Rites Held for Allen Herriges, 25, Victim of Car-Train Crash

Wayne Young Man Killed at Crossing In Campbellsport

Funeral services were held at 9:30 a. m. Saturday in Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, for Allen Bernard Herriges, 25, of Wayne, R. 3, Kewaskum, who was instantly killed at approximately 7:15 p. m. Wednesday, July 16, when his auto was struck broadside by a fast-traveling Chicago and North Western railway passenger train on the Main st. crossing in Campbellsport.

The Rev. John T. Budde, pastor, officiated at the services and burial was made in the new Holy Trinity cemetery. Prior to the services the body had been in state at Miller's Funeral home since 2 p. m. Friday.

If Herriges had not applied the brakes of his car at the last minute, he probably would still be alive, Fond du Lac county traffic officers who investigated believe. The victim was alone in his car. He was driving east on Main st. and Train No. 209, bound from Milwaukee to Fond du Lac, was traveling at what Engineer H. A. Jennings, Milwaukee, said was 68 miles an hour. Witnesses said the railroad crossing signals were operating at the time. The train does not ordinarily stop at Campbellsport.

Marks showed that Herriges applied the car brakes about 16 feet from the tracks, slowing his car, and causing it to be rammed by the Diesel locomotive. Officers believe that if Herriges had continued at the speed he was driving or speeded up when he saw the train he probably could have made it across the tracks. The train whistle sounded about the time he applied the brakes, according to information given officers.

Parts of the demolished car were strewn a considerable distance in all directions. Herriges' foot and leg were severed and were found several yards from where his body lay between the railroad station and a spur track. The wreckage also struck the station, moving it off its foundation, and bending a signal ladder. A heating radiator in the station was broken and water flooded the floor. All phones in the station were knocked out of service.

Witnesses to the tragedy included Walter Luedtke and Mary Schmidt of Campbellsport, Mrs. J. Finn, Chicago, and her mother, Mrs. Alfred Koehler, Wauwatosa. Just before the crash a motorcyclist barely made it over the crossing, the witness reported.

Coroner Frank Becker of Fond du Lac county said there would be no inquest. The county ambulance was brought to the scene but it was not needed. The fatality was the ninth of the year for Fond du Lac county and the third since July 6.

The collision caused some damage to the locomotive. As a result the train was approximately one hour late on its trip north. A Milwaukee crew was in charge of the

Robert Sparks, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sparks, Kewaskum, a worker on the Hwy. 41 construction project, was injured Monday afternoon when he was dismounted from the truck he was driving and stepped into the path of another approaching truck.

Sparks sustained a badly lacerated left forearm, multiple lacerations about the head and multiple contusions and abrasions to the body. He was reported recovering satisfactorily and in good condition at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, by the attending physician.

The accident happened on the new second lane of Hwy. 41 about a mile south of Hwy. 60.

Herriges was born April 24, 1933 in the town of Kewaskum, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alois Herriges. The family had lived on a farm near St. Kilian before moving to Wayne Center. At the time of his death the young man was engaged to Miss Charlene Marx of Campbellsport and was on his way to see her when the mishap occurred.

Herriges is survived by his parents, a sister, Mrs. Joseph Ruppinger of Wayne; three brothers, Raynor of Kewaskum and Leander and Linus at home; 4 nieces and 1 nephew. The victim was employed at the West Bend Aluminum Co. and was a member of the Catholic Knights of Wisconsin.

New Increased Postal Rates in Effect Aug. 1

New, higher postage rates will become effective on Friday, Aug. 1, and new stamps and postal cards will go on sale on that date. The Post Office Department has been issuing new stamps, stamped envelopes and postal cards to post offices for several weeks preceding the change.

The new rates will be as follows: First class—4 cents per ounce. Post cards—3 cents per card. Drop letters—3 cents which can be sealed for village.

Second class—2 cents for first 2 ounces and 1 cent for each additional ounce, or fourth class if less.

Third class—3 cents for first 2 ounces and 1½ cents for each additional ounce. Weight limit increased up to but not including 16 ounces.

Fourth class—Sealing permitted. First class letters may be inclosed but postage must be placed on the outside of parcel. Invoice may be inclosed. Return address required on parcel post.

Air mail—7 cents per ounce up to 8 ounces.

No change in pound rates. Air parcels for overseas military addresses may weigh up to 70 pounds to certain APO's and NPO's. Air mail is limited to 100 inches in combined length and girth.

Air postal and post cards 5 cents each.

Insufficient postage or anything requiring postage due will be postage due plus 5 cents charge.

Shades of Old West! Cattle Stampede

Unusual to say the least, this area had a stampede of cattle owned by the John Heisdorfs of R. 2, Kewaskum. Possibly scared by a dog, a herd of 11 heifers, which had been on pasture on the Leroy Schultz farm a short distance west of the village, stampeded, jumped a fence and ran away while John was attempting to drive them along a road.

The cattle kept on running and members of the Heisdorf family, joined by neighbors along the way gave chase trying to round them up. The animals jumped fences, broke others, and escaped to neighboring farms, one of them straying all the way to the Nic Stoffel farm at the village outskirts.

Neighbors who captured some of the heifers tied them in their barns until the Heisdorfs could pick them up. Passersby also joined in the roundup, with the older men doing the spotting and the younger ones doing the running through the fields. It took several days before all the cattle were retrieved and much fence was damaged in the stampede.

During the chase John Heisdorf collapsed from sheer exhaustion and had to be placed under a physician's care. He also submitted to a hospital examination. John proved to himself that his track days are over.

Tot, 2, Saved From Drowning By Older Sister

GIRL, 10, HOLDS BROTHER ABOVE WATER UNTIL HELP ARRIVES

A little two-year old boy was saved from probable drowning in the Kohlsville pond on Monday by the quick thinking and action of his older sister.

The tot, David Gruber, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gruber of Milwaukee. While Mr. Gruber is spending two weeks in training at Camp McCoy, Mrs. Gruber and four children are visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Gruber in Kewaskum and other relatives. On Monday Mrs. John Gruber, Mrs. Bob Gruber and the children visited Mr. and Mrs. Eimer Gutjahr at Kohlsville.

The older girl, Diane Gruber, took the three younger children, ages 5, 2 and 1, for a walk over the bridge on the dam of the pond. While walking David slipped off of the bridge and fell into about four feet of water. Diane, who is unable to swim and has always been afraid of water, immediately slid down the bank after her little brother. When he came up she grabbed David and held him up. She was unable to get him out of the water alone, and using her wits screamed for help and instructed the 5 year old to hold on to the one year old lest he slip into the water.

The mother and grandmother heard the screams in the Gutjahr house and rushed to help the children. Mrs. John Gruber got hold of the boy but she also had difficulty in removing him from the water because of the steepness of the bank. At the same time Warren McElroy, a Kohlsville resident, who had heard the screams from across the pond, came over in his boat and lifted the children into it. McElroy is a Boy Scout worker at West Bend. While this was going on a relative of McElroy arrived in his car and offered his assistance.

Although very frightened, little David was unharmed, thanks to the hasty work and adult thinking of his young sister. Had Diane run to the house for help instead of holding the tot above water he no doubt would have drowned in the meantime.

The Very Reverend Dean Phillip J. Vogt, beloved pastor of Holy Trinity and St. Bridget's parishes, celebrated the golden jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood. Fr. Vogt gave thanks with a solemn high mass at 9:30 a. m. surrounded by members of the clergy, relatives, parishioners and friends. Assisting him were Rev. Peter P. Schaeffer of Tishomingo, Okla., Rev. Roman Stoffel of Sheboygan, Rev. Clarence Stoffel of Milwaukee, and Rev. Aloysius Fellenz of West Bend, all former sons of the local parish. Rev. Vogt was ordained on June 24, 1883 and read his first mass at West Bend on July 5. Before coming here as pastor 38 years ago he held pastorates at Granville, Theresa, Lomira, professor at St. Francis seminary, Fond du Lac and Platteville. He succeeded Rev. Grome here in July, 1895. 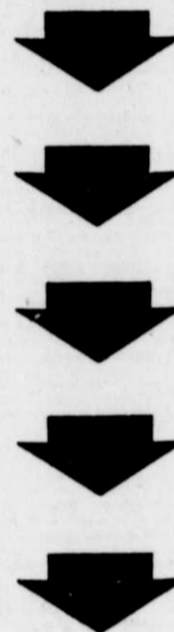

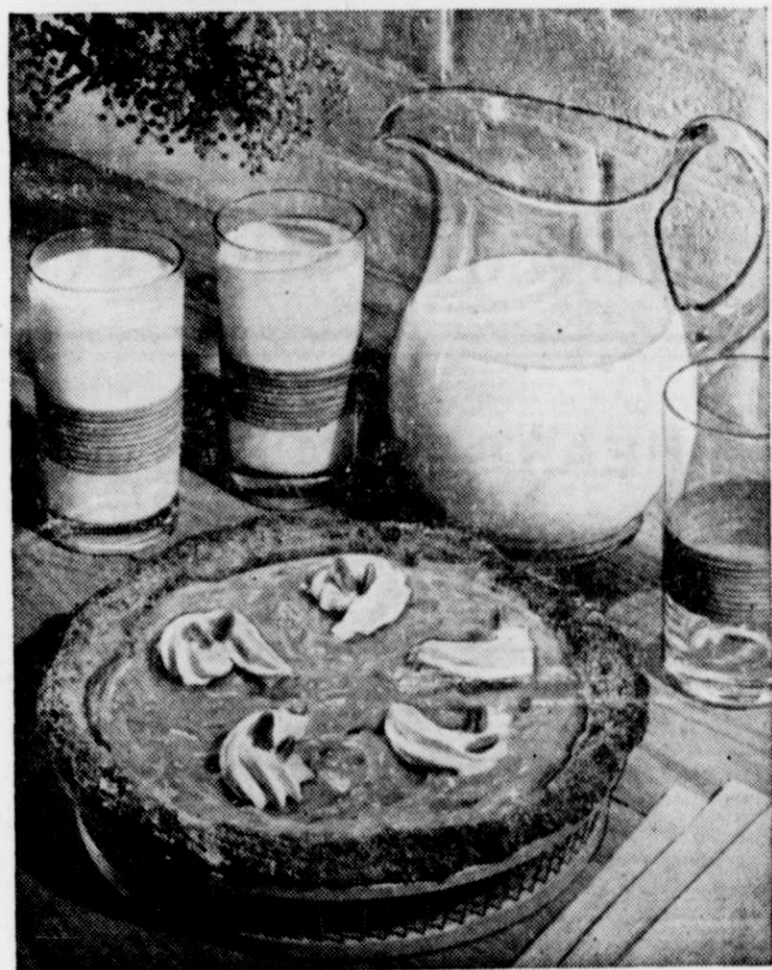

- 1 cup fine vanilla wafer crumbs
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 3 tablespoons softened butter

Combine crumbs and sugar. Add softened butter and mix well. Press firmly with back of spoon on bottom and sides of 8-inch pie pan. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 5 to 8 minutes and cool before filling.

Decorate with whirls of whipped cream, and, if desired, chopped peanuts.

Wagner, of the UW civil engineering department, explains. The students' work at camp includes computation, mapmaking and report writing, with consideration given to problems in topographic and hydrographic surveys, triangulation, route surveys, stream flow measurement, analysis of waterpower sites, and railway problems, he said.

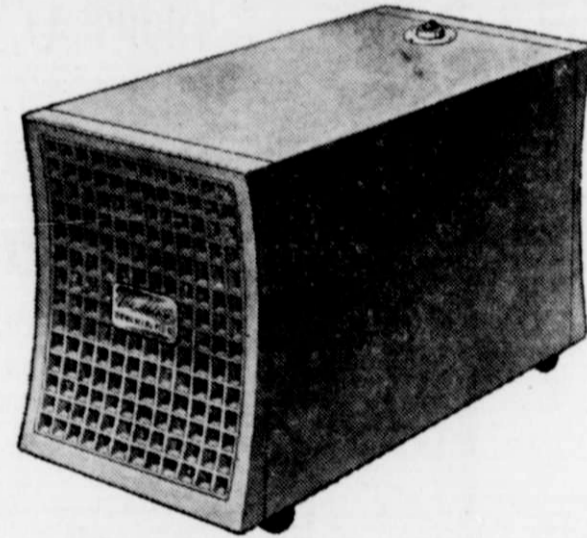

Chilled Crab Bisque Headlines Lunch Menu on Hot Summer Day



Chilled crab bisque is wonderful for a hot summer day. Ideal for the sea-food minded, it's filling and fits in perfectly as the main course for lunch.

CHILLED CRAB BISQUE

4-6 servings
2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 teaspoon paprika

1 teaspoon dry mustard
1 tablespoon minced onion
3 cups milk
1 cup light cream
1 cup (6 1/2 oz. can) crab meat, drained and cut into chunks
2 tablespoons butter

Combine tapioca, salt, pepper, paprika, dry mustard, onion, milk, and cream in top of double boiler. Place over rapidly boiling water

and cook 10 to 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Add crab meat and butter and mix. Keep over hot water 15 to 20 minutes, to heat thoroughly and blend flavors. Cool about 20 minutes, stir, and chill thoroughly — 2 to 3 hours or overnight. Before serving, thin to desired consistency with milk or cream. Garnish with thin slices of lemon and finely chopped parsley.

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
