Albert G. Hron Retires from Regal Ware

CAREER WITH FIRM COVERS SPAN OF 47 YEARS; WILL REMAIN AS CONSULTANT

Albert G. Hron has announced his retirement from active service with Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, according to J. O. Reigle, president of the firm.

Mr. Hron, who has a distinguished career covering a span of 47 years in the aluminum cookware industry, has been in charge of product research and develop-

ment for Regal Ware and will continue his association with the company as a consultant.

He began his career with what was originally the Kewaskum Aluminum company when ground was broken for its first factory building on Oct. 1, 1919, and was superintendent and in charge of engineering, as well as a member of the board of directors.

At that time the original factory was a 50 x 180 foot two-story structure with 40 employees and Mr. Hron notes with pride that it has grown to Regal's modern facilities that now cover almost four acres. He explained that in the early days of the cookware industry the items were produced almost entirely by handwork while today most operations are done automatically. He stated that many of today's manufacturing techniques were considered impossible 40 years ago and considers the aluminum and stainless steel cookware products of today superior in raw material, design and craftsmanship.

He recalled the impact of war on the cooking utensil industry, and how his firm helped to develop the 75mm. steel cartridge case and was the first to make 81mm. mortar shells and 57mm. smoke shells out of cold drawn steel during World War II. During the Korean war, Regal Ware was among the first to successfully produce the 105mm. steel cartridge case for the U. S. Army and Mr. Hron was author of an article on this accomplishment which was featured in MACHINERY and other national trade magazines.

In addition to his business accomplishments, Mr. Hron is well known for his activities as a sportsman and musician. He was director of the West Bend City band and Moose band when those organizations were at the height

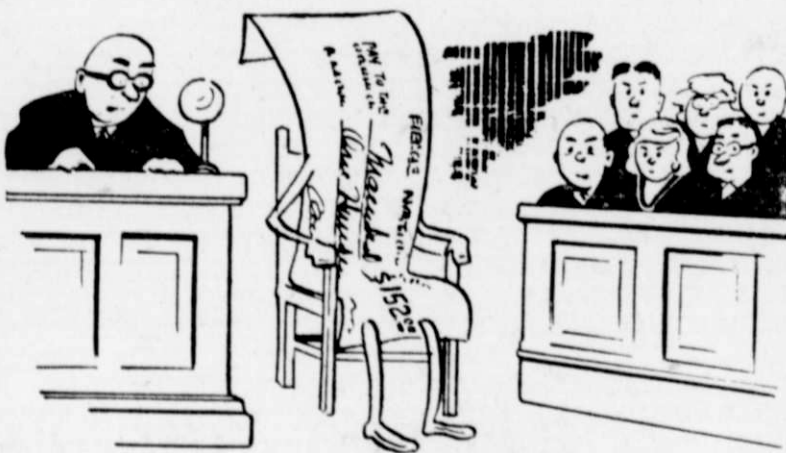

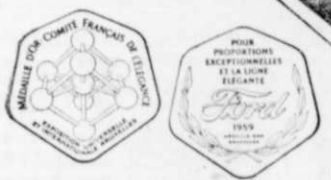

In very cold weather and in the face of strong, chilly wind Friday night, the Kewaskum Indians squeezed by Campbellsport by a narrow 7-6 margin in their football game here. The win was the Indians' second in three games and gave them second place. It was Dad's Night at Kewaskum and fathers of the players were introduced preceding the game.

The magic toe of Sophomore Kon Sadownikow decided the Kewaskum victory. He kicked a crucial point after touchdown to provide the margin in the win. The Bells scored first in the second quarter on a 25 yard pass play from Don Weber to Dick Kleinhans but failed in the attempt for the extra point. Kewaskum did not score until the last period when they started a 60 yard march on their own 40 yard line and went all the way. Norm (Butch) Rodenkirch finally scored from the eight-yard line on a pass from Sadownikow that was slightly deflected by a Bell defensive halfback.

The TD tied the score at 6-all and Sadownikow readied himself for the all-important kick. With just five minutes remaining, Kon's place-kick split the uprights and gave Kewaskum a hard fought victory. Other than that the game was played almost completely around midfield, with neither squad moving beyond the opponent's 20 yard line.

Kewaskum will play its homecoming game this Friday night with North Fond du Lac. The Indians easily defeated the Orioles, 25-0, in their first meeting at North Fondy.

Megellas Is Speaker at County Democrat Rally

CANDIDATE FOR CONGRESS ATTACKS EZRA BENSON'S FARM PROGRAM

James Megellas, Democratic candidate for Congress in the Sixth District, spoke to members of the Democratic party of Washington county at a rally held at West Park hall in West Bend on Monday evening, Oct. 13.

Megellas attacked Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson's farm program as fantastic. This program is costing the taxpayer almost \$7 billion for the current fiscal year and is resulting in lower income to the dairy farmers and increased prices to the consumer.

Megellas compared Benson to a magician pulling rabbits out of a hat. Megellas said this is quite a trick, milking the taxpayer out of \$6.9 billion to administer a farm program that is bringing the dairy farmer 22 per cent less for milk than he received in the period 1952 to 1958, while the consumer prices for dairy products has gone up 15 per cent for the period 1949 to 1958. The cost to the taxpayer of Ben-

son's farm program has gone up 1,000 per cent since 1952.

Megellas asked for a congressional investigation to determine the reasons for the tremendous spread between consumer prices and farm income. He said this program is an injustice to the farmer, the consumer and the taxpayers alike.

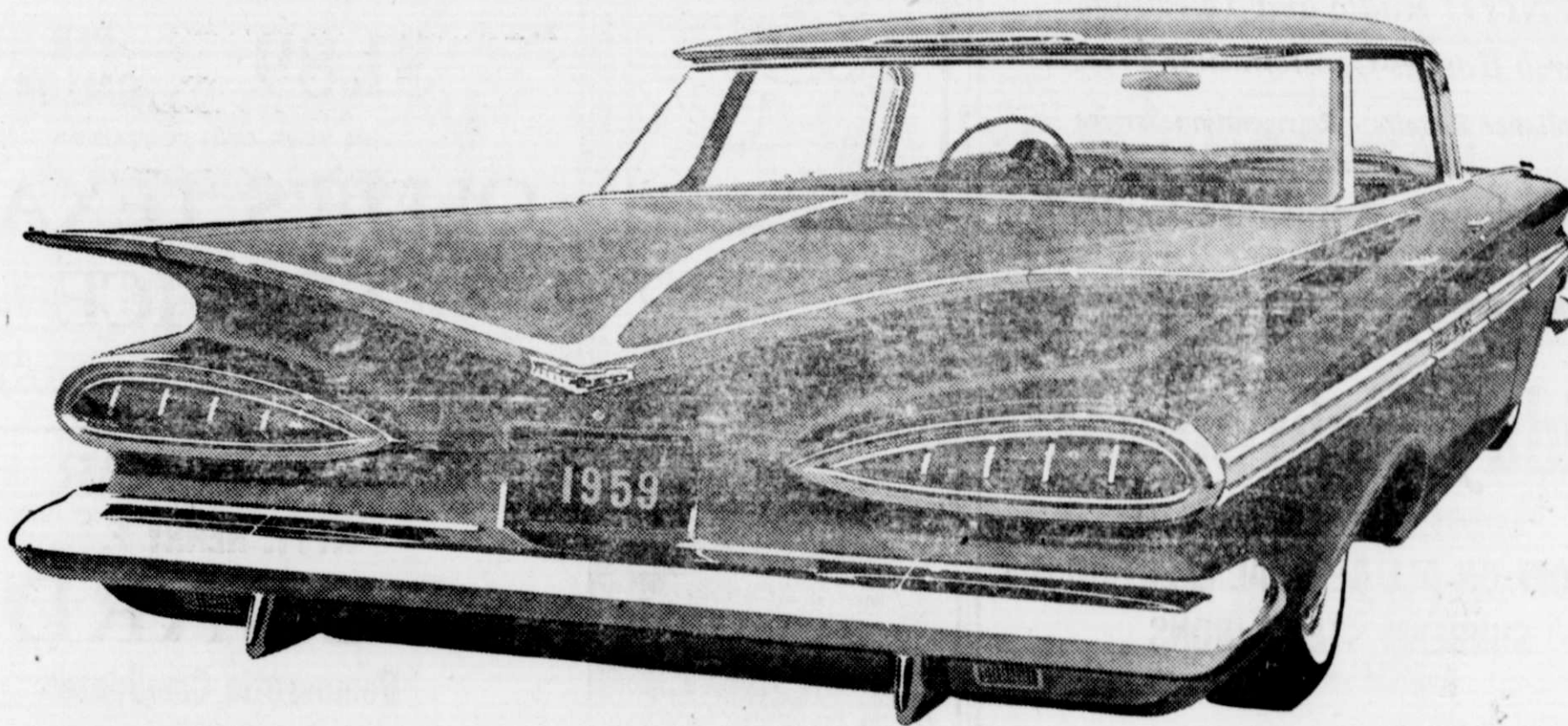

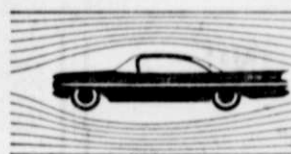
