Hold Annual Meeting, Budget Hearing of High School District

Proposed Budget Of \$179,515.00 Is Presented Electors

\$1,000 ADDED TO BUDGET FOR PARKING AREA LIGHTS

The budget hearing was called to order by Melvin Riley, director of the Board of Education, with 21 electors present.

The proposed budget was read and explained to the electors.

Discussion was held concerning improvement of the site and installation of lights on the parking area. It was moved by Charles Miller and seconded by Carl Schaefer to add \$1,000.00 to the budget to cover the cost of parking area lights. Motion carried.

It was moved by James Reigle and seconded by Walter Wesenberg to present the proposed budget for operating expenses in the amount of \$179,515.00 to the electors at the annual meeting. Motion carried.

It was moved by Wayland Tessar and seconded by Charles Miller to adjourn the budget hearing. Motion carried.

The meeting was called to order by Melvin Riley with 35 electors present.

Mr. Riley called for nominations for chairman of the meeting. August Koch nominated Melvin Riley. It was moved by Elwyn Romaine and seconded by Wayland Tessar that nominations be closed and that the clerk cast a unanimous ballot for Melvin Riley. Motion carried.

Minutes of the 1957 annual meeting were read, and on motion by John Battaglia, seconded by Orval Behnke, and carried, were approved.

The auditor's report, submitted by Kannenberg and Marx, was read.

It was moved by James Reigle and seconded by Charles Miller to dispense with the reading of the clerk's report. Motion carried.

It was moved by Wayland Tessar and seconded by Walter Wesenberg to dispense with the reading of the treasurer's report. Motion carried.

The following resolutions were adopted:

RESOLUTION NO. 1—Be it resolved that the 1959 annual meeting of this District be held on the last Monday in June the year 1959 at 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

It was moved by Charles Miller and seconded by W. D. Tessar to adopt resolution No. 1. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 2—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 or the Kewaskum Community High School that the school year be set at nine months or 180 days.

Fire Destroys Tractor Owned By Joe Jaeger

The Kewaskum firemen were called out Tuesday morning at about 7:15 a. m. when a Ford tractor owned by the Joe Jaeger Excavating Co. of West Bend caught fire on a town road in front of the Jac. Brussel farm about a mile south of the village.

The tractor was pulling a trailer loaded with a caterpillar. The vehicles were traveling west up a grade on the gravel road when the driver noticed the motor was aflame. He pulled to the road and stopped.

The driver then returned to the Jaeger shop located on Hwy. 45 at the south end of the Kewaskum swamp for fire extinguishers. By the time he returned the flames had such a start that he was unable to put them out with the hand extinguisher. By the time he got a call in to the fire department the tractor was enveloped in flames. The firemen doused the blaze but by that time the vehicle was almost totally damaged.

Quick Action By Mother Saves Tot From Drowning

Margie, 2½-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Myron Belger, Kewaskum, had a narrow escape from drowning at about 8:30 a. m. Friday, July 11, when she accidentally fell or possibly may have been pushed by the family dog into a private pool of water owned by the Belgers on their rural property located just south of the village.

Margie and her brother Monty were playing in the sand next to the pool. With them was the large dog, which loves to play with the children and jump on them. Suddenly Monty noticed his little sister struggling in the water. He immediately ran into the house and told his mother who found the child floating and sinking in the water.

Mrs. Belger waded into the pool and pulled the tot out, immediately applying artificial respiration. At the same time she told her oldest son Mark to phone his grandmother, Mrs. Lena Belger, of the village to call the fire department rescue squad. Members of the squad sped to the scene and by the time they arrived Mrs. Belger had succeeded in getting her daughter to regain consciousness. She had carried the tot into the home and continued giving her artificial respiration there. The rescue squad then administered oxygen to the little girl. A local physician was called and he found Margie had suffered no ill effects from her experience but advised that she be kept in bed for a day or so. Later the girl remarked that the dog had pushed her into the pool.

Except for the quick action by the child's mother and her knowledge of artificial respiration, which she had learned as a Girl Scout in her earlier years, Margie most likely would have drowned. The rescue squad members should also be commended for their hurried response and capable work in helping the tot.

Amateur Show, Big Parade and Water Fight Are Highlights

This year's annual Kewaskum firemen and American Legion picnic in the village park is all set for Saturday evening and all day Sunday, July 12-13. The event will feature excellent entertainment and the parade should be bigger and better than ever. Advance reports reveal there will be a number of fine floats besides the several musical organizations and many other units in the parade.

Highlighting Saturday night's entertainment will be an amateur show. Harry Koch, who is in charge of the show, reported Wednesday that already 10 amateur groups or individuals had entered the contest and more may be added before Saturday. Amateurs have until the time of the show to enter. Anyone who can sing, dance, play an instrument or perform in any other way is invited to participate. Cash prizes will be awarded the winners. Music Saturday night will be provided by Les Schneider's orchestra.

The big parade at 12:30 p. m. will begin Sunday's activities. The parade will be highlighted by several fine musical organizations, including two bands and two drum

and bugle corps. They are the Hartford drum and bugle corps, Kewaskum Legion drum and bugle corps, Random Lake High school band and Kewaskum High school band. Other parade features will include musical groups, numerous floats, children's specialties and other units. Prizes will be awarded for the best floats and kiddies' specialties. Businessmen are urged to enter floats.

Besides the above mentioned parade features quite a few neighboring firemen and Legionnaires, with their equipment, floats and comedy units, will take part in the parade. The line of march will form on North Fond du Lac ave. in front of the Legion clubhouse, from where it will proceed to the park. Participants should be there no later than 12:15 p. m.

Entertainment Sunday afternoon and evening will feature the Maggie & Scotty Show of WEAU-TV, Eau Claire, Wis., stars of radio, stage and television. You've seen them on TV, now see them in person. This group provides the mid-west's most colorful country music show.

There will also be a water fight at 7 p. m. Sunday between the rival Barton and Boltonville fire departments. The rides, concession and refreshment stands will be operating continuously and you'll enjoy the juicy bratwurst and the picnic's famous hamburgers.

25 Years Ago

Thousands of dollars of damage was done in Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties Sunday by heavy rains and floods. Showers were also heavy here but no serious damage was done. Rural highways and lands were flooded and several bad washouts occurred with sections of railroad tracks near Eden being damaged. Rivers and creeks ran over their banks.

Hundreds of acres of land between Campbellsport and Eden were flooded, destroying seedings. In Sheboygan county the area hardest hit was in the vicinity of Crooked lake, Cascade and Batavia. Culverts were washed away and hail as large as hens eggs fell at Crooked lake, damaging windows and roofs. The only mishap here was a truck running off the highway in the swamp south of town. It took two heavy trucks to pull it out of the mud and water. The storm reminded local citizens of the flood here on Aug. 1, 1924.

Many years ago the county fair was organized with some very specific purposes in mind. First of all, it was an attempt on the part of the leaders of those days to use the fair to teach other people the latest information that was available. By having the judge come to the fair, they could do this teaching as they placed one man's product over another's in his judging. He was telling both of them that they did or did not have the kind of a product that new information indicated they should have at that time. There also was a chance for people to come and listen to other people as they talked of various things going on in the country in that day. Thirdly, it was an opportunity for people of the county to meet other people within the county.

Basically, the county fair has not changed much over the past 100 years. We still recognize those same objectives although there are others added to it as well. Today we will have commercial exhibits where the fair-goer may look for new items that he might use on his farm or in his home. All in all the fair in Washington county has done a wonderful job in teaching and bringing home new ideas to many people throughout the county.

The entire program this year will be of a centennial nature. In the big centennial building will be exhibits of many of the items that were characteristic of Washington county 100 years ago. For example, there will be the kind of kitchen that our grandmothers used as they prepared the family meals. There will be the kind of living room that many of our Washington county people of today can remember so vividly. There will be an old fashion butcher shop, and old fashion grocery store and an old fashion blacksmith shop. These items are all placed there with the idea of the recalling and commemorating those things that made our county famous as it is today.

It is a well recognized fact today that many of the people of Washington county left their homes in Europe because of their desire to have freedom of worship. Because of this, the Washington County Fair committee is installing a model church of the 1858 era. This church will be characteristic of many of those that were used in the late 1800's. Along with this church will be a school and a town hall that might have been used in those days of the late 1800's or the turn of the century.

On the bandstand will be a dancing and a singing program of the dances and songs that were characteristic at the time that our country was being settled. Bob
