Democrats Elected to State Offices, Republicans Win in County; 469 Votes Cast Here

Proxmire, Van Pelt and Panzer Are Re-Elected

Even though the village of Kewaskum and Washington county GOP strongholds went Republican, Wisconsin Democrats rode to their first state victory in 26 years in Tuesday's election by winning four out of the state's five top offices and winning control of the state assembly in so doing.

The Democrats scored victories in the races for governor, lieutenant governor, state treasurer and attorney general. Secretary of State Robert C. Zimmerman was the only Republican re-elected, defeating Jerome J. Reinke. Streaming to the polls in record numbers state voters gave victories to Gaylord A. Nelson over Governor Vernon W. Thomson in the race for governor, Philleo Nash over Warren P. Knowles for lieutenant governor, Eugene M. Lamb over Dena A. Smith for state treasurer and John W. Reynolds over Steward G. Honck for attorney general.

Wisconsin returned its incumbent Democratic U. S. senator to office as Senator William Proxmire defeated his GOP opponent, Roland J. Steinle, by a huge margin. William K. Van Pelt defeated James Megellas in the race for sixth congressional district representative. The incumbent Republican carried Washington, Ozaukee, Calumet, Sheboygan and Winnebago counties but trailed Democrat Megellas in his home county of Fond du Lac. Incumbent Republican State Senator Frank Panzer won out over his Democratic opponent, Rudolph Oechsner, in Dodge and Washington counties.

Republican candidates made a clean sweep for county offices. All were re-elected for another two year term and swept along a new running mate, Deane R. Bascom, into office on the GOP ticket as district attorney. Complete election results in the county showed County Clerk Anton P. Stalal defeating his Democratic opponent, Fred Dorn of Kewaskum by a vote of 8,111 to 4,256; Paul L. Justman, county treasurer, won over William R. Dricken, 7,838 to 4,408; Sheriff Alvin Schmidt beat Robert Lisko, 8,423 to 4,015; Dr. James Albrecht, unopposed, tallied 8,462; Circuit Court Clerk Lawrence Berend defeated John N. Giudice, 7,786 to 4,446; Atty. Deane R. Bascom won over Atty. Henry Renard in the county's closest battle, 7,161 to 5,087; Edwin Pick defeated Leroy Weber for register of deeds, 7,570 to 4,850 and Ethan D. Maxon was re-elected surveyor on a vote of 8,097. He was unopposed.

For state offices county voters gave Thomson (R) 6,728 to Nelson (D) 5,747 for governor; Knowles (R) 7,258 to Nash (D) 4,928 for lieutenant governor; Zimmerman (R) 7,572 to Reinke (D) 4,758 for secretary of state; Smith (R) 7,155

House Numbers Being Distributed

The new house and business place numbers for the village have been received at the municipal building and can now be obtained at the office of the village commissioner.

One side of each street will have even numbers and the other odd. On Main st. the even numbers are on the north side and the odd ones on the south side. Residents will be required to install the numbers themselves at the most suitable spot on or near the door at the front of the building.

For Congress Van Pelt (R) received 6,949 and Megellas (D) 5,312. For State Senator Panzer (R) polled 7,508 and Oechsner (D) 4,598. County Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter (R) received 7,898 votes to 4,363 for Albert M. Neuy (D).

VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM

A comparatively heavy vote was cast in the village of Kewaskum,

where 469 marked their ballots. Of these there were 207 straight Republican ballots and 90 straight Democratic ballots cast while 178 voted a mixed ballot.

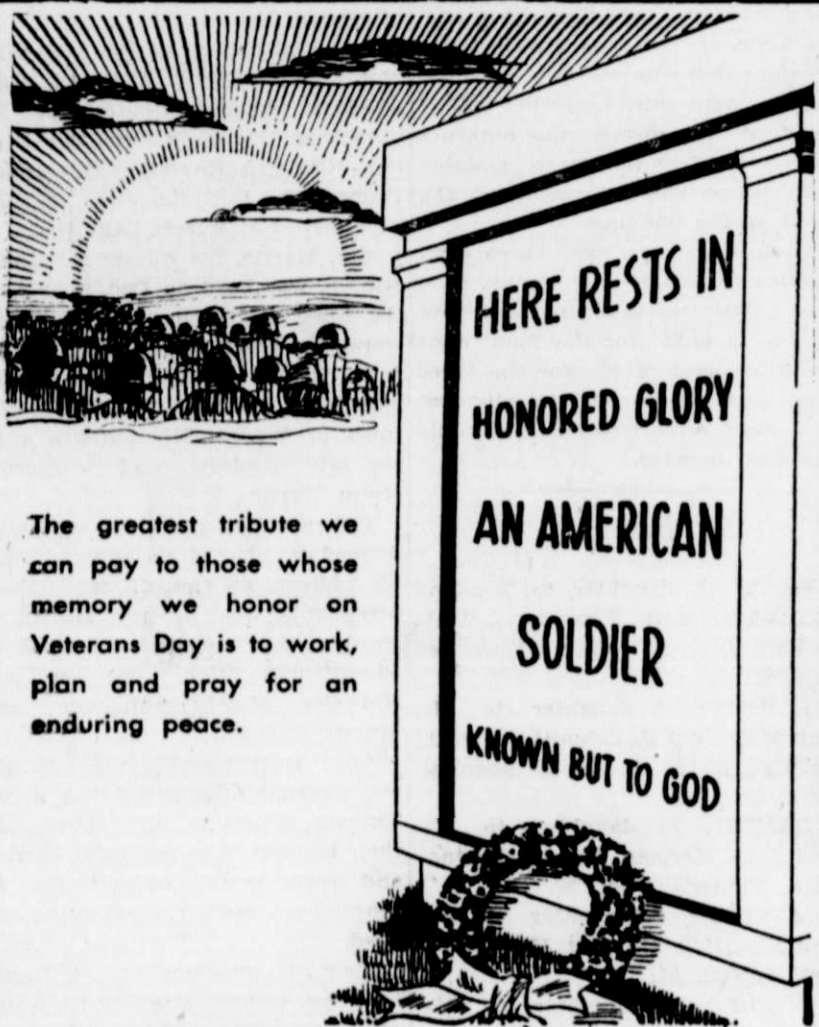

Last Minute TD Gives Slinger 7-7 Tie, Robs Indians of Title Share

OWLS SNARE VICTORY FROM KEWASKUM'S GRASP FOR CROWN; LOCALS 2ND

With an upset victory and tie for the title virtually in the bag for Kewaskum, the Slinger Owls roared from behind to score a touchdown and extra point with only 28 seconds of play left in the game to give them a 7-7 tie with the Indians in the final contest of the season here Friday night.

As a result Kewaskum fell short by a half minute of winning 7-0 and sharing the championship with the Owls. Both teams would have ended up with 4 and 1 records but the tie gave Slinger a 5-0-1 record

and the Indians one of 4-1-1 for second place. Coach Vern Ellis' Owls therefore are the first champions of the new Scenic Moraine conference.

Kewaskum played favored Slinger to a scoreless tie for three quarters with a large crowd from here, Slinger, West Bend, Campbellsport and other surrounding schools looking on. Coach Ernie Mitchell's squad, playing their best game of the season, more than held their own against Slinger's much bigger, heavier team of giants and tackled and blocked with viciousness.

Although they had three very good opportunities to score in the first half when they got within Slinger's 15 yard line, the Indians couldn't push the ball across as the Owl defenses tightened. With a pretty good kicker like Kon Sadownikow a field goal attempt might have worked and could have proved to be the winning margin later in the tilt.

Kewaskum finally broke the scoreless deadlock midway in the

last quarter. After a pass interference penalty put the ball deep in Slinger territory, a good run right through the middle of the Owls' line put the ball on the one yard line. Glen Rimmel crashed over on the next play and Sadownikow booted the placement for a 7-0 lead which looked very big so late in a very tight game.

The Indians kicked off and proceeded to hold Slinger on a series of downs to regain possession of

the ball with only a couple of minutes left to play. A couple of end sweeps would have used up valuable time but the quarterback tried two plunges into the line and then was smeared on a pass attempt. A bad kick on fourth down gave the Owls the ball in Kewaskum territory. Three desperate passes failed as the Kewaskum defenders broke them up. Norm Rodenkirch got in front of one of the passes in an at-

tempt to intercept it but the ball sailed right through his outstretched arms. 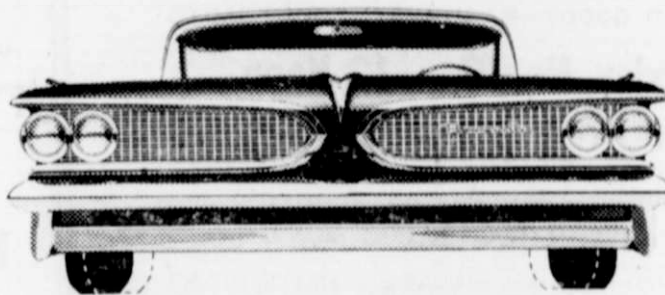

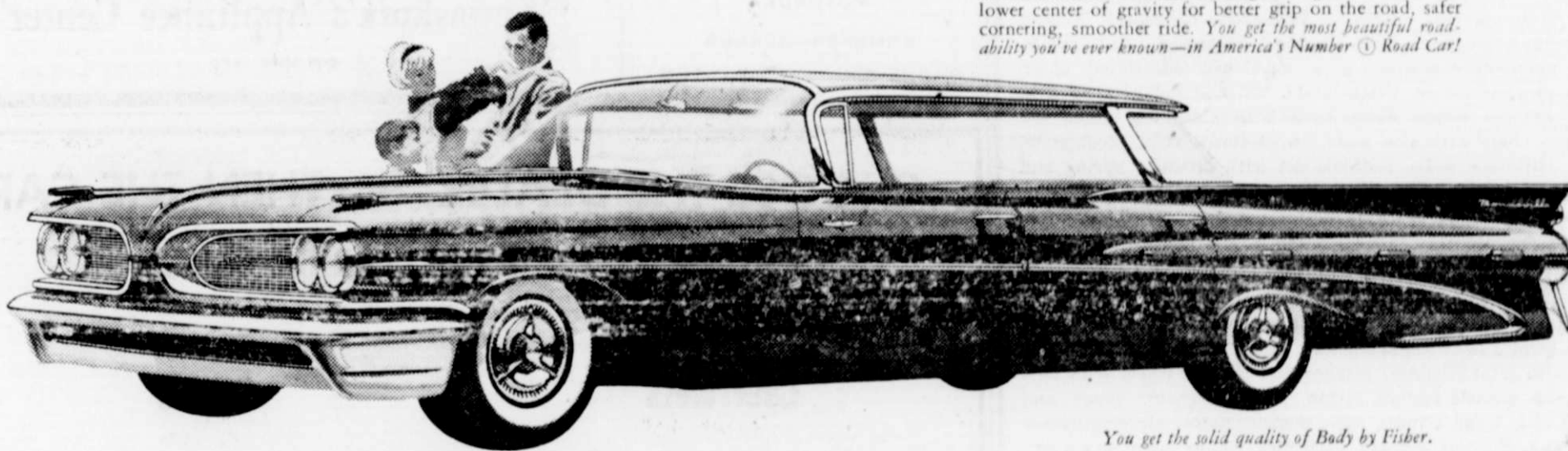
