Steve & Mary's Station Moves To New Building

FORMER BUILDING IS BEING TORN DOWN TO MAKE WAY FOR NEW HWY. 45

Steve & Mary's service station, beer bar and lunch room just north of the village limits at the intersection of Hwys. 45 and 28 on Monday moved into the new building erected by the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Steve Rahn, about a half mile north of the former location, on Hwy. 45. The Rahns, who purchased the business from Bruhn & Backhaus, were forced to vacate the former property to make way for newly located Hwy. 45, scheduled to be built next summer, which will pass through the site. After receiving official notice of same only three months ago, they immediately purchased three acres of land in a wooded section from Otto Backhaus and began plans and construction of the new building. Although the upstairs residence rooms are not ready for occupancy and the building is not completed, the Rahns moved into it on schedule Dec. 1 and will be open for business this Friday, Dec. 5.

The split level building, constructed of concrete block, is 60 by 30 feet and has a one-story, 30 foot extension to the east which will be used as a cooler and store room. The ground floor has a large bar room with 64 foot oval bar, kitchen, ladies' and men's rooms and the second story has spacious living quarters.

The building is on a grade back from the highway because the new road is scheduled to run further east from its present location and will be raised several feet. Plans call for Hwy. V to intersect with 45 north of the present junction not too far distant from the Rahn premises. There is an excellent view from the building and when more of the trees have been removed and ground levelled the property will be very beautiful.

The former building was sold by the state at public auction some time ago and was purchased by Don Schuppel. He and crew of helpers are now busy razing the building, which work must be completed in 30 days. Other properties in the area were also sold at auction and included the Louis Vorpahl home immediately west of the Rahn station, the Walter Braun home at the intersection of Hwys. 45 and V at the overhead bridge, and a milk house owned by Loran Backhaus a short distance north. The Vorpahl house has been removed and workers are now removing the Braun building.

Steve & Mary wish to thank all of their customers and friends for their past business and hope for their continued patronage at their new location.

Village Trims Budget, Holds \$22.50 Tax Rate

Despite an increase in the school levy of \$16,000, the village board at their regular monthly meeting Monday night trimmed the village expenditures to hold the 1959 tax rate at \$22.50 per thousand, the same as last year. The proposed budget had called for an increase in the tax rate to \$25.00 per thousand.

The budget will be officially announced when the minutes of Monday's meeting are released for publication, most likely in next week's issue.

The board has also discontinued the practice of itemizing in their minutes the claims and salaries paid out by the village each month. As you will notice in the minutes published on another page of this issue, only the totals paid out in the general, water dept. and sewage funds are published.

On Sunday night the Chevs will play an exhibition game at Mt. Calvary for much needed practice, lunch and beer. Next Thursday night the Chevs journey to Fond du Lac.

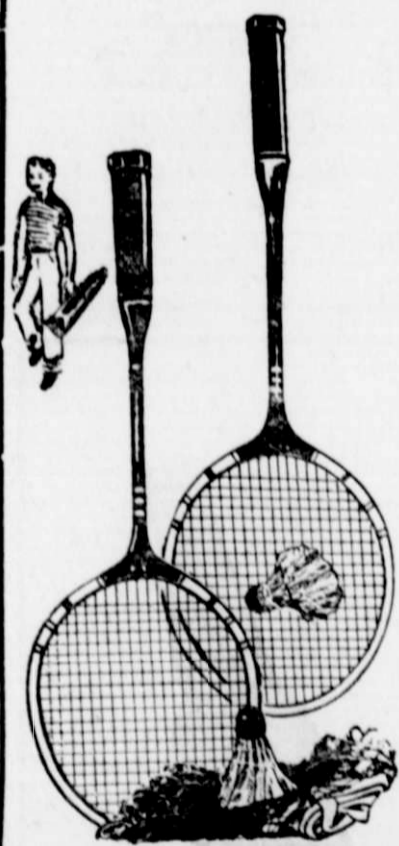
