## Bonus Night Cash Prize This Friday Increased to \$50.00

### Winner Last Week, Willard Gruhle, Was Not Present

This Friday, Sept. 19, on bonus night sponsored by the Kewaskum businessmen, the cash prize to be given away free will be increased to \$50.00 for the lucky winner. The winning name will be selected sometime between 7:30 and 8:30 p. m. in the 44 co-operating business places, which are listed in an advertisement on the last page of this issue.

The winning name selected last Friday (at 7:55 p. m.) was WILLARD GRUHLE, R. 1, KEWASKUM (New Fane). Gruhle was not present in any of the business places at the time and received a \$5.00 consolation prize, while the bonus prize was increased to \$50 this Friday. ### Stars and Stripes Carries Feature Story on Fr. Mayer

The Friday, Aug. 8, issue of the European edition of The Stars and Stripes, unofficial publication of the U. S. Armed Forces in Europe, North Africa and the Middle East, carried a feature story and picture of the Rev. William J. Mayer, now Chaplain (Capt.) Mayer of the 36th Artillery Group stationed in Babenhause, Germany.

Chaplain Mayer is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Mayer of Kewaskum and a brother of Mrs. Bob Ours of this village and Chief of Police Carl Mayer of Barton. The photograph showed Chaplain Mayer getting ready for a service at his chapel in Babenhause and the story, which appeared under the caption "Along with Gun Collecting, Hunting at Babenhause, Chaplain Has Own Amity Program," read as follows:

BABENHAUSEN, Germany (S&S) — They call him the "Pistol-Packin' Padre," although he never carries one. But they smile with the affection born of comradeship and understanding when they call him that.

Catholic Chaplain (Capt.) William J. Mayer of the 36th Arty Gp. collects guns. He has more than 200 weapons in his home at Kewaskum, Wis., and a few in his Babenhause quarters.

"I'd rather be known for my work as a priest than for my hobbies," said the chaplain. "There are times when I am asked to do many things in the interest of community relations as well as to perform my priestly functions."

Father Mayer is an ardent hunter and fisherman and is president of the Babenhause Rod and Gun Club. He has a USAREUR examiner's and instructor's hunting course certificate and is qualified to teach sportsmen. At home in Wisconsin he is a special deputy sheriff of Milwaukee County and of Washington County, where he comes from.

"Over here my outside activities are confined primarily to hunting," he said. "I hunt with the German people and I get along extremely well with them."

He speaks German fluently and his reputation as a friend of the German people extends far beyond Babenhause.

In the States his gun collection consists of pistols, shotguns and handguns, some of which are more than 100 years old.

Father Mayer, a tall, heavy set man with eyes that laugh and a smile that makes every man his friend, is the man they come to with problems. Not only the problems of the men of the 36th but those of communities nearby.

A certain town required a bulldozer to build a playground. "Can you help us out, Father?" he is asked. He can, and he does.

The town of Dieburg asked him to help remove stumps for a home for children. He asked for and got the assistance Dieburg required.

Father Mayer is keen on building up friendship between Germans and Americans. He has arranged for many GIs to be guests in German homes.

## Kewaskum Pure Milk Local Annual Meeting

SESSION AT OPERA HOUSE ON SEPT. 26; WILL ELECT OFFICERS, DELEGATES

Farmers are receiving eight per cent less for their milk now than they did during the 1947-49 period while consumers are paying 15 per cent more for their dairy products than in 1947-49. This fact has been substantiated by figures by the United States Department of Agriculture.

Pure Milk Products Co-operative points out that still the dairy farmer is blamed for increased prices of dairy products while he must meet higher costs of feed, machinery, clothing and food at a lower income. These and other things will be discussed at the annual meeting of the Kewaskum Local of Pure Milk Products which will be held at the Kewaskum Opera House on Friday, Sept. 26, beginning at 8:30 p. m.

The Kewaskum Local will elect officers, delegates to the annual convention to be held at Fond du Lac Oct. 28, and members of the by-laws and resolutions committee.

Other matters of interest will also be taken up at the meeting, including a financial report. Members at the meeting will also draft resolutions to be presented at the state convention. A speaker from the Fond du Lac office will be present.

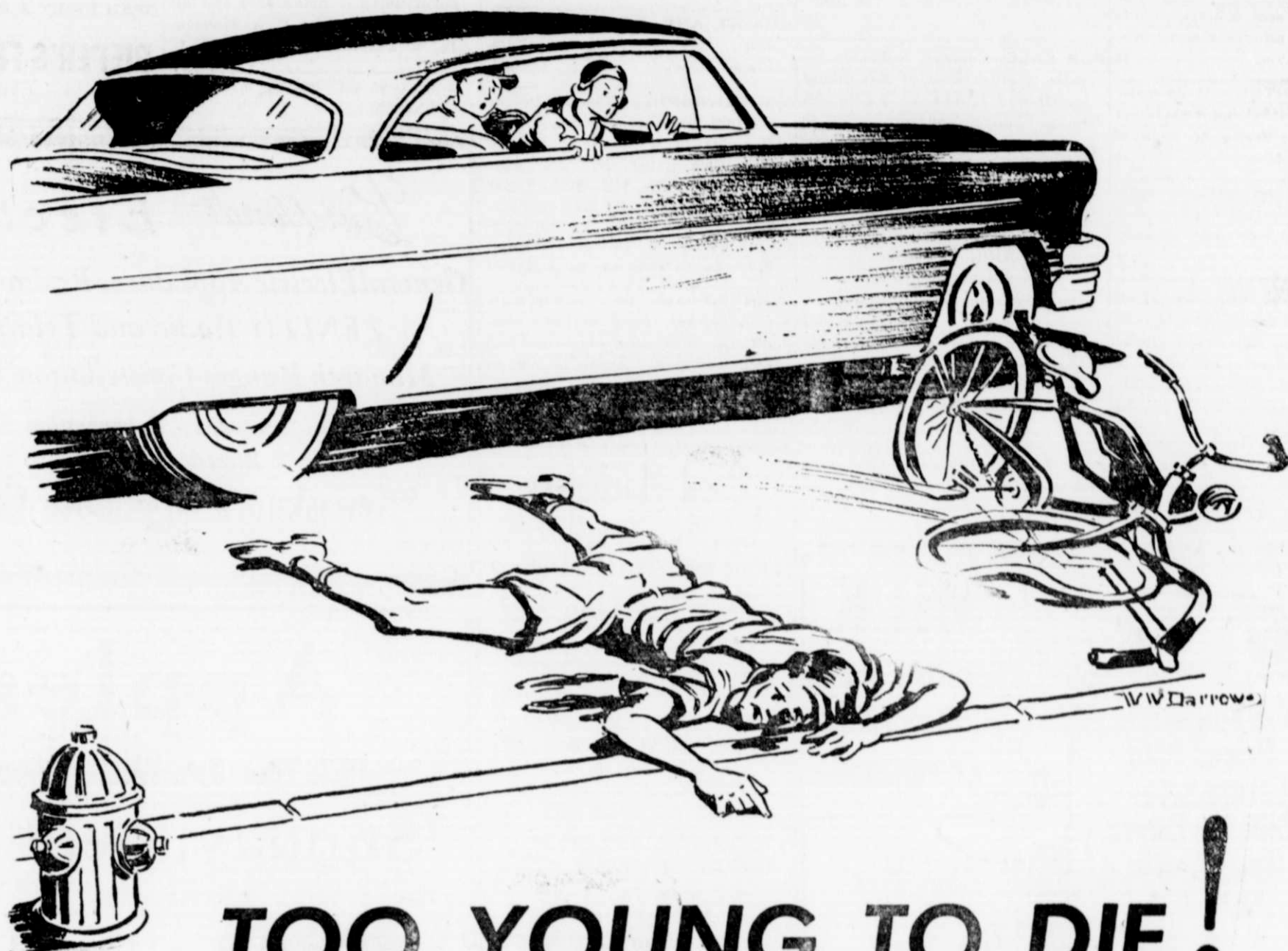

General Manager of the State Farm Progress program is A. J. Wojta, extension soil and water engineer.



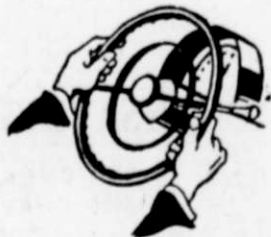
## TOO YOUNG TO DIE!



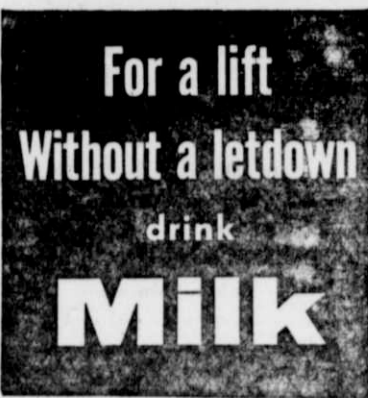

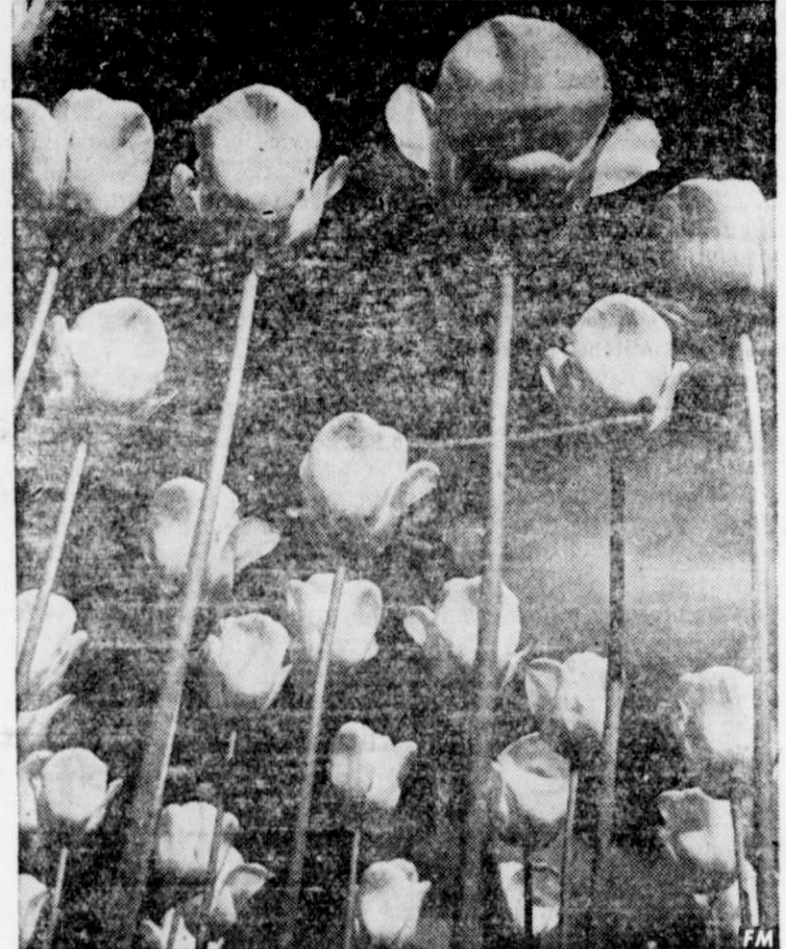
