SELL TRAILERS AND OTHER MARINE SUPPLIES, PLAN 24-HOUR AUTO SERVICE

The National Woodworking and Boat Co. recently leased the Schaefer Bros. garage building on Fond du Lac ave., formerly occupied by Vincent Motors, Inc., and moved into the building on Oct. 1.

Ernie Joyce is owner of the company and Pob Edgerton is salesman. The company at present employs four full time employees and plans on hiring more men when they go into production of the Runabout boat in the near future.

Boats being built by the company are 14 foot runabouts, 12 foot skiffs and 12x14 foot flat bottom row boats. These are sold both retail and wholesale. The concern also sells Valspar paint, fiberglass materials, Holesclaw trailers and various other marine supplies. They also repair boats and store motors and boats for the winter.

The gas station will sell Shell products and as of Nov. 1 will have complete automobile service such as wash and grease jobs. At that time the station will have a stock of tires and batteries and will be open for 24 hours. The station will also participate in the Friday)night bonus.

This business was first started in Milwaukee. Eight months later it. was moved to Dundee where a marine retail store was started. Sometime in early spring the factory end of the business was moved into the Maaske building here in Kewaskum. However, it grew too small for the company's needs and also be opened again.


