THE STORY OF PEACE CHURCH

On June 2, 1898 nine men met for the purpose of considering the possibility of organizing an Evangelical Protestant congregation in Kewaskum. After the unanimous decision to do so, Rev. R. Gruenewald of Fillmore was asked to conduct services every other week until a resident pastor could be secured. The next day, June 3, the location of the future church was decided by accepting the gift of a lot. At another meeting on June 6, a constitution was adopted. (CONTINUED ON PAGE FOUR)

Rev. F. Rodenbeck, Bascom, Lisko Win In County; Only 176 Votes Here

DEMOCRATS RUN STRONG, TRAIL REPUBLICANS BY ONLY 29 VOTES

The Reverend F. L. Rodenbeck, 67, of 624 Fourth ave., West Bend, former pastor of Peace Evangelical and Reformed church in Kewaskum, passed away unexpectedly at his home on Sunday afternoon, Sept. 7.

Rev. Rodenbeck had served as a minister for the past 43 years, during which time he served as pastor of many E and R churches in several states. At the time of his death he was serving as interim pastor of the E and R church at Jackson. He conducted services at the Jackson church Sunday morning and died shortly after at his home.

Rev. Rodenbeck served as pastor of Peace church from 1951 to 1957, a period of six years. Since retiring from the active ministry at the local parish last year, he and Mrs. Rodenbeck spent the winter months in Florida and then visited their children before moving to West Bend two months ago.

Born on March 21, 1891, at Lowden, Iowa, Rev. Rodenbeck's marriage to the former Ella Thomsen took place on Jan. 10, 1917 at Davenport, Ia. He served as pastor of E and R churches in the following communities: Fulton, Mo., Griswald, Ia., Muscatine, Ia., Hubbard, Ia., Lincoln, Nebr. and Port Washington, Wis. before coming to Kewaskum in 1951. During their residence here the Rodenbecks were very well liked and made numerous friends in the community.

Surviving together with his widow are two sons, Frederick L. Rodenbeck, Jr. of Asheville, N. C. and Richard H. Rodenbeck of Chanute Air Force Base, Ill.; three daughters, Mrs. Betty Fahrner of Mountain Home, Idaho, Mrs. Joanne Klehne of La Crosse and Mrs. Rhoda Laudel of St. Louis, Mo.; 16 grandchildren and three sisters, Mrs. Erna Thomsen of Sun Prairie, Wis., Mrs. Elsa Mensing and Mrs. Wilma Twachtman, both of Lowden, Ia.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday and at the Peace church from 12 noon until the time of services at 2 p. m. The Rev. C. F. Hammen, pastor, was in charge of the service. The Rev. Paul Kehle of Waukesha, president of the Synod, delivered the sermon and the Rev. Harry Baumer of West Bend assisted at the service.

The body was taken to Lowden, Ia. by Millers where a short service was held at Zion E and R church on Thursday and where burial took place. Millers were in charge of all details here and at Lowden.

Bascom, Lisko Win In County; Only 176 Votes Here

DEMOCRATS RUN STRONG, TRAIL REPUBLICANS BY ONLY 29 VOTES

In one of the smallest turnouts in many years, only 176 voters cast ballots in Tuesday's primary election in the village. Actually only about one-fourth of the eligible voters in Kewaskum saw fit to visit the polls.

Of the votes cast 102 were Republican and 73 Democrat. This is a very strong showing for the Democrats, who ordinarily run far behind the Republicans in this GOP stronghold. But Tuesday the Dems received only 29 fewer votes than the Republicans.

Atty. Deane R. Bascom won the Republican nomination for district attorney of Washington county and Robert Lisko was victorious in the Democratic race for nomination as candidate for sheriff in the only opposition on the county ticket. Bascom defeated Donald Frings and Lisko won out over DuWayne Hasenfus.

The election brought out only a fraction of the voters in the county despite the many contests for nomination on the county, state and national levels. The successful candidates will oppose each other in the Nov. 4 election.

Bascom won over Frings by several hundred votes, 1,572 to 1,184, although Frings was leading until the West Bend wards came in. Lisko, of the town of Wayne, defeated Hasenfus 657 to 561 and will oppose incumbent Alvin L. Schmidt in November. All other candidates on the county slate were unopposed.

In the only opposition on the state ticket Warren P. Knowles won the GOP nomination over George M. Smith and Leo P. O'Brien for lieutenant governor. On the Democratic ticket Philleo Nash won over Albert Di Piazza and Jerome P. Grant for lieutenant governor. Jerome Reinke won over William H. Evans and Robert W. Groenert for secretary of state. Eugene M. Lamb defeated Palmer F. Daus for the state treasurer nomination. William Proxmire won the nomination over Harry Hallway and Arthur J. McGurn for U. S. Senator. John Reynolds was victorious over Christ Seraphim for attorney general. (CONTINUED ON PAGE EIGHT)

\$25 Cash to Be Given Winner If Present on Opening Night

Slinger Man Is Fatally Hurt in St. Kilian Crash

Harold Mechenich, 41, of R. 1, Slinger, was killed Monday morning, Sept. 8, at about 9:35 a. m. in a truck crash at St. Kilian. His death was the 17th traffic fatality on Washington county highways in 1958.

Mechenich was injured when the gravel truck he was driving for the Lee Jaeger Co. was struck in the left side by another gravel truck driven by Kurt Pamperin, 20, of R. 3, West Bend at the intersection in St. Kilian.

Mechenich was traveling east and was about to turn north at the intersection to pick up a load of gravel when the mishap occurred. Pamperin was also driving for the Jaeger Co. His truck was loaded at the time of the crash.

The force of the crash threw Mechenich from the cab of his truck and the left rear wheel of the vehicle passed over him. He was rushed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum ambulance and was pronounced dead shortly after his arrival there.

Mechenich is reported to have suffered a crushed chest and other injuries in the accident. He was single and resided with his mother, Mrs. Mary Mechenich at Slinger.

At a meeting held by a number of Fond du Lac county sportsmen it was decided that a two and one-half day open season for pheasants in the county be recommended to the state conservation commission hearing. The recommendation will include a possession limit of two cock birds.

At a meeting of the Joint School District No. 5 of the town and village of Kewaskum the school board was authorized to purchase from Mrs. August Bilgo additional land joining the present school grounds, on the north and east, for \$1,000. The school district is to pay \$850 and the balance of \$150 will be contributed by the American Legion post.

The annual meeting of the Wisconsin Beagle club was held at Joe Eberle's place with a large attendance. Eberle was re-elected president of the club. Other officers are Fred Klepp, La Valle, vice-president; S. P. Fell, Oshkosh, secretary and treasurer; Ervin Kopp, Johnson Creek, field trial committee.

The Washington County Barbers' association met at Hartford with 37 present. It was decided to operate shops at a maximum of 66 hours a week, according to the code adopted. Maximum prices to become effective are haircuts 40c and shaves 20c.

The assessor of incomes of the district sent a report to County Clerk Martin Monroe which recommends that the property valuations of Washington county for the year 1933 be reduced \$6,968,882. The valuations recommended for the village are \$989,020, a reduction of \$174,540. In 1932 the valuation of the village was fixed at \$1,163,560.

William Schaub, local dealer for the Terraplane and Hudson automobiles, received word that the Terraplane-Hudson and Essex sensational "ground flying" autos are coming to Kewaskum. Heading this special traveling style pageant of latest models is Ameri-

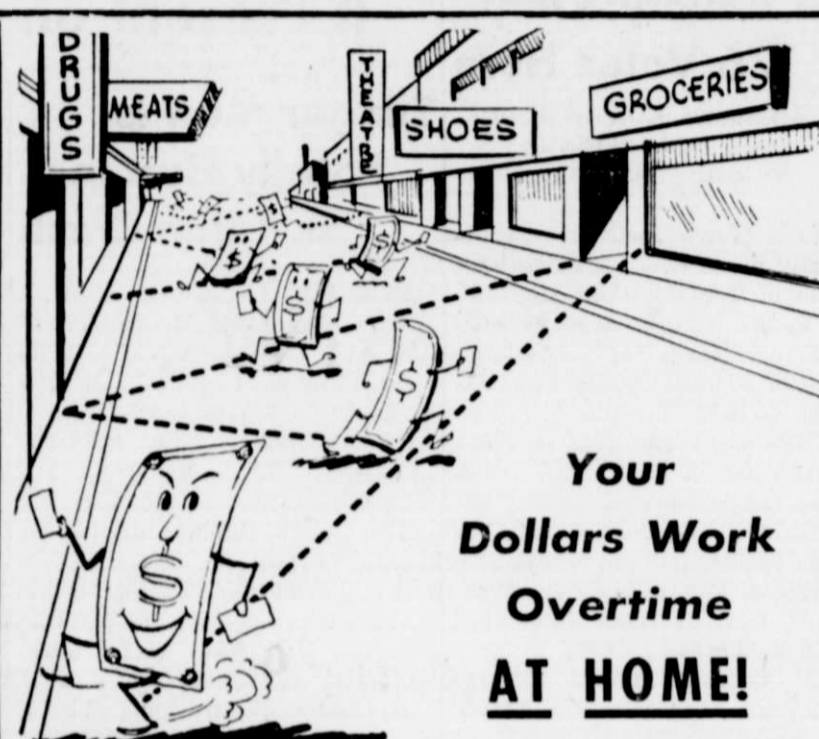

and it was voted to proceed at once with the building of a church. This was a group with spirit and action, for in five months on Nov. 4 the church, erected and furnished at a cost of about \$3,900.00 was dedicated to the service and glory of God. The following family names have been identified with the church from the beginning: Backhaus, Becker, Bruessel, Buddenhagen, Buss, Doms, Ebenreiter, Geidel, Guth, Kirchner, Koch, Koerble, Krahn, Meinhardt, Mertes, Prost, Rummel, Schaefer, Schleif, Schmidt, Schmitt, Schnurr, Schultz and Wesenberg.

In 1901 the parsonage was purchased for the sum of \$2,000.00. In 1903 the lot next to the church was purchased for \$150.00; the church was decorated and all indebtedness on the building paid. The Ladies' Aid was organized in 1915 and central heating was installed in the parsonage. English was first used in the Sunday School in 1918. In 1921 electric lights and telephone were installed in the parsonage and the garage was built. In 1923 at the 25th anniversary the church basement was remodeled, electric lights installed and the art windows were among

the anniversary gifts. English services were introduced in 1922. The weekly offering envelopes were first used in 1923. During the period of 1929-32 an extensive remodeling and addition to the church was accomplished at a cost of \$15,000.00. This made possible the chancel upstairs and the kitchen, heating room and rest rooms in the basement.

Through the emphasis on Stewardship and Benevolent giving the congregation met its benevolent quota 100% in 1936 and has continued the record up to the present time. The Organom was a gift of the Women's Guild in 1938. Lightning struck the church in August, 1940, causing damage to the extent of \$2,500.00. The cemetery was incorporated and a perpetual care fund established in 1946. Although served by the denomination from the beginning the congregation became a member of the Evangelical and Reformed church in 1946. Through the merger with the Congregational Christian Churches in 1957 it is now "The United Church of Christ."

At the time of the 50th anniversary in 1948, plans were directed toward the expansion of the physical facilities for an increased and varied ministry in a growing community. The building fund has a balance of \$10,000.00. A lot in the rear of the church, facing Main Street was purchased in 1958 for \$2,450.00. The purchase of other desirable lots are under considera-

tion. The new organ fund has a balance of \$918.00. The church and parsonage have undergone extensive remodeling and maintenance work during these years.

Wm. G. Schwemmer, 1946-1951, Merrill, Wis.; Rev. F. L. Rodenbeck, 1951-1957.; Rev. Clarence Hammen, 1957-.

Cows Killed, Steer Hit, Pole Clipped in Crashes, Corn Causes One Other

Several accidents of a varied nature occurred in Kewaskum and surrounding area the past week in which three cows were killed, a steer was injured, a pole was clipped off and a look at some sweet corn caused another.

William L. Rahlf, and his wife of Kewaskum were injured at 12:45 a. m. Sunday on Hwy. 28 about four miles west of Kewaskum when a car driven by the former came over the crest of a hill and ran into a herd of cows. Rahlf tried to avoid hitting the cattle by swerving his car, but struck three cows, all of which were killed. The cows belonged to Barney Strohmeyer of R. 2, Kewaskum. Rahlf suffered a bump on the head and knee and Mrs. Rahlf sustained a cut on her forehead.

A car driven by the Rev. Arthur A. Haupt, 31, of New Fane collided with a Black Angus steer that ran onto the highway about 9:35 p. m. Sunday on County Trunk S at the Etta farm about 1 1/2 miles north of Kewaskum. The front end of the car was damaged.

Five persons were hurt in a two car collision Saturday afternoon about a half mile north of County Trunk C on Hwy. 45. According to the police report, the mishap occurred when Peter Yearling, Jr., 28, of R. 1, Kewaskum, slowed down to turn into a driveway when his auto was struck by one driven by Richard Rupp, 23, of R. 1, Jackson. Rupp reported he was looking at some sweet corn along the highway. Injured were Yearling, cuts on head, knee and bruises; Donna May Yearling, 5, bumps and bruises; Michael

Yearling, 1, bumps and bruises; Mrs. Yearling, bumps and bruises; Rupp, cuts on head and knee. Mrs. Anne E. Anderson, 23, of R. 3, West Bend, escaped injury at about 12:30 a. m. Monday when she lost control of her car while attempting to pick up a cigarette from the floor and the vehicle left the highway and clipped off a telephone pole on North Fond du Lac ave. (Hwy. 45) about 300 feet south of Hwy. 28. She was northbound at the time.
