## One Other Cyclist, Harold Krueger Is **Riders Wives Also** Injured in Mishap

James Van De Hei, 20, of R. 1, West DePere, a construction worker on the Hwy. 45 project between Barton and Kewaskum, was killed instantly in an accident shortly before 2:30 p. m. Monday when a front end tractor-loader he was driving tipped over and pinned him beneath it on the gravel road known as the "old West Bend road" several miles south of Ke-

According to one of the foremen on the project, the young man was driving the heavy vehicle from the south end of the Kewaskum swamp to the north end by way of the gravel road which runs parallel to Hwy. 45. Van De Hei is reported to have turned out for a vehicle approaching from the opposite direction when he apparently got off on the wet, soft shoulder of the road and the vehicle tipped over down a steep embankment. He was pinned beneath the payloader machine and his body crushed.

The accident occurred almost directly east of the Joe Jaeger Excavating Co. near the John Bertram and Les Schneider farms. The fatality raised the county highway death toll to 13 for 1958.

# Seriously Burned

Harold Krueger, 35, who resides on Hwy. V about two miles north of Kewaskum, was seriously burned Saturday afternoon in a flash fire while trying to dispose of a pile of rubbish in his yard.

Krueger suffered second degree burns on his arms, face and neck. The mishap occurred when Krueger poured gasoline on a pile of rubbish when it failed to ignite. Lighting a piece of paper to start the rubbish, Krueger was enveloped in flames when the gasoline fumes ignited.


