114 Freshmen, 336 in High School, 325 in Grades Set All Time High Enrollment

Total Enrollment Of 661 Pupils 89 Above Last Year

The Kewaskum Community High school and public school opened on Tuesday with another all-time high enrollment of 661 pupils, which figure far exceeds last year's total of 572 by 89 pupils. The large freshmen class numbering 114 students, the 336 enrolled in high school and the 325 in the grades all set new records.

Last year the enrollment in high school was 294, or 42 under this term. A total of 278 were enrolled in the grades or 47 fewer than this year. Although 109 freshmen were registered in advance 114 showed up on opening day. The advance registrations in high school were 325 but 11 more who enrolled the first day of school jumped the total to 336. About 390 were expected in the grades where 25 additional pupils enrolled opening day and increased the total to 325, as the schools continue to show rapid growth.

The freshman class of 114 is larger by 25 students over last year's 89 who started school. The 661 in the public schools, added to the 240 in Holy Trinity Parochial school, makes a total of 901 children attending school in the village this year as the number soars closer to the 1,000 mark. At this rate the school enrollment will soon exceed the population of the village. Part of the increased enrollment in high school is due to the addition of new outlying school districts to the local district.

Sixty-five children started kindergarten, more than twice as many as last year when 32 enrolled. This large kindergarten class accounts to a large extent for the sizable enrollment in the grade school. A very large number of new pupils also transferred here from other schools.

There is ample room and more to spare for the huge number of pupils in the public schools with the new high school being built to accommodate 500 students, the old high school building housing the upper grades and the new grade school to accommodate the lower grades.

The staff of 27 teachers, including eight new ones, was listed in a previous issue.

Primary Election Tuesday, Sept 9

Ballots will be cast in the primary election next Tuesday, Sept. 9, throughout the county and state. Interest in the election is increasing as the time for voting approaches and a good vote is anticipated.

Voting in the village will be at the municipal building and the polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. Voting for the town of Kewaskum will be done in the Labor hall on Fond du Lac ave. and the polls will open at 9 a. m. and close at 5:30 p. m.

With a senator and a representative to select on the national level and a complete slate of state officers, including senator and member of assembly, as well as the entire county slate of officers, voting should be quite heavy. Many incumbents will have no opposition in the primary but will be strongly opposed in the November election.

In the race for district attorney two Washington county attorneys are seeking the Republican nomination to succeed Lee Goring. Deane R. Bascom, West Bend, is opposed by Donald A. Frings, Hartford. All other county candidates on the GOP ticket are unopposed.
