Death was attributed to heart trouble and other complications. He was a former fieldman for the Kewaskum Dairy (Heinemann's) for 15 years and prior to that with the Borden Co. at Columbus, Wis. for 17 years.

Mr. Korth was born at Embarrass, Wis. on Sept. 14, 1891, a son of the late Edward and Anna Korth. His marriage to the former Marie Miller took place on June 28, 1916, at Oshkosh.

Surviving are the widow, three sons and a daughter, N.
