This year's annual Kewaskum firemen and American Legion picnic will be held in the village park on Saturday evening and all day Sunday, July 12-13. The sponsors have lined up excellent entertainment for this year's affair, which will be bigger and better than ever.

The feature Saturday night will again be an amateur show and amateurs, both individuals and groups, from this area are invited to enter. Prizes will be awarded the winners. JIM FICKLER HURT IN DIVE; TWO TRUCK DRIVERS ALSO INJURED

Jimmy Fickler, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Fickler, Kewaskum, suffered a fractured neck on Monday afternoon when he dove in shallow water while swimming at Lake Seven. A companion, Dick Pierce, Kewaskum, with whom he had gone swimming, brought him to a local physician's office, from where his mother took him to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, where he is now confined.

Bob Flynn, Kewaskum, truck driver for the steel division of the Steffeke Freight Co., sustained bad sprains to both of his ankles and a sprained wrist while unloading steel in Milwaukee Tuesday morning. He was injured when the wind blew a large door shut and his feet were caught beneath the door. Flynn spent from Tuesday to Wednesday at St. Joseph's hospital for x-rays and treatment.

Services Held for Charles Backhaus

Funeral services were held Saturday, June 28, for Charles F. Backhaus, 88, prominent retired farmer and lifelong resident of the town of Kewaskum, who passed away suddenly at 3 p. m. on Wednesday, June 25, at his home just north of the village.

The last rites were held at 2 p. m. in the Peace E and R church, the Rev. Harry Baumer officiating. Burial took place in the parish cemetery. Prior to the funeral the body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Friday to 11 a. m. Saturday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services.

Mr. Backhaus was born in the town of Kewaskum on Nov. 28, 1869. His marriage to Emma Backhaus took place on Oct. 1, 1896. She survives together with one son Loran of the town of Kewaskum, a daughter-in-law, two grandsons, Glenway and Loran C. Backhaus; one granddaughter, Mary Backhaus, and one great-grandson, Ronny Backhaus.

During his younger years Mr. Backhaus was very active in church work. He served several years as president of Peace church and also was a choir member many years. He was also a member of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

Mrs. Belger's Brother Killed in Car Crash

Michael Rick, 18, of Barton, brother of Mrs. Myron Belger of Kewaskum, was burned to death and four other persons were treated for injuries in a three-car collision on Silver Spring road on the outskirts of West Bend at about 11:27 p. m. Sunday.

According to authorities the crash occurred when a car driven by Roger Ohrmund, 17, West Bend, attempted to pass one driven by Dan Kreis, 17, R. 1, West Bend, on the crest of a hill, and side-swiped an approaching car driven by Clairemont Krueger, Grafton. The mishap raised the county highway death toll to 11.

Ohrmund's car struck the left side of Krueger's auto, then swerved into the ditch on the east side and rolled over, landing on its top in the middle of the highway. Gasoline from the Ohrmund car ignited, enveloping the vehicle in flames. Persons who arrived at the scene helped passengers in the Ohrmund car out but were unable to get Rick from the auto. He was burned beyond recognition.

Injured and treated at St. Joseph's hospital were Ohrmund, concussion, cut and lacerations; Kreis, chest injury; Doris Krueger arm injury and Theresa Oelhafen, scratches and bruises. Several other persons involved were injured but were not listed as needing treatment.

Rick is survived by his father, Al Rick, Barton, three sisters besides Mrs. Belger, and three brothers. Funeral services were held at St. Mary's church, Barton, at 9 a. m. Wednesday, July 2, the Rev. O. F. Ullrich officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery.
