School Choral Group in Mass Concert at Fondy

OVER 600 STUDENTS FROM 30 AREA HIGH SCHOOLS IN CHORUS SATURDAY

On Saturday, Nov. 15, 15 Kewaskum high school students will spend the entire day rehearsing for a 600-voice choral concert to be given at the Fond du Lac high school auditorium at 8 p. m. that evening. Outstanding choral students and their directors from 30 area high schools will participate in the mass chorus clinic.

The mass chorus will be under the direction of Don Craig of New York, internationally known choral director of many radio and TV shows, formerly of Fred Waring's Pennsylvanians.

Award Contract for Hwy. 45 Work to Eden

The R. B. Vickery Co. of Suamico has been awarded the contract for continuation of construction of Hwy. 45 from Kewaskum northward to Eden, it was announced this week by Al Rettler, county highway commissioner.

The contract, in the amount of \$722,928.70, was let by the Wisconsin Highway Commission for grading, sub-base, base and structures, on a distance of nearly 16 miles of Hwy. 45. The project includes more than seven miles of road work in Fond du Lac county and the remainder in Washington county.

Eight bids were received for the Fond du Lac county portion of the project, with Vickery's low bid of \$366,175 compared with the highest bid of \$450,279. Ten construction companies entered bids for the eight-mile section, immediately south of Fond du Lac's portion of the project, with the Vickery company again the lowest with an entry of \$356,753. The low bid was almost \$130,000 less than the highest.

Construction on the project is expected to start next spring.

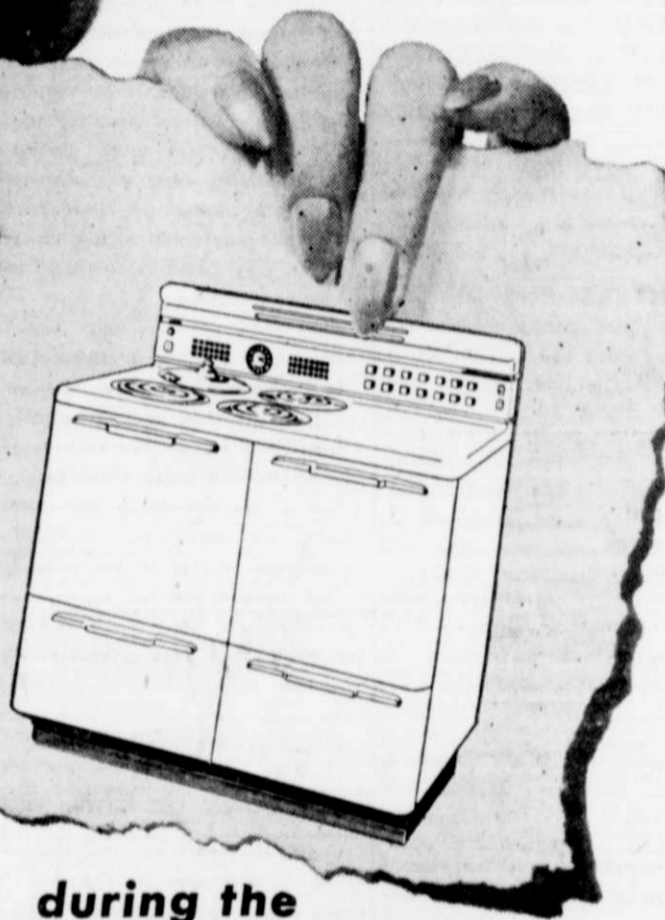

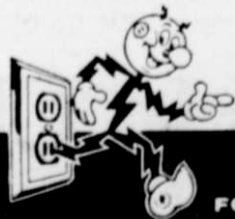

(2) Any person or municipality who shall violate any provision of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$100, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 6 months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

CHRISTMAS MAIL TO ARMED FORCES OVERSEAS SHOULD BE SENT BEFORE NOV. 20

Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced that Nov. 20 has been designated as the deadline for the mailing of Christmas parcels, Christmas cards and letters to members of our armed forces overseas.

The postmaster explained that the term "armed forces overseas" includes personnel of the armed forces, members of their families, and authorized United States civilians employed overseas who receive their mail through an APO number.

Those of you who are planning to send Christmas gifts, cards and letters should check at the post office regarding size and weight limitations and best methods of packing your gifts for overseas delivery. The postmaster pointed out that boxes should contain sufficient cushioning material so that the contents will be tightly packed to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. Unless completely packed and tightly filled, the boxes are likely to be crushed. A slip showing list of contents and addressee should be enclosed in every box or package. To certain APO's and NPO's a customs declaration on Form 2966 or 2976-A must be completed by the sender.

There are some prohibitive articles that cannot be sent overseas, including matches and lighter fluid. Cigarettes, other tobacco products, and coffee are prohibited in parcels addressed to certain military post offices. It's a good idea to check with the post office before purchasing or packing any overseas gifts.

Domestic rates of postage are applicable, and all postage must be fully prepaid. Parcel post rates take the zone rate from the post office where mailed to the post office through which the parcel is addressed. Air mail weighing

not to exceed 8 ounces is chargeable at the rate of 7 cents per ounce, and articles weighing over 8 ounces are chargeable at the rate of 80 cents a pound.

Be sure your addresses are legible and complete, and they should always be clearly written, or better yet, typewritten.

Make special note of the time for mailing overseas parcels and Christmas cards. Those going by surface mails can be sent between Nov. 1 and Nov. 20. Cards and letters going by air mail should be sent between Dec. 1 and Dec. 10.

You can make it a merrier Christmas for your friends and loved ones in the armed services in far away places if you will take action now to follow the postmaster's overseas Christmas mail suggestions.
