

# **Village Board Adopts** Official Village Map

Regular Meeting June 2, 1958

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present except Trustee Becker.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by A. Merwin and duly carried.

The first order of business was the public hearing on the adoption of an Official Village Map. Interested citizens present were: L. L. Rosenheimer, William Worm, Ada Meilahn, Arnold Shaske, Ralph Remmel, Marie Dei, Mr. Backes of Madison appeared on behalf of the State Planning Board. Mr. T. C. Manus of the McMahon Engineering Co. acted as Village Engineer. Village Attorney Stephen O'Meara was the legal advisor

Ordinance No. 58-2 was then introduced by Trustee Arvin Merwin with the stipulation that the Maps accompanying said ordinance shall contain the minor changes as recommended by L. L. Rosenheimer. Motion was made by J. Stellpflug and seconded by W. Tessar that said ordinance shall be adopted. Upon roll call vote, all members present voting "AYE", the ordinance was declared adopt-




