The Reverend F. L. Rodenbeck, 7, of 624 Fourth ave., West Bend, former pastor of Peace Evangelical and Reformed church in Kewaskum, passed away unexpectedly at his home on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 7.

Rev. Rodenbeck had served as a minister for the past 43 years, during which time he served as pastor of many E and R churches in several states. At the time of his death he was serving as interim pastor of the E and R church at Jackson. He conducted services at the Jackson church Sunday morn-

ing and died shortly after at his home.

Rev. Rodenbeck served as pastor of Peace church from 1951 to 1957. a period of six years. Since retiring from the active ministry at the local parish last year, he and Mrs. Rodenbeck spent the winter months in Florida and then visited their children before moving to West Bend two months ago.

Born on March 21, 1891, at Low den, Iowa, Rev. Rodenbeck's marriage to the former Ella Thomsen

took place on Jan. 10, 1917 at Davenport, Ia. He served as pastor of E and R churches in the following communities: Fulton Mo., Griswald, Ia., Muscatine, Ia. Hubbard, Ia., Lincoln, Nebr, and Port Washington, Wis. before com-

the Republicans. Atty. Deane R. Bascom won the Republican nomination for district attorney of Washington county and Robert Lisko was victorious in the Democratic race for nomination as candidate for sheriff in the only Bascom defeated Donald Frings and Lisko won out over DuWayne Hasenfus.

The election brought out only a raction of the voters in the county despite the many contests for nomination on the county, state and national levels. The successful candidates will oppose each other in the Nov. 4 election.

Bascom won over Frings by several hundred votes, 1,572 to 1,184. although Frings was leading until the West Bend wards came in. Lisko, of the town of Wayne, de-

feated Hasenfus 657 to 561 and will oppose incumbent Alvin L. Schmidt in November. All other candidates on the county slate were unopposed.
