Diann Ramel Hurt When Hit By Car; Other Accidents

Diann Ramel, 13 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert W. Ramel, Kewaskum, was quite seriously injured when she was struck by a car as she was apparently pushing her bicycle on the Kewaskum hill on Hwy. 45 just south of the village at about 8:40 a. m. Saturday. Diann is an eighth grade pupil at Holy Trinity school. The Ramel family resides a short distance southwest of the village, on Hwy. H.

Miss Ramel suffered a possible fracture of the right leg, injuries to her left leg and head injuries. She was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. She was reported to be getting along quite well at the hospital this week.

The mishap occurred when an auto driven by Mrs. Raymond Skrentny, 43, of Kewaskum struck the girl and bicycle. Mrs. Skrentny reported she was driving slowly when the car suddenly hit the girl and bike. Neither Mrs. Skrentny nor two of her sons who were passengers in the vehicle saw the girl before the impact. A bright sun was shining in their faces at the time.

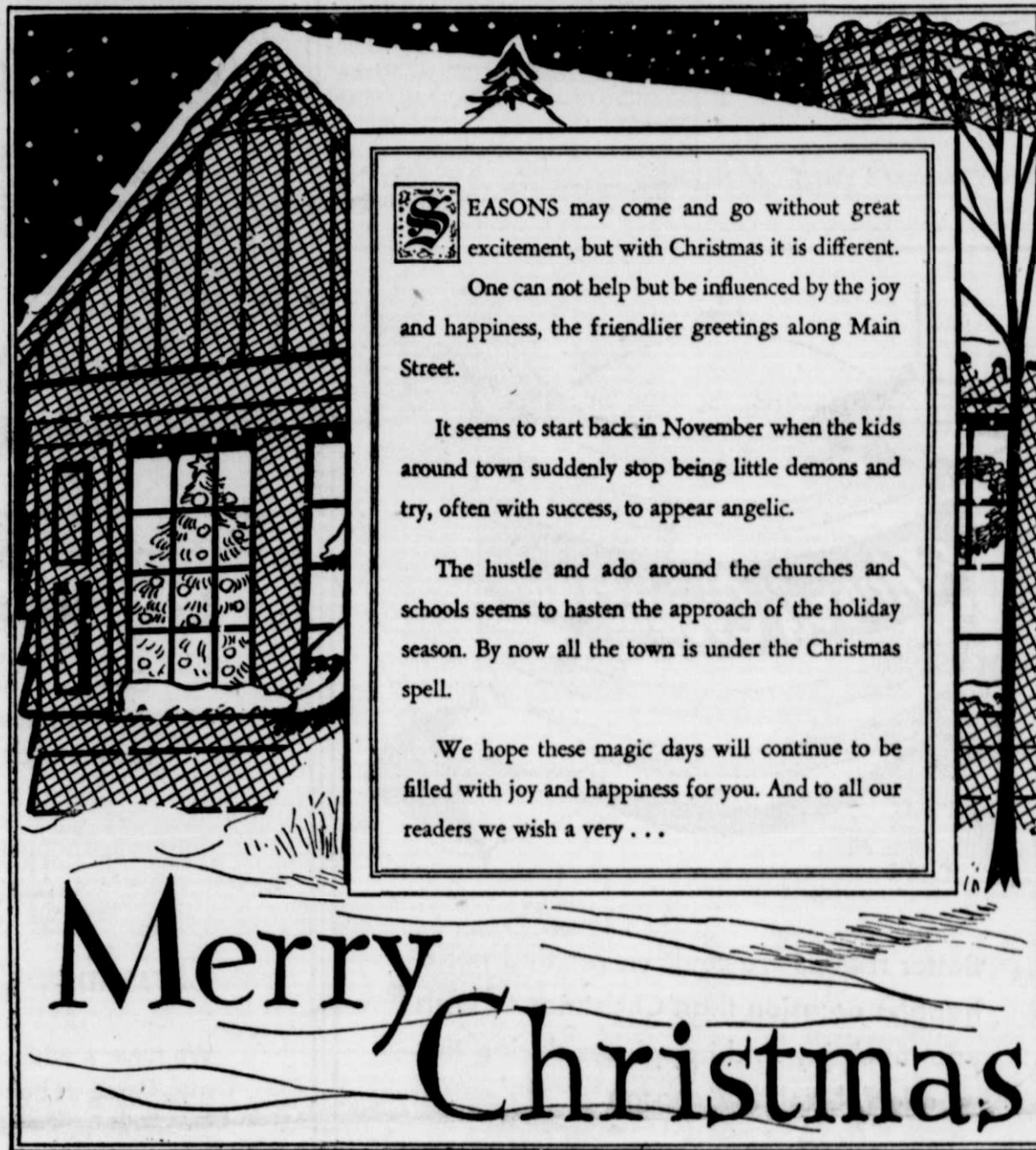
The front bumper and hood of the car was reported to have struck the girl and she was thrown off to the right of the vehicle. The bicycle was under the front end of the auto.

A car owned by Arlene Puestow, R. 1, Jackson, and driven by Jack H. Foell, 23, 255 Division st., West Bend, struck a parked car and pushed it into another parked auto on Park View Drive (River road) near the intersection of Main st. at about 11:40 p. m. Tuesday. Foell was southbound on Park View Drive when he struck a car owned by Miss Darlene Janssen, R. 2, Kewaskum. As a result of the impact the Janssen vehicle was pushed into another parked auto owned by Harvey Ramthun, Sr., Kewaskum. The Janssen and Ramthun cars both were parked legally on the east side of the street. Foell stated that he must have fallen asleep. Both he and his passenger, Miss Puestow, suffered minor facial injuries and were treated by a local physician. The left fronts of all three vehicles were damaged.

An auto owned by Lawrence Galabinske, North ave., and driven by Robert Puerling, 18, Kewaskum st., struck and damaged rose bushes, the house and garage owned by George Koerble at 528 Habeck st. at about 4:45 a. m. on Saturday. Puerling was northbound on Kewaskum st., a dead end street at Habeck st. when the car mounted the curb, traveled over the front lawn, hedges and rose bushes of the Koerble property and then struck the west side of the house and the garage door. Damage was estimated at \$100. No one was injured.

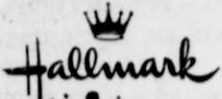

Strachota Co. of St. Killian Ships Clover Seed to Europe

WASHINGTON COUNTY "WHITE GOLD" EXPORTED TO WESTERN ZONE OF GERMANY

White Dutch clover seed, Washington county's fabulous cash crop of the 40's and early 50's and once commonly referred to as "White Gold" in the days when a bag brought \$100.00 or more, found an unusual home recently when the Strachota Seed company of St. Killian, exported a shipment of 22,000 pounds of this seed to the Western Zone of Germany. The shipment on Dec. 1, which was made out of the port of Milwaukee, via the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River, consisted of seed produced in the Washington county area and was completely processed at St. Killian.

Significantly, the European continent which not only ordinarily produced enough seed for its own use but also has a surplus amount for export to this country, found itself without an adequate supply this harvest season due to inclement weather and was forced to look elsewhere for its supplies. A surplus production of White Dutch clover seed in this country for the past two years with declining prices, welcomed this export demand.

While white clover is not a forage crop in this country, it is an essential crop on the continent. United States law forbids the sale of this commodity to the Eastern Zone of Germany or any of the Communist bloc countries.

Wisconsin is one of the six producing white clover states in the country, with production being chiefly in the Washington county area. The state of Idaho has the largest white clover production in the country.

O. N. Strachota of the Strachota Seed Co., St. Killian, reports that while most of the Wisconsin crop of white clover has moved, there still remains surplus supplies in the West and cautions local producers against over optimism until these surpluses are consumed.

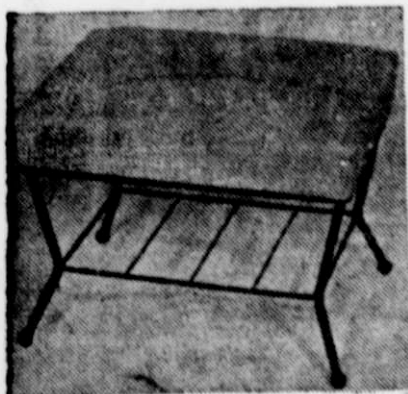



Kewaskum won two more Lakes games and took over undisputed second place when they defeated Fond du Lac there last Thursday night, 75-67, and nosed out Mayville in overtime here Saturday night, 67-65. for Fondy. In a typical Mayville-Kewaskum barn-burner here Saturday the Chevs as usual came from way behind to tie up the score at the final horn and eke out a close 67-65 win in overtime. Mayville was ahead of the Chevrolets by 10 points with less than four minutes to play and fans had conceded defeat when Manager "Cisco's" charges moved into high gear — "Beep, Beep." They did almost the impossible by burning the nets to overcome the 10-point deficit and knot the count just before the tilt ended. They then outscored Mayville in the three-minute overtime for the two point victory.

Mayville outscored Kewaskum in each of the first three quarters, 19-13 in the first, 16-9 in the second, and 15-14 in the third to take a commanding 50-36 lead going into the last period. Trailing by 14 points, the cause appeared hopeless but not for the never-say-die Chevs. They had a job to do and did it, settling down and gaining steadily until they had the huge advantage chopped off just in the nick of time. They overcame the lead in only 10 minutes of playing time and had the fans on their feet as they pulled it out of the fire.

High scorers for the winners were Bob Stenman and George Hanrahan with 15 points apiece, Krueger with 13 and Bilgo with 12. Mayville's leading point men were Genzmer with 19, Jim Bartelt 15, Tom Bartelt 14 and Wild 13.

This Saturday night Kewaskum plays at Horicon and this should be another close one. Then the team will be idle until after the holidays.
