Mrs. Ernest Becker, 85, nee Ida Heise, a resident of Kewaskum and vicinity most of her life, died on Monday morning, June 23, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Clara Dins, near Dundee. She had been ill a week following a stroke.

Mrs. Becker was born on Oct. 11, 1872, in the town of Scott, Sheboygan county. Her marriage to Ernest Becker took place on Feb. 8, 1891 in Immanuel Lutheran church, town of Scott. He preceded her in death on Dec. 13, 1950.

Mrs. Becker was the mother of nine children, two of whom predeceased her. Surviving are Mrs. Selma Langenkamp and Edgar Becker of Milwaukee. Mrs. Clara Dins of Dundee, William and Henry Becker of Kewaskum and Walter and Carl Becker of West Bend. She also leaves 12 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Wednesday until 11 a. m. Thursday and at the St. Lucas Lutheran church from 12 o'clock noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. The Rev. Gerhard Kanies officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery.

Seefeldt Elected Circuit Judge at Badger Boys State

ONE OF FOUR BOYS CHOSEN FROM 750 AS ALTERNATE TO REPRESENT STATE AT BOYS NATION AT WASHINGTON, D. C.

From June 14 to 21, Aldwin Seefeldt, son of Alfred Seefeldt, represented Kewaskum High school at Badger Boys State held on the Ripon college campus.

Badger Boys State, sponsored by the American Legion, is a clinic for the study of city, county and state government. It gives all the participants a chance to actually study and actively take part in the operation of a democratic form of government. The offices, all the way from city alderman to governor, are campaigned for and filled. The recipients of these offices must actually perform the duties connected with their office.

To prepare the boys for these offices, special schools of instruction are held under the direction of professional men and top state officials including Governor Thomson. The schools offered were Law, Parliamentary Law, Patent Law, Civil Service, Peace Officers and Community Development. At the end of the courses, exams were given to the students on which they had to receive a passing grade in order to become eligible for certain offices.

Seefeldt attended Law and Patent Law schools; receiving a passing grade in both exams with the honor of Cum Laude in Patent Law. He was elected to the office of county judge and then ran for and succeeded in becoming one of two circuit judges. The circuit judge office enabled him to take part in the state convention and the inaugural ceremonies. He was sworn in for the office of circuit judge by the Honorable Justice Grover L. Broadfoot of the Wisconsin Supreme Court.

Aldwin also participated in the Boys State band which gave concerts every evening and participated in the mammoth parade as part of the inaugural ceremonies. He also received recognition for helping in program presentation. At the final assembly on June 21, Aldwin was taken by complete surprise, and awarded the position of alternate to represent Wisconsin at Boys Nation which will be held July 18-25 at Washington, D. C. This was quite an honor, for he was one of four boys chosen from the 750 citizens of Boys State.

Seefeldt said that he felt that the American Legion and all others contributing to Badger Boys State are putting their efforts and money to good use, because in his opinion he felt that he could not have learned as much on such an important subject as government in so little time as he did at Boys State.

Alice Schwind at Girls' State on UW Campus

ELECTED TO OFFICE OF CITY ALDERWOMAN FRIDAY AT 15TH ANNUAL SESSION

Alice M. Schwind, Kewaskum, was among the 347 Wisconsin high school girls attending the 15th annual Badger Girls' State held on the University of Wisconsin campus during the week from June 18 to June 25.

Sponsored by the Wisconsin American Legion Auxiliary and the UW Extension Division's Bureau of Government, the Badger Girls' State program is designed to acquaint the girls with the functions of municipal, county, and state government and to initiate them into the duties of citizenship.

Selected by the faculty of their schools, the girls attending the week-long conference nominate and elect their own city, county, and state officials. Included on the program are discussions of the forms of government, why we have political parties, who decides what state government does, the legal status of women and many other aspects of citizenship and government.

Miss Schwind was elected city alderwoman at Girls' State on June 20. Sixty-four officials were elected at the municipal government session for the four mythical cities set up—Ashby, Maple, Elm, and Oakwood.

GOVERNOR APPROVES HWY. 45 PROJECT

Gov. Vernon W. Thomson last week approved a contract with O'Keefe Construction Co. of De Pere, in the amount of \$512,185.50, covering the grading and the construction of a subbase course, a base course, and a culvert on 5.289 miles of U. S. Highway 45 (Barton-Kewaskum Road) in Washington county. The contract provides that the work be completed in 190 days. Total estimated cost is \$670,000.00 with financing as follows: Federal funds—\$273,000.00 and Section 20.420 (82) State Fund—\$397,000.00.

Work on the above project is already in progress.

Dr. Chester L. Perschbacher of Appleton, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Perschbacher, was elected president of the Fox River Valley Dental society at its Neenah convention.

Last Thursday at midnight the milk strike came to a sudden end, an agreement having been made. Fifty members of the Kewaskum Local of the Wisconsin Co-operative Pool were at Madison last week to participate in the demonstration of 15,000 farmers at the state capitol and university grounds.

An interesting article appeared in the Sunday Milwaukee Journal relative to the largest diamond ever found in the state of Wisconsin. The finder was the late Louis B. Endlich, then of Kohlsville, husband of Mrs. Kate Endlich and father of William and Kate Endlich of the town of Kewaskum. The diamond was found in 1888 by Mr. Endlich near Theresa. It weighed 2 1/2 carats. Ten flawless gems were cut from this one stone, some white and some cream to yellow in color, and they are now scattered around the country. The

diamond was cut in 1918 by a New York firm at a cost of \$400.

Ralph Kohn and James Andrae were among the 20 young men from Washington county who left for Fort Sheridan, Ill. for two weeks training prior to being sent to some reforestation camp in northern Wisconsin. The reforestation project is a part of the federal administration's program to give 250,000 young men temporary employment. They are paid \$30 per month and maintenance.



Village Board Adopts Official Village Map

Regular Meeting
June 2, 1958

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present except Trustee Becker.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by A. Merwin and duly carried.

The first order of business was the public hearing on the adoption of an Official Village Map. Interested citizens present were: L. L. Rosenheimer, William Worm, Ada Mellahn, Arnold Shaske, Ralph Rimmel, Marie Del, Mr. Backes of Madison appeared on behalf of the State Planning Board. Mr. T. C. Manus of the McMahon Engineering Co. acted as Village Engineer. Village Attorney Stephen O'Meara was the legal advisor.

Ordinance No. 58-2 was then introduced by Trustee Arvin Merwin with the stipulation that the Maps accompanying said ordinance shall contain the minor changes as recommended by L. L. Rosenheimer. Motion was made by J. Stellpflug and seconded by W. Tessar that said ordinance shall be adopted. Upon roll call vote, all members present voting "AYE", the ordinance was declared adopted.

Ordinance No. 53-2 was published in last week's issue of the Statesman.

Upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by J. Schwind and duly carried, the following applications for combination Class "B" Fermented Malt Beverage and Intoxicating Liquor Licenses were approved and the Commissioner was instructed to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee: Walter Buczek, Walter Del, Louis J. Heisler, Althea Keller, Roman W. Miller, Oscar Ortman, Marlin Schneider, Sylvester Serwe, Edward Spradau and the Republican Hotel Operator's Helen Arnold and Jessie Weisflog.

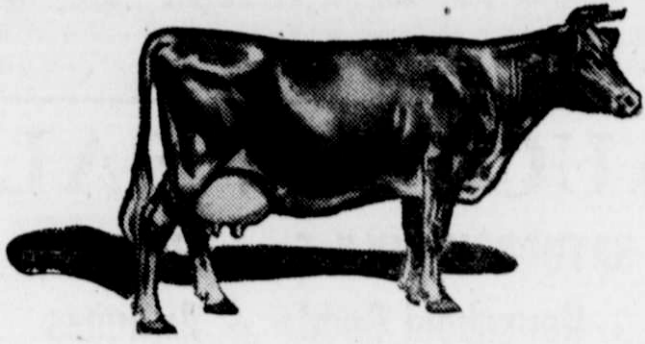

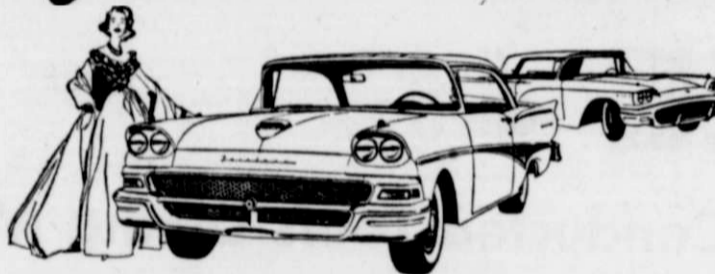

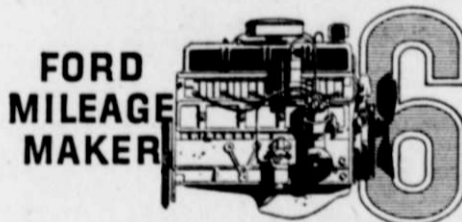
