month when tornadoes reach their highest frequency, we are repeating the instructions for the Kewaskum area.

A STEADY blast on our fire siren for 3 to 5 minutes will announce the approach of a severe storm.

These are the tornado safety rules:

### IF YOU ARE IN OPEN COUNTRY:

1. Move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.

2. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

### IF IN A CITY OR TOWN:

1. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a steel reinforced building. STAY AWAY FROM WINDOWS!

2. In homes: The southwest corner of the lowest floor or in the basement offers greatest safety. People living in brick or stone houses should seek other shelter, preferably in a storm cellar or in the basement of a frame house. If time permits, electricity and fuel lines should be shut off. Windows on the north and east sides of the house may also be opened to help reduce damage to the building.

3. Standing against the inside walls on the lower floors of an office building offers some protection.

### IF IN SCHOOLS:

1. In city areas: Especially if school building is of good steel reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows, remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. AVOID AUDITORIUMS AND GYMNASIUMS with large, poorly-supported roofs!

2. In rural schools that do not have reinforced constructions—remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

### IF IN FACTORIES AND INDUSTRIAL PLANTS:

1. On receiving a tornado warning, a lookout should be posted to keep safety officials advised of the tornado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electrical circuits and fuel lines if the tornado approaches the plant. Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest protection.

Keep calm! It will not help to get excited. People have been killed by running out into streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado. Keep tuned to your radio station for latest tornado advisory information.

All members of the family, including children, should be familiar with these safety rules. Clip them and keep them someplace where you can refer to them in a hurry. Serious injuries and death result when there is confusion and not knowing what to do—don't let that happen to your family.

## Minors Must Get Child Labor Permits to Work

All minors between the ages of 16 and 18 must secure a permit to work from the office of the West Bend Vocational school before starting work, with the exception of those minors employed in agriculture or work normally done around a home. These child labor permits are issued by the vocational school office from 9:00 a. m. until 4:00 p. m. Monday through Friday.

In order to receive a child labor permit, the minor must obtain (1) a letter from the employer indicating that the employer will hire the minor and giving a brief description of the work the minor will do, (2) a copy of his birth certificate or baptismal certificate, and (3) a letter of consent to work from his parents or guardian. These two letters and the certificate of birth or baptism are to be taken to the vocational school office with the fee of twenty-five cents and the labor permit will then be issued to the minor.

Labor permits must be presented by the minor to the employer before the minor is allowed to work, and the permit shall be kept on file by the employer. The labor permit must be returned by mail to the vocational school office twenty-four hours after the minor ceases working for the employer or twenty-four hours after the minor becomes 18 years of age. No

employer may permit minors to work in the day time when the child should be in school. Persons between 16 and 18 years old must attend school at least one day per week if living or employed within the city of West Bend. Minors over 16 who are both residing and working outside of the city of West Bend are not required to attend school. Children under 16 years of age must attend school full time.

The Industrial Commission of Wisconsin lists many occupations that are considered hazardous. An employer cannot, under any circumstances, employ a minor in these hazardous occupations. The Industrial Commission also specifies how many hours a minor may work, and during which hours of the day. Persons desiring information about the employment of minors are urged to call the vocational school office at FE 4-4950.

The unlawful employment of a minor can have serious consequences for both the parents and the employer. Parents can be held liable for allowing violations and

the employer may be fined from ten dollars to one hundred dollars per day for every day of violation. In addition, the employer is subject to additional penalties if the minor is injured while unlawfully employed.

## Boy Climbs Tower

Campbellsport officials learned the hard way that ladders leading to the top of water towers should not be within reach of children. The community had a scare last Friday when the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Matt Hoffman decided he wanted to see what the village looked like from above.

The youngster reached the ladder rungs and proceeded to climb up the 120-foot water tower. Mrs. Hoffman saw the child and shouted for assistance. Finally, a volunteer fireman, Leo Janous, climbed up after the boy and led him down to the ground.
